Falmlen, Barbara Rainey	<p>Barbara Rainey Falmlen passed away peacefully at her Winchester home on Saturday surrounded by her three children and son-in-law, her beloved cats, and family friend, Blair Parson, ARNP. Flowers filled the room and casseroles filled the kitchen, a testament to her wide circle of friends and family—all past recipients of her thoughtful support during times of joy and sadness. Barbara and her family gratefully received support in her final hours from Jeanette House Sloat and Anita Bridges, dear friends of many decades.</p> <p>Barbara broke the glass ceiling in Winchester politics as the first woman to serve on the Winchester City Commission, from 1977-1980. She was initially appointed to fill a vacancy on the Commission, earning a full, two-year term in the following election. Her teenaged children, Laurel and Scott, canvassed door to door and Laurel sailed a campaign bathtub down the Kentucky River in the annual Admiral’s Day Parade captioned, “Don’t Let the City Go Down the Drain, Vote Barbara Falmlen City Commissioner.”</p> <p>Barbara symbolized a newly empowered generation of women with her Virginia Slims cigarettes and wide leg pantsuits. Her campaign slogan was fitting of both the times and her personality: “She’s Not Just One of the Boys.” Highlights of her term in office included the beautification of Main Street, consideration of a local payroll tax, and the controversial Fulton Street Extension.</p> <p>Barbara narrowly lost reelection in 1979 but continued to be active in local politics, serving as President of the Clark County Democratic Women’s Club and volunteering in many elections at the local, state and national level. Her son, Scott, continued this work with high ranking positions in Florida state government, and later as a successful political consultant based in Raleigh, North Carolina. He also served as a senior advisor to President Biden’s 2020 election campaign.</p> <p>Barbara was widely known as The Cat Lady, fostering hundreds of strays and placing them in loving homes. Neighbors and strangers left unwanted kittens (sometimes entire litters) at her door, many times unannounced. Barbara forged deep bonds with her “cat babies” and was a fierce advocate for the humane treatment of all animals. Barbara’s daughter, Heather, carries on this work with passion and commitment for spay and neuter programs, the Kentucky Humane Society and Alley Cat Advocates, where donations in Barbara’s memory may be sent in lieu of flowers. (<a href="http://alleycatadvocates.org">alleycatadvocates.org</a>)</p> <p>Barbara was a real estate entrepreneur and founded a successful real estate agency in the 1980s known as The Sold Team, whose bright yellow signs bore the slogan, “Everything We Touch Turns to Sold.” She lived in her own yellow and white Victorian home for almost 50 years.</p> <p>Barbara was born in Miami, Florida, on February 23, 1942, a third generation Floridian. She graduated from Miami Edison High School where she received high marks in English and was recognized for her creative short story writing. She married young and her daughter, Laurel, was born on her twentieth birthday.</p> <p>Her parents were Earl Milton Rainey—a Clark County native—and Maxine Ellis Rainey. She was exceptionally close to her maternal grandparents, Mayme and Hobart Ellis. Her sister, Alesia Rainey Butler, also lives in Winchester with her husband, Michael Butler. Barbara enjoyed a close and loving relationship with her niece, Samantha Butler, who called her Bob-Bob. Many others followed suit and the nickname became her favorite moniker.</p> <p>Barbara always stood out from the crowd. Her favorite color was sunflower yellow. She was a gregarious story teller who never let the facts stand in the way of a great punchline. Her cars were often adorned with yellow flowers, taped to the antenna or affixed in all-over decals. Her family liked to say that Barbara woke up every day to see what she could get away with. She once cut class during her senior year, hiding her new two-piece bathing suit under her school clothes. The next day’s Miami Herald featured a candid photo of her sunning on Miami Beach, her bathing suit bottoms scrunched down bikini-style—a daring gesture in the conformist 1950s. About that time, she surprised her parents by coming home from school with platinum hair.</p> <p>Barbara loved to cook for friends and family, celebrating lavish holiday meals and</p>

	<p>collecting hundreds of cookbooks on her travels. She enjoyed reading fiction and biography. She laughed easily and cried freely. Barbara bled blue, closely following UK basketball and football. She was an avid fan of "Jeopardy!" and friends knew not to telephone during the nightly show. She traveled widely, visiting Western Europe, the Caribbean, Africa and India. She visited nearly all of the 50 states in a RoadTrek camper van outfitted for two cats to travel along. She spent several winters in Florida and the Bahamas sailing in a 35' trawler she named Two Cats Too. Her cats had custom life jackets on hand, deployed only once in rough seas.</p> <p>Barbara is survived by her three children of whom she was exceptionally proud: Laurel Catto (John) of Aspen, Colorado, Scott Falmlen (Paul Fox) of Raleigh, North Carolina, and Heather Falmen (Keith Zirbel) of Louisville, Kentucky; her step-grandchildren Sophie and Ian Catto; her sister, Alesia Rainey Butler (Michael), and her niece, Samantha Butler. The family plans a private graveside service and a public visitation at Scobee Funeral Home, Winchester, on Wednesday, May 3, from 5:00 to 7:00 p.m.</p> <p>Barbara's family gratefully acknowledges the exceptional services of Hospice East and suggests remembrances be made to Alley Cat Advocates (alleycatadvocates.org) 3524 Newburg Rd., Louisville, Ky 40218. Ferguson, William	A DASTARDLY CRIME; Three Persons Poisoned by Arsenic in Their Coffee; One of the most diabolical crimes of which we have knowledge was perpetrated near Grassy Lick, Montgomery county, this week, by which Messrs. William Ferguson and Brack Watts lost their lives. Mr. Watts was a son-in-law of Mr. Ferguson and lived with him. At the breakfast table on Thursday morning, Messrs. Watts and Ferguson drank of the coffee prepared for the meal and in a few minutes symptoms of poisoning were manifested and a physician was hastily summoned. Nothing could be done however and the two victims died the following morning. Grace Boyd, the twelve-year-old granddaughter of Mr. Ferguson tasted of the coffee and was made very ill, but recovered. Mrs. Ferguson does not drink coffee and Mrs. Watts being ill was on a milk diet. These composed the family. An analysis of the coffee showed arsenic in large quantities. Nothing is certainly known as to how it came there, but suspicion is said to certain parties living near, with whom Mr. Watts had some trouble a few days before his death. This was so slight, however, that it seems almost incredible that so horrid a crime could be based upon it. The coffee was prepared the night before and left upon the stove. Mr. Watts spent the evening with a neighbor and on his return, closed the kitchen door, which had no lock. The next morning it was found open. The theory is that some one entered during the night and put the poison in the coffee pot. Mr. Ferguson was 78 years old, and was a veteran of the Mexican war. He leaves four children, Mark, who formerly lived near this city, George, who married Miss Maggie Bruner, of this county, Annie, the wife of Mr. Watts, one of the victims, and Hester, the wife of Edgar Boyd, of Montgomery. Mr. Watts was twenty-nine years old and leaves a wife but no children. He was a son of Fielding Watts, of this county, where his remains were buried. Our correspondent, near the scene of the crime, writes us that intense excitement prevails there, and should sufficient proof be found, the perpetrator would be lynched without ceremony. The Winchester Democrat, Wednesday, March 11, 1891  LATEST DEVELOPMENTS. In the Grassy Lick Poisoning Case—Two of Them Confess. As stated in the account of the Grassy Lick poisoning, as given in our last issue, it was believed by many that the poison was placed in the coffee by some tenants on Watts' farm with whom he had had trouble a few days previous. As matters developed, suspicion pointed more and more strongly to these men and public sentiment pointed strongly towards trying them in Judge Lynch's court. Tuesday night a crowd gathered on the Grassy Lick pike for this purpose, but wiser counsel prevailed and the crowd dispersed. On the following morning the officers of the law arrested John L. Wigginton, aged 60 years, and his sons, Frank, aged 30, Charlie, aged 23, and John, aged 12, as they were at work in the field, near their house. When they saw the officers approaching they were badly scared and guilt was plainly written on their faces. They were taken to Mt. Sterling and placed in jail. For several nights a mob was expected to attempt to lynch them, but Jailer Tipton is a brave man and promised the mob a warm reception should they try to take his prisoners from him. With the remembrance of the fate of Jack Ringo and his companions, who attempted the same job a few years ago, the mob wisely refrained. Frank, the eldest son, made a confession of the motives and

manner of committing the crime, to a Sentinel-Democrat man as follows:  
 “I am unmarried and live at my father’s house—Charley and I went to Fergusons house—I staid outside and Charley took the poison in and put it in the coffee pot—Charley and Breck Watts had had a difficulty in a settlement about some tobacco and Charley was mad at him—this is what we did it for—don’t know whether my father or step-mother knew of it or not—it was talked about at the house—John knew we were going to do it, but he didn’t go with us—we bought the arsenic at a drugstore, I think it was on Main street—Charley paid for it and carried it home—it was 10 cents worth—we got it a day or two before it was put in Fergusons coffee pot—don’t know just how long before—I have another brother, Newt who lives in Fayette county—he was not there—there was no one connected with the crime but Charley and I—my father’s wife is my step-mother—she has five children—John who is in jail upstairs is her oldest.”  
 The father and the other two boys denied all knowledge of the crime, but no doubt exists in the minds of anybody as to the guilt of at least a part of them. The mother said in regard to the matter: “The boys were mad at Brack Watts about a settlement and that Frank and Charley did the poisoning. The matter was talked of before the whole family and she and her husband tried to persuade them not to commit such a terrible crime. She said the boys carried a small package of something home wrapped up in paper, with a newspaper around the outside; but she did not know whether it was the poison or not.”  
 The prisoners were brought before Judge Apperson, Friday for examination. The old man and the boys were discharged, there being no evidence to connect them with the commission although they evidently knew of it. Frank and Charley were held over without bail until June term of the Circuit Court. The prospects for a first-class judicial hanging are decidedly good. The Sentinel Democrat thus describes the two murders:  
 “Frank the eldest son is a small, mostly sandy, degenerated specimen of humanity with just sense enough to tell the truth. Charley is a man of pretty much the same complexion as Frank, but is much larger and has more sense.”  
 LATER: On Saturday night a mob went to the house of Thos. Martin, formerly of this county, where the old woman and little children were staying for the night. The old woman was taken out and strung up, when let down, she confessed that all the family knew about it; that the old man bought the poison; that the boys had determined to burn the house on the same night the poison was administered had they found no opportunity to enter the kitchen. The mob went to the jail also, but did not get in. The old man has not been found, but will undoubtedly be hung if he is found. The old woman was put in jail.

Some Remarkable Statements.

Some time ago Moses Feltner killed Jesse Fields in Breathitt county, and is now on bail awaiting trial. His attorney is Jas. B. Marcum, the well known lawyer and Republican leader. Circuit Court now being in session at Jackson, both Marcum and Feltner have filed affidavit for a continuance of the case and these affidavits, and especially that of Feltner, contain some very startling statements. Feltner swears that County Judge James Hargis and Sheriff Ed Callahan conspired with him to kill Marcum; that he, Feltner was to decoy Marcum from his house to a point where had been hid a shotgun loaded with buckshot and which was to be used to kill Marcum; that several other plans were laid all of which were told Marcum by Feltner; that Hargis, Callahan and others finally suspected and the latter had to leave Jackson for fear of being killed. As pay for killing Marcum, Feltner was to be pardoned for his crimes. He also says he heard both Hargis and Callahan say that the killing of Dr. Cox was a good thing and that they were glad he was killed. In conclusion both Marcum and Feltner say they are afraid to come to Jackson for fear they will be killed.

Surrendered to Sheriff McCord.

Moses Feltner under indictment for the killing of Jesse Fields in Breathitt county some years ago, arrived here last Friday in company with Sheriff Morgan, of Leslie county, and surrendered to Sheriff McCord, who had a bench warrant for him. Shortly afterward Feltner gave bond and was released.

Soon after the killing of Fields Feltner was tried and sentenced to the penitentiary for seven years. The higher court reversed the decision and Feltner was released on \$5,000 bond. Owing to the inability of his attorney, J. B. Marcum, to defend him in the Breathitt Circuit Court at the term for which the trial was set Feltner did not appear and the bond was forfeited. Feltner spent some time out west, but recently has been living in Leslie county, Ky. He says, with a fair trial, he will be acquitted of the charge which he is under.

The More You Hear the Worse It Gets.—Mose Feltner and Sam Fields Now Giving Depositions in this City.—What Next.

The name of Breathitt county is so significant of wrong doing that nothing else is thought of when the name is mentioned and there are certain names that come readily to mind at the name of Breathitt. We will keep our readers informed as best we can of Breathitt's doings.

Following the action of the higher court at Frankfort granting a temporary stay of proceedings against the Breathitt county gentlemen indicted in Fayette county. Col. John R. Allen, attorney for the Fayette court, filed a motion and the Court of Appeals issued an order for James W. Edwards, Magistrate of Breathitt county, to appear before it tomorrow, February 10<sup>th</sup>, and produce all records, warrants, bonds, memoranda, etc., in the Hargis-Callahan cases. It is the purpose of Col. Allen to show that they are forgeries; that Edwards was in collusion with the Hargises and did not act in good faith. On the rules issued by the Clark court, Sheriff McCord and Deputy Stokely went to Perry county last week and arrested Mose Feltner and Sam Fields. These are two of the witnesses that are alleged to have been spirited away from here during the Marcum damage trial. They were brought before the Court Saturday morning and failing to give bond they were placed in charge of officer Dock Pigg.

Senator Hargis came down from Jackson Saturday afternoon and gave bond in the sum of \$2,000 for an appearance. The rule and warrants of arrest for Judge Hargis and Sheriff Ed. Callahan were sent to Jackson. They will be served by Coroner M. C. Bailey. Mr. Bailey executed the bonds and returned them to the Sheriff of this county yesterday. James Hargis, in the sum of \$1,000, signed by A. P. Crawford, Steven Cundiff, W. H. Blanton and Jacob E. Lane. Ed. Callahan's bond for \$4,000 was signed by the same parties.

For satisfactory reasons, the depositions of Mose Feltner and Sam Fields have been taken; that of Feltner, occupying the day Tuesday, and until late yesterday afternoon. A letter was given to Feltner since he has been a prisoner here in which dire consequences were threatened in case he gave his deposition. He denies being in contempt saying he left the state through fear. Feltner says that he had been employed to kill Marcum and implicates Alex. Hargis, Jim Hargis, Ed Callahan, and B. F. French. He implicates the first three in the killing of Cockerill. His reward for killing Marcum was to be an acquittal on the charge of killing Jesse Fields, who was one of French's lieutenants in the French-Eversole feud or, if convicted, a pardon would be obtained for him. If, on the other hand, he refused to carry out the orders, he would be sentenced and hanged. The deposition of Sam Fields will be taken in connection with that of Feltner.

He taught school five months at Ruckerville and in February joined the Tenth United States Cavalry (regulars) at Cincinnati and was sent to Fort Reboe in Montana where he stayed until April 19 <sup>th</sup> , when his regiment was sent to Chickamauga where it remained one month. It was then ordered to Lakeland, Florida, where it stayed until June 12 <sup>th</sup> , when it embarked at Tampa on board the Leona for Cuba. After a week's voyage the fleet reached Baiquiri, about eighteen miles East of Santiago, and landing June 22 <sup>nd</sup> , went into camp about one and one half miles from the seashore. Breaking camp the next evening, it marched nearly to Siboney. Resting a few hours, the regiment ate an early breakfast and moving forward was joined by the First Cavalry and the Rough Riders and a part of the Twenty-Third Infantry, making a force of about one thousand men. Early that morning (June 24 <sup>th</sup> occurred the fight at La Guasima, where young Hamilton Fish was killed and the Rough Riders were rescued from their perilous position by the charge of the Tenth Cavalry (colored). Berry's company, in this struggle, had one man killed and seven wounded. The Spaniards had 1,500 men engaged behind trenches and supported by two machine guns from Cervera's fleet. The fight lasted about two and a half hours in a rough, hilly country and under a blazing red hot sun. The regiment rested just beyond the battle field until the night of the 30 <sup>th</sup> , when it took position for the movement on San Juan which began next morning. The roads were narrow and horrible although the engineer corps had improved them considerably. The soldiers carried their rations of bacon, hardtack and coffee and also their ammunition. There were a number of small streams from a foot to a foot and a half deep before they reached San Juan river, which ran at the foot of the hill on which the fort to be stormed was located. The river was up to the arm pits of the shorter men and had to be waded. Berry's regiment marched behind a battery of artillery the night of the 30 <sup>th</sup> and was in line of battle at about nine o'clock a. m., after having crossed the river. The artillery was posted behind the infantry, which encountered a storm of shells and rifle balls. Berry's company had sixty men in line, three yards apart. There were no barbed wire cutters on the first day and the soldiers had to break the wires with the butts of their muskets. On the 2 <sup>nd</sup> day, certain men were detailed with proper implements to cut the wires which were a serious obstacle. The battle raged from nine in the morning until 4:45 p. m. Berry received a flesh wound in the hip about 1:30 p. m., as he went up the hill, but kept his place in the ranks. About 2:30 p. m., a man in company G, of the Tenth, was badly wounded, and Berry had taken him in his arms to help him to where he could be cared for, when a bullet struck the wounded soldier in the forehead, killing him instantly and spattering his blood and brains over Berry's hat and clothes. At half-past four, just as his command was rushing on the fort and victory was assured Berry was shot in the foot and, with a little aid, hobbled back to where the ambulance corps took charge of him and carried him to the rear. He left for Port Tampa on the 5 <sup>th</sup> of July on board the Cherokee, which by mistake was fired on by gun boats during the voyage. He was sent to Fort McPherson, Ga., but on the way his train was wrecked. He was in a hospital there about a month and was then sent to Washington where he remained in barracks nursing his wounds until he was allowed to come home, reaching here August 24 <sup>th</sup> . He speaks in the highest terms of General Wheeler's courage and kindness. During the battle, he went among the men and would tell them to lie down and keep under cover as well as they could. When the soldiers would call to him to lie down too, he would say,

	<p>“Never mind me, boys. Take care of yourselves.” Berry says his Captain, Watson, behaved very gallantly, and is much beloved by his men. All the commissioned officers of the Tenth Cavalry are white, and many of them from the South. Mr. Whitehead, who married Miss Louise Eginton, of this place, is a Lieutenant in this regiment. He is a Texan, and behaved with great courage in the fighting before Santiago. He was wounded slightly. Berry has had malarial fever since he came home but is not recovering rapidly. He saw Gen. Shafter lying in his tent on a cot, as he went to the rear after being wounded. Berry says that the country where the army operated around Santiago is hilly, but looked as if the soil might be rich and productive. It is covered with thick brush, and is afflicted with the cactus, which puts out myriads of sharp needles. Berry does not think the climate is much warmer than ours. He saw and felt many of the land crabs. Berry heard the guns of the fleets when Cervera’s ships were destroyed. On Christmas, 1897, James Philpot was killed by Aaron Morris, but before he died he shot and killed Wm. Bundy, a friend of Morris. The Morris and Griffins were closely affiliated. Since then the feuding between the two factions has been very bitter, and it has been aroused recently by the White-Baker hostilities.</p> <p>The Philpots, who are the strongest faction in the mountain numbering about 750 voters, openly espoused the cause of the Bakers, White, the Griffins took sides with the Whites. The story that reaches here from Manchester is to the effect that Bob Philpot was arrested Monday morning by Deputy Sheriff Wash Thacker. While very circumstantial, in other respects the report does not show clearly the origin of the trouble nor give the reason for Philpot's arrest.</p> <p>It is said that while Thacker was taking Philpot's bond, the latter was shot from behind by a member of a crowd that had gathered. This precipitated a general fight with Winchesters and revolvers, which was participated in by George, Granville, Robert and Peter Philpot and Ed Fisher on one side and Aaron Morris, Hugh, Jim and Green Griffin on the other.</p> <p>The battle began about 9 o'clock and raged fiercely for ten or fifteen minutes. When it was over it was found that the five men mentioned above had been killed outright, three of the belligerents were seriously wounded, while Pete Philpot was the only one on either side to escape injury. Granville Philpot is said to be one of the most seriously wounded. He is a union veteran having lost a leg at Stone river. He is an ex-member of the Kentucky legislature and is said to have killed three or four men.</p> <p>Ed Fisher, who is reported dead, was another man with several nicks in his cane. He was but 23 years old but was said to have killed three men. The story of this battle caused consternation here notwithstanding the fact that serious trouble has been expected to break out among the mountaineers of Clay county ever since the assassination of Tom Baker several weeks ago. An effort was at once begun to secure deputies to go to the seat of the trouble and attempt to restore quiet, but up to a late hour in the afternoon there had not been enough responses to make up a force that would command respect. The situation at Manchester is deplorable. Since morning the place has been in a state of terror, scarcely anyone daring to venture out of doors. Business is suspended and the residents are momentarily expecting a renewal of hostilities. The entire county of Clay is filled with men mounted and armed. Other battles may occur at any moment.</p> <p>A relative of the Philpots has just left here to join his family and swears vengeance.</p> <p>London Depot, Ky., July 18.—Clay county has another killing for its annals. Dick Lovens' body has been found three miles from Manchester. He was beaten to death in the night. When found his head was severed from his body and had been beaten to a pulp.</p> <p>A 45-calibre revolver was found on the body. Having killed three men and injured several, he was probably killed by the friends on one of his victims. He leaves a widow and eight children.</p> <p>An attempt has been made to kill Will Gray, near Manchester, Clay county. After three shots had passed through his clothes, one of them scraping his body, he escaped by running through a forest. Flanagan, James	<p>Judge James Flanagan. [W. H. Polk in Lexington Herald] Among the many prominent men produced by Clark county in the last century, none are better known or more highly esteemed than Judge James Flanagan. Born on September 28, 1820, he will soon be eighty-five years of age. And yet notwithstanding his accumulated years, he is as erect as a young man, his actions alert and vigorous and his eyesight so little affected by time that he reads without glasses. His excellent preservation is no doubt due to calm and even tenor which has characterized his life, backed by an excellent constitution. Always alert, both bodily and mentally, but never wrought up into excitement, the years have drifted behind him with little effect upon him physically. The snows of winter have fallen on his locks, but his eye is as clear and piercing as it ever was. Judge Flanagan is a splendid specimen of the old-school Kentucky gentleman. Dignified, polite and kindly in his intercourse with men, knightly as the knightliest in the company of ladies, he is universally respected and beloved by every one who knows him, both at home and abroad. Few men are better known all over Kentucky; few have as many and as warm friends. The span of his life has covered the greater part of the period of his county's existence. He was the contemporary of Samuel Hanson, Governor Clark, John B. Huston, Chilton Allen, Charles Eginton, Tucker Simpson, Downy and many others of Clark county's distinguished sons. As a lawyer he met them on the forum and the stump and in every relation bore himself with that dignity and urbanity which have been salient points of his character. And standing yet among the ranks of men—like a sturdy oak in a forest that awaits final prostration—he awaits philosophically and calmly for that summons which comes sooner or later to all. Long since retired from practice or active business, he yet takes a deep interest in all the current transactions of the world. Something of the life and ancestry of such a man, therefore, will be read with interest by all, especially those who enjoy the boon of his acquaintance. Judge Flanagan's Ancestors. The grandfather of Judge Flanagan was Hugh Flanagan, who was born in the county of Down, in Ireland, in 1721, and died in Frederick county, Maryland, in 1818 aged ninety-seven years. Hugh Flanagan was a Catholic in religion. When forty-five years of age he married Mary Kelly, by whom he had seven sons and three daughters. With his</p>

wife he emigrated to Maryland, locating on what was called the "Western Shores," where all the Catholic emigrants into Lord Baltimore's colony settled, the Protestants fixing themselves across Chesapeake Bay on what was called "Eastern Shore."

The sons of Hugh Flanagan were: James, Malachi, John, Francis, Hugh, Jr., Charles and Peter. The daughters were Catherine, Mary and Eliza. Peter, the father of Judge Flanagan, was the fourth son. He was born May 15, 1773 and died July 16, 1842 in Clark county. His wife was Ruth Warrick, of Bryan's Station, Fayette county, a sister of the brave Capt. Jacob Warrick, who fell at Tippecanoe in 1811.

Of Hugh Flanagan's other sons, James and John came to Kentucky in 1795. Peter came two years later, in 1897, and settled at Winchester, then consisting of but a few log huts. John and James located four hundred acres each, part of their farms including what are now suburban portions of the town. These three brothers—James, John and Peter married three sisters of Capt. Warrick. James married Margaret, John married Eleanor and Peter married Ruth, as stated.

The children of Peter Flanagan were Eliza, born 1804, died in infancy; William born March 2, 1805, died September 11, 1851. He married Laura Laughlin.

Dr. George, born April 17, 1807, died September 9, 1836.

Catherine, born August 11, 1809, died January 25, 1848. She married John Whitehead and died in Winchester.

Judge Flanagan's Marriage.

Judge James Flanagan, born September 28, 1820, the subject of this sketch, married on January 4, 1860, Miss Susan Wilson, of Montgomery county, a niece of United States Senator Garrett Davis. She died October 31, 1890. She was a woman of exalted merits and lovely character. Beloved by all who knew her, and when death called her away from the side of him who had so long trod with her the path of life was a terrible blow, from which he never recovered.

Mary, the sixth and last child of Peter Flanagan, was born October 2, 1824, and in 1846 was married to Charles Poston, of Clark county.

But two children were born to Judge Flanagan and wife; George a son and a daughter, the latter dying in infancy. George grew to manhood and was a young man of uncommonly handsome person and wonderful brightness of mind. The only child, he was the idol of his parents and beloved by all who knew him, and when death took away the wife and mother, the father clung all the more tenderly to his boy.

George was born on May 16, 1862, during the civil war, and died January 26, 1902, at Montgomery, Ala. After a good education in the schools of Winchester he attended the Kentucky Military Institute at Frankfort, displaying remarkable efficiency in his studies. After completing his studies he entered the mercantile business at Winchester, where he remained some years, later going on the road as a traveling salesman for a wholesale house. While so employed in the South he fell ill and died. With anguished heart the stricken father repaired to his bedside and bore back to Kentucky the last prop of his life and affection, and laid him to rest beside his mother. The blow was a sad one to the devoted father, whose life all seemed bound up in the handsome promising boy.

Judge Flanagan's Public Life.

Judge Flanagan received a good education in Winchester Academy in the ordinary branches of learning and upon quitting school commenced clerking in a dry goods store kept by Simpson & Whitehead. He remained there seven years and then accepted the position of deputy postmaster under his brother William. The office was kept in the Flanagan Hotel. He next read law under John B. Huston, was admitted to the bar in 1857 and practiced actively until 1895, a period of nearly forty years, accumulating a comfortable competence. His contemporaries at the bar were Huston, the Hansons—Roger and Charles—Simpson, Eginton, Bush, Allen, Tucker, Downy and others.

In 1857 Judge Flanagan was chosen as a magistrate under the new constitution. He was also City Attorney for eight years, and twice county Attorney, serving eight years. In 1856 he embarked in journalism and for two years was editor of the Winchester Chronicle, a Whig paper, which he sold to Parrish & Gruelle, who changed the name to The Clark County Democrat, its present title. In 1865 Judge Flanagan was appointed United States District Assessor of Clark county, but he declined the office. In November, 1894, he was elected a member of the lower house of the Kentucky Legislature to fill a vacancy caused by the resignation of Judge W. M. Beckner.

Judge Flanagan has for many years been a consistent member of the Methodist Church, also a prominent member of the Odd Fellows. He is now the oldest surviving member of the Hickman Lodge No. 72, I. O. O. F. In 1883, without solicitation, he was appointed by Governor Blackburn Circuit Judge of the Ashland district, to fill out the unexpired term of Judge Ben F. Buckner, who had resigned. Judge Flanagan served in this capacity with great credit, but declined to make the race for the position at the next regular election, preferring the quiet happiness of home to the labors of the circuit. He was free from that grasping ambition which moves so many men to strenuously cling to office.

A Remarkable Memory.

Judge Flanagan is a walking encyclopedia of history, national, State and county. His memory is clear and distinct in regard to all the transactions that have taken place and the people whom he has known since his early childhood. To the writer he said: "We had two regiments of militia in Clark county in early days. Several companies were sent from here to the front in 1812 and they were in the battle of the Thames. These companies belonged to the regiment of Col. John Donaldson, and were commanded by Captains Combs and Cunningham. Combs' company was picked from the rank and file of the 17<sup>th</sup> regiment and Cunningham's from the 36<sup>th</sup> regiment. Capt. Joseph Clark's company was recruited from the 36<sup>th</sup> mostly and was in Dudley's defeat (Fort Meigs), every commissioned officer being killed. Capt. Clark was mortally wounded on the field. The late Leonard Bell, then but sixteen, was in that company and

had to run the gauntlet. One of the two companies commanded by Col. John Martin was in the "battle of the Raisin."

A Boone Incident.

Judge Flanagan also told an anecdote about Daniel Boone. "One of Daniel Boone's daughters married a Scholl, who founded Schollsville in this county. They had a son, Septimus Scholl, whom I knew as a boy, and who later moved to Jackson county, Missouri, after he was sixty years of age. Another daughter of Boone's married Nathaniel Gore, of Clark county, who afterwards moved to Estill, where his descendants still live.

"Daniel Boone came to this place in 1798 to visit the Gores at Schollsville, before emigrating to Missouri. He came to Winchester with Septimus, who was then a small lad. Before leaving home the mother of Septimus gave him 75 cents, telling him to bring her a pound of coffee for it. The sights of the village so engrossed the attention of Septimus that he forgot to make the purchase and when about a mile from town on the Red river road, returning home with his grandfather, Daniel Boone, the latter asked: "Did you get the coffee your mother told you to buy?"

"In reply Septimus said, "Oh Grandfather, I clear forgot it."

"Then, said Daniel, run back and get it and I will lie down here on the grass until you return."

"Septimus hurried back, purchased the coffee and soon rejoined his grandfather, when they continued on to the Scholl house."

In conclusion Judge Flanagan said: "Boone had 500 acres of land on Jouett's creek, in the west part of Clark or "The Neck" not far from Athens. He sold it for a song, He also had 1,000 acres near Schollsville, but lost it through proof of a prior claim."

Other Sons of Peter Flanagan.

Dr. George Flanagan was a man of rare genius. He attended lectures at Transylvania Medical College under Drs. Dudley Caldwell and other distinguished disciples of Esculapius whose learning and deeds helped to wreath a halo of glory around old Transylvania. After graduation he emigrated to Lawrenceville, Ill., where he practiced medicine for four years. He also served as surgeon of Illinois troops in the Black Hawk war in which Abraham Lincoln commanded a company of militia. Returning to Kentucky, he practiced awhile in Clark county and then removed to Chicot, Arkansas, where he died in 1836.

First Mill at Winchester.

James Flanagan, eldest son of Peter Flanagan, built a horse mill at Winchester in the year 1800. It was the first mill in the village and did all the grinding for the people of Winchester and immediate vicinity. Before its erection the people had to go some distance from their homes, to the water mills of Hornbeck, on Strode's creek, Judy's and Brandenburg's, on Stoner, and Owens' on Four Mile Creek. James was an enterprising young man, and it was not long until all the Winchester grist was his.

The Hornbecks.

Judge Flanagan, as a boy, knew Hornbeck, owner of the mill on Strode's Creek, which was built about 1785. They had settled on Strode's in 1780. The elder Hornbeck was owner of the mill. His brother had several pretty, bare-footed daughters. In those days, it may be remarked, great numbers of the women and girls went barefooted in the spring and summer, for shoes were not as plentiful then, nor as easy to get, as they are now. The elder Hornbeck was a Pennsylvania Dutchman and spoke very broken English. He had several sons and two grandsons named William and Anthony. The latter was a wagoner. His brother William, a wild, rollicking fellow, died in the Bourbon county poor house. In the same room was lying Fount Hunter, and just before their deaths, which occurred about the same time, they lay in opposite beds cursing each other.

William Flanagan.

Another son of Peter was William Flanagan, who was twice appointed postmaster of Winchester. The office there was established in 1792, the year that Kentucky entered the Union. The first Postmaster was Edmund Calloway, who also kept a tavern where John Key's store now stands. The building was burned in 1818. Calloway later moved to Russellville, Ky., and died there. He was succeeded in 1810 by Mordecai Gist. In 1842 William Flanagan was appointed postmaster. He had graduated at West Point, in the same class with Bishop and Lieut. Gen. Leonidas Polk, Confederate army, killed in 1864 at Pine Mountain, Ga. After graduation William was appointed First Lieutenant in the regular army. For twenty-five years, after leaving the army, he was County Surveyor of Clark, and was noted for his wonderful proficiency in mathematics, often solving difficult problems by mental process alone. When James K. Polk became President he superseded William Flanagan in 1847 with Major John Taliaferro. Two years later Flanagan was put back in the office by Polk's successor, and held on until 1851. During his incumbency his brother, Judge James Flanagan, was his deputy and performed most of the duties of the office.

Peter Flanagan.

Peter Flanagan, father of Judge Flanagan was appointed by President Madison in 1815 as Collector of Revenue for the Winchester district, which extended as far as the big Sandy river. This appointment was made on the recommendation of Governor Jas. Clark, a native of Clark county, then a member of Congress from the district. But Peter declined the office, and on the organization of the Commonwealth's Bank of Kentucky, with a branch in each judicial district of the State, Peter was made cashier of the Winchester branch. John J. Crittenden, one of the principal officers of the Commonwealth Bank, reposed great confidence in Peter Flanagan, whom he used to say "the most upright man he ever knew." Peter retained the cashier-ship until the Commonwealth's Bank went into liquidation in 1832.

The Flanagan Tavern.

When the town of Winchester was surveyed and laid off on its present plan in 1801, Peter Flanagan was granted lot No. 67. In 1801 he built on it a two story log house and opened in it a tavern, the first one in the town. It was burned some years later and in 1818 Hon. Chilton Allen erected on the site a large brick hotel that until recently was known as the Rees House. It was torn down two years ago to give place to the present splendid hotel building now nearly completed.

After Chilton Allen built the brick house it was kept by a man named Dudley and was known as the Dudley House. In 1822 Hay Toliver purchased the house and it became the Toliver House. In 1835 Toliver died and Peter Flanagan again became owner of the lot and the brick hotel on it. It was then again named the Flanagan Hotel. Peter ran the house for thirteen years and after his death the family conducted it selling it in 1850 to Rufus Lisle, who conducted it for some years, and was also engaged in other lines of business. About 1854 Lisle sold the hotel to Robert E. Bush, it passed through several other hands until Major Wm. E. Rees bought it and conducted it for twenty years. After his death it was leased by W. H. Bosworth, of Lexington, who ran it until the erection of the present fine building was decided on.

The Warwick Family.

This family, connected by intermarriage with the Flanagans, was also prominent in its day and generation. As stated above, Capt. Jacob Warwick fell gallantly fighting at Tippecanoe in 1811. Beside him, with their companies touching flanks, also fell Capt. Spier Spencer, another brave Kentuckian, who, after being twice shot and prostrated, rose on one elbow, cheered on his men and receiving another ball from the savages, fell dead. For him were named the counties of Spencer in both Kentucky and Indiana. Like Warwick, he had emigrated to Indiana before the war.

John Warwick (the father of Ruth, Judge Flanagan's mother, and also of Capt. Warwick, emigrated to Kentucky from Bath county Virginia, in 1788, settling on 500 acres of land near Bryan's Station, on which is "Warwick's Cave," on North Elkhorn. The land was a few years ago owned by Edward Darnaby. John Warwick served in the Virginia militia under Washington during the French and Indian war. He was in Braddock's defeat in 1755. He had two sons and six daughters, viz.:

Mary, who first married \_\_\_\_ Hamilton, and then Basil Brown, of Indianapolis.

Eleanor, who married James Flanagan, Sr.

Margaret, who married James Flanagan.

Anna, who married \_\_\_\_\_ McClure, of Princeton, Ind.

Elizabeth, who married, \_\_\_\_\_ Montgomery, of Clark county, and settled in Gibson county, Ind.

Lucy, who also married a Montgomery, brother of Elizabeth's husband.

Capt. Jacob Warwick, was born in Bath county, Virginia, in 1772, and came with his father to Kentucky. He went to school in Fayette to James Smith, a famous teacher of that day. His father, John Warwick, died in 1801. In 1808 the family led by Jacob, emigrated to Gibson county, Ind. In 1811 Jacob raised a company in that county and joined Harrison at Tippecanoe.

The Warwicks owned a good deal of land in Kentucky, including Warwick's Landing, on the Kentucky, near which they laid off the town of Warwick, but which never materialized beyond a nice looking map. Warwick's Landing was on the south side of the Kentucky, in Garrard county, on the road from Lexington to Lancaster.

"Judge James Flanagan celebrated his eighty-fifth birthday Thursday and received congratulations of his numerous friends. He is very active for one of his age, and appears every morning in court during motion hours. He and Judge F. C. Burnam and J. W. Caperton, of Richmond, are perhaps the oldest lawyers engaged in practice in Kentucky, and are entitled to that honor in this, the Twenty-Fifth Judicial Circuit, Judge Flanagan being the oldest of the three.

Judge Flanagan was born in Winchester, as he expresses it, "an unworthy son of an honored sire," and has spent his life here. He remembers Henry Clay quite well and says of Clay that he was the most powerful speaker he ever heard, and is chock full of reminiscences of celebrities long dead. He is a staunch Democrat, though putting principle before party. He is very fond of the Herald, and this fondness is heightened by his remembrances of Colonel Breckinridge, who gave The Herald its reputation.

Judge Flanagan attributes his strength and long life to abstemious habits and good care of his health. He has never used liquor to excess and stopped using tobacco in any form twenty-five years ago. His has been an honorable old age, of which he may be justly proud."

Passing of Judge Flanagan

Winchesters oldest native citizen goes to his eternal rest.

After making a brave but unsuccessful fight for life, Judge James Flanagan died about 2:30 o'clock Friday afternoon from the effects of a fall received February Court Day. The end came peacefully, and was not unexpected, but still it came as a shock to his many friends. The esteem in which he was held was attested by the crowd which repaired to the Methodist Church Sunday afternoon where the funeral services were held. These services were conducted by Rev. J. R. Savage and Eld. J. W. Harding and the remains were buried in the Winchester cemetery under the auspices of Hickman Lodge of Odd Fellows of which he was the oldest member. In the death of Judge James Flanagan probably the most remarkable citizen of Winchester has passed away. Born in

	<p>September 1820 he was in the eighty-sixth year of his age. Born in this city, and with a memory most tenacious, he was a living epitome of local history. Possessed of an excellent constitution he pursued the calm and even tenor of his way finding interest and pleasure in the affairs of life and greatly interested in the success and growth of his native town, even until his life was cut short in his old age by an accident. He was a splendid specimen of the old school Kentucky gentleman. Dignified and polite in his intercourse with men, and like a knight of old held women in highest reverence. He was endowed with a keen sense of humor and the kindest of hearts and was one of a type that is fast passing away. As a lawyer he was contemporary with James Simpson, Chilton Allen, James Clark, John B. Juston, Charles Eginton, Samuel Hanson and others of the Winchester bar, when it was acknowledged to be the strongest bar in the State. He was a friend and admirer of Henry Clar, whom he thought one of the greatest men the world has ever produced. He came of Irish ancestrey, his grandfather, Hugh Flanagan, having come from Ireland to Maryland, where he died in 1818, aged ninety-seven years. He was a Catholic and settled in the Catholic colony of Lord Baltimore. He left seven sons and three daughters. Three of these sons came to Kentucky, married three sisters, Misses Warrick, sisters of Capt. Warrick, a famous man in the early history of Kentucky and Indiana and who was killed in 1811 at the battle of Tippecanoe. James and John Flanagan each located four hundred acres near the town, a part of these farms being now in the city limits. Peter located in the town, which was then but five years old and consisted of a few log huts. His lot was number 67 and on it he built a two story log house and opened a tavern, the first one in town. This was in 1804. It was burned a few years later in 1818. Hon. Chilton Allen built the brick hotel known after as the Rees House and which was torn down a few years ago to build the magnificent Brown-Proctoria. The children of Peter Flanagan were Eliza, born in 1804, died in infancy; William, born in 1805, died in 1851; George, a physician, born in 1807 died in 1836; Catherine, born in 1809, married John Whitehead, of this town and died in 1848; James, the subject of this sketch, was born in 1820. January 4, 1860, he married Miss Susan Wilson, who died in 1890. She was a woman of much talent and exalted character and was a niece of former United States Senator, Garrett Davis, Mary Flanagan, a younger sister, of Judge Flanagan, was born in 1824 and in 1846 she married Charles Poston, of this city. To James and Susan Flanagan were born two children, a daughter who died in infancy, and George, who was born in 1862 and who died in Montgomery, Alabama in 1902. Judge Flanagan was educated in Winchester Academy, which was quite a good school in its day and commenced the battle of life as a clerk in the dry goods store of Simpson &amp; Whitehead. He remained there seven years and was then made Deputy Postmaster under his brother, William, the office being in the Flanagan Hotel. He then read law under John B. Huston and was admitted to the bar in 1857. For nearly forty years he practiced in this city and acquired a comfortable competence. His strong position in the affections of the people was shown by his election to office several times. In 1857 he was chosen a Magistrate under the new Constitution; he was City Attorney for eight years and twice chosen as County Attorney. In 1894 he was elected to the Legislature to fill a vacancy caused by the resignation of Judge Beckner, and in 1883 was appointed Circuit Judge by Governor Blackburn to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Judge Ben Buckner. In 1866 he was appointed United States District Assessor but declined. He was a consistent member of the Methodist Church and was the oldest member of Hickman Lodge, No. 72, of Odd Fellows. A few years ago the veterans badge was bestowed on him for having been a member of the order for more than fifty years. He was a walking encyclopedia of history, especially of local history. An examination showed he had taken most of the strychnine, a large part of the acid and a quantity of the morphine, and had gone to bed and died in a short time. I can't stand it any longer." The coroner's jury brought in a verdict in accordance with these facts. Joe Clinkenbeard and D. Gordon, formerly of this city, were members of the jury. Frazier was tried in the Circuit court and given five years in the penitentiary for taking a gold watch, chain and pair of cuff buttons from Miss Carrie Lee Warner, and appropriating them to his own use. Frazier was the best dressed man in the court room and seemed among the least concerned during the trial. After conviction he chatted freely with those around him and did not seem in the least cast down. That afternoon he threw a quarter out of the window to Geo. Mason, a colored trusty, with directions to get him a cigar and a dime's worth of carbolic acid, which he desired to use for external purposes. Shortly after eight o'clock Jailer Mullins heard screams of agony from the jail and found that Frazier had taken the drug. Medical aid was summoned but he was already unconscious and died in about an hour from the time of taking the drug. The next morning Coroner Nunnolley was notified and held an inquest with the following jury, T.G. Barrow, J.A. Bishop, J.A. Gills, Geo. H. Fox, J.W. Chambers, and Frank Gordon, who, after hearing the testimony brought in a verdict of suicide. He was a member of a highly respectable family at Owensboro where his parents and several brothers and sisters reside. He was but twenty nine years of age but was already a hardened criminal. He had served one term in the Eddyville penitentiary for safe blowing and another for grand larceny. Some months ago he opened an office here for pressing men's suits, issuing tickets at one dollar each which would entitle the holder to have his suit pressed for a definite time. He collected quite a sum in this manner, borrowed Miss Warner's watch and left. After several weeks Chief of Police McCord located him in Louisville where he was arrested and brought here. It is claimed that he had four living wives from none of whom had he ever procured a divorce. One of them who lives at Georgetown, was here and testified against him. When he left here he took with him a suit or two which had been entrusted to his care. He then went to Warsaw, Indiana, where he did the same thing. In fact, he was wanted in various places for swindling various people, and there was enough charges against him to keep him in prison many years if they had been pressed. When arrested he had several stolen suits. One which cost forty dollars was sold for four dollars, the owner being a couple of days too late to claim it. The suit in which he was buried is also claimed to have been stolen. His people at Owensboro were communicated with after his death but didn't wish to incur the expense of sending the body to that point and it was buried at the county farm. She was famed for palpating cows in her Lilly Pulitzer pants (Mom was in the pants, not the cows).</p> <p>She learned to fly an airplane, mainly so she could remind Gene authoritatively that aerobatics were not allowed when she was on board.</p> <p>She was very smart, but never let on that she knew as much as she did.</p> <p>She enjoyed birdwatching, riding horses and fox-hunting, her work at Ashland Garden, Keeneland, and UK basketball and football.</p> <p>She was very proud of her children and grandchildren and pushed them to work hard and build something great.</p> <p>Talitha was tough as nails. She never complained about anything. She was a breast cancer survivor. She had metal plates in both her arm and leg where her horse trampled her, enabling her to entertain many at airport security.</p> <p>Cooking was not a passion of hers. Her children looked forward to TV dinners and crock pot mush so they could dodge some of her half-baked creations like corn pudding without corn, fresh lemonade without sugar, and farm-to-table salad made from thistles and ragweed when she couldn't find the lettuce.</p> <p>She loved anything novel or exciting. On the rare occasions when she couldn't do things herself, she would engage her children, once shaming them into skydiving one weekend, and then signing them up for hang gliding the next.</p> <p>Talitha diligently supported The Freeman Corporation, a manufacturing company in Winchester. In the late eighties and early nineties, she worked there full time. Her non-stop energy and unshakably happy outlook was and is still a blessing to the company. As in her other activities, Talitha's motto at the company was "never, never quit". We learned it then and follow it today. Many there grew to know her well.</p> <p>Since her sons managed the company (they still do), Talitha was given in the factory the general nickname "Mom". Fremont, John C.	<p>One of the most interesting characters in American history is Gen. John C. Fremont. He was born in 1813 and died in 1890. He was a native of Georgia and a graduate of Charleston College, Charleston South Carolina and was a professor of mathematics. In 1839 he was commissioned lieutenant of engineers in the army.</p> <p>He explored in 1842 a portion of the Rocky mountains. The two following years he devoted to an exploration of Utah. In 1846 he took part in the Bear Flag war in California. Some aggrieved American settlers in California rose against Mexico, seized Sonoma and raised a flag bearing the figure of a bear. A republic was proclaimed and a Mexican force defeated. Capt. Fremont joined the insurgents with a body of American troops under his command. He was court-martialed for disobedience to Gen. Kearney, and was found guilty, but the penalty of dismissal from the service was remitted by President Polk.</p> <p>From 1848 to 1854 he explored the territory that is now known as New Mexico, extending explorations as far as Sacramento, California. He was the first to bring to our knowledge the vast resources of the western country.</p> <p>In 1850 he was elected United States Senator from California. While he was a Southerner by birth and education he was opposed to the extension of slavery. In 1856 he was nominated for the Presidency by the republication convention that met in Philadelphia. This was the first national convention held by the republican party. The popular vote was Buchanan, 1,838,169; Fremont, 1,341,264; Bell, 874, 538. The electoral vote was; Buchanan, 174; Fremont, 114; Bell, 8. When the Civil War began Fremont was made Major General and assigned to the western department with headquarters at St. Louis, where he, without authority from the government, issued a proclamation freeing all slaves in his territory. He was recalled and given a command in the east. Becoming dissatisfied with Gen. Pope, the commanding general, he resigned his commission.</p> <p>In 1864 the radical wing of the republican party was dissatisfied with the conservative policies of President Lincoln. They held a convention at Cleveland, Ohio, and nominated Fremont for President, but he declined in favor of Lincoln. For several years after the war Fremont devoted himself to promoting railroad enterprises, spending much of his time in foreign countries. From 1878 to 1881, he was Governor of Arizona. In May, 1890, Congress placed him on the retired list with the rank of Major General. Gen. Fremont wrote a number of books that are of great historical value. On October 19, 1841, he was secretly married to Jessie, the daughter of United States Senator Thos.</p>

He studied at Georgetown college, took the law course of old Transylvania and began the practice of law at Owingsville. On arriving at early manhood and having studied the profession of the law, he chose Winchester as the field of his professional labor. Dick French, as he was familiarly called, so far won the confidence and esteem of the public generally that he came to be regarded as the embodiment of the soul of honor and integrity and manliness in its noblest form. He had a clear, quick apprehension of men and of the spirit of the times, so that he became very deservedly popular as a lawyer, securing a large patronage, and being disposed to engage in political life, he was first elected to the State Legislature, and afterward

	<p>served three terms as a representative in Congress. He was an eloquent speaker and an adroit ready debater. Judge French married a daughter of Hay Taliaferro, a noble specimen of the old Virginia stock. He had the honor and pleasure of rearing a family upon which they left their own impress in all that was essential to an elevated and honorable life. Judge French read law under Hon. Samuel Hanson. He died in 1854 in the 63 year of his age. Prior to 1840, Winchester furnished to the Judicial district, composed of the counties of Bourbon, Clark, Estill and Madison, three of its judges, viz; Clark, French and Simpson. Hon. Garrett Davis, one of the visiting lawyers who appeared frequently in the Clark Circuit Court, was a great lawyer-possessed of great force, intellectuality and learning, and was a statesman of national reputation. He was one of the last great men from the south left in the Senate after the close of the civil war. Mrs. French, nee Calloway, was sent for and with other survivors of the fort community was to be the lion of the hour. When she reached the Clark side of the river, a deputation of citizens and a military guard of honor were sent to escort her across. As they got into the boat, an old negress who had also been an inmate of the fort and who was Mrs. French's maid on that day, broke out crying.</p> <p>"What in the world are you crying for, Dolly?" said her mistress.</p> <p>"Why, Mistis, all dem soljers and folks over there looks 'zactly like it did when the British and Injuns come to take de fort. Friedman, Louis	Found Dead Louis Friedman Found in the Cemetery With a Bullet in His Brain Sadie Aldridge Charged With the Crime Our city is so free from crime and it is so seldom that a tragedy occurs here that the taking of a human life excites more interest than it does in places where those things are more frequent. Hence everybody has been talking of Louis Friedman’s death, although comparatively few of our people knew that such a man had lived here for years. He and his brother, Wolff Friedman, kept a small store on North Main street and after the close of business Friday evening Louis Friedman put the key of the store in his pocket and went to the Postoffice. This was the last seen of him alive. The next morning as he did not return his brother instituted a search for him but without avail. He telegraphed to Richmond where he formerly lived, but he had not been there. Inquiry at the railway offices developed the fact that he had bought no ticket. He was not given to dissipation and had no haunts that he was likely to frequent. The morning wore away and nothing was heard from him. Perplexity grew into fear and the worst was realized when Will Gilkey, a colored man, going from his work in the cemetery to his dinner in Poynterville, discovered the dead body of a man in the back part of the cemetery near a thicket. He gave the alarm and upon investigation the body was found to be the missing Friedman. He was lying on his back, his right hand by his side and his left resting on his breast, in the left temple was a small hole showing where the deadly bullet entered. His face was peaceful and his limbs were not contorted, showing that death was instantaneous. The wound and the flesh around it were blackened with powder showing the weapon was fired at short range. His coat was spread under him. His clothing was unfastened and his person exposed in an indecent manner. His hat was found some distance away; his watch, jewelry, and a small amount of money was found on his person. He was about 23 years of age, a native of Russia-Poland, and with his brother Wolff came to this country six years ago. They lived in Richmond a couple of years and have been here about the same length of time. While in Richmond he formed an illicit connection with Sadie Aldridge, and after he came here, she followed and the relations were kept up. As a fruit of this liaison a child was born, which is dead. He was to have been married in a few weeks to a Jewess of Cincinnati, to which Miss Aldridge was violently opposed, and told Mrs. Wolff Friedman that before it should come to pass that she would kill him and then herself. Other circumstances point to her as the author of the crime and she was arrested and put in jail. She is about twenty-five or thirty years of age and is a daughter of George Aldridge of Montgomery county. She is a grand-daughter of Dick Aldridge who formerly lived in this county. Coroner Alexander impaneled a jury Saturday, but adjourned the inquest until Monday. The inquest brought out but few material facts except that the last time he was seen alive was when he went to her home. The jury was composed of Jas. Ecton, Sid Shepherd, R. P. Scobee, J. N. Case, J. H. Farney and G. M. Goosey, who brought in a verdict of death at the hands of some person unknown. The remains of the murdered man were taken to Cincinnati for interment. The Winchester Democrat, Tuesday, July 3, 1894  Trial of Sadie Aldridge The taking of a human life excites a deep though morbid curiosity, and all day yesterday the court house was thronged with a crowd that seethed and sweated through the dreary details of illicit love and that sin the wages of which is death—in this instance literal, physical death. The testimony of a number of witnesses were not material, and of the others merely corroborative and circumstantial. Sadie Aldridge, who was accused of the murder of Louis Friedman testified to the long time she had been the mistress of the dead man, and that he had spoken to her of suicide. She denied everything but what was proven by the other side. When first arrested she told conflicting tales, and her story then is known to be false in many details. Friedman was never seen alive after he entered her house. Mrs. Wolff Friedman, the principal witness for the prosecution, manifested a

	<p>disposition toward the prisoner as vicious as a Viper, and evidently would secure her conviction at any cost. She testified that she expected to find him dead in the cemetery, and that she expected the prisoner had killed him. The prisoner showed little emotion when informed of his death, and the prosecuting witnesses little more. The police who have investigated the matter are certain, from all the circumstances that Friedman was killed by his mistress after she found he was determined to marry the Cincinnati woman.
