The Winchester Democrat Friday, June 11, 1909 Met fate of father Former Sheriff Callahan, of Breathitt, laid low by assassin's gun Bullet passed through body Son and brother marked for similar finish, but escaped amid rain of shot – Ambushing party defies capture by posse Jackson, Ky., June 8 – Another epoch in the internecine warfare of Breathitt county was marked Monday at Crockettville by the shooting of former Sheriff Ed Callahan, famous because of the part he played in the bloody feuds of the district. Callahan met the fate of his father. The former sheriff was shot from ambush at 6 o'clock Monday morning, when he stood at the front door of his little store at Crockettville, conversing with his brother, Green Callahan. A steel bullet from a repeating rifle passed entirely through his abdomen, inflicting a wound which is pronounced fatal. His brother dodged into the store and was not hit. Callahan's son, William Callahan, escaped with his life by the closest margin. When fire was opened upon the elder Callahan – some say from a clump of trees about 200 yards distant, while others say from behind a huge pile of coal – at least two of the feudists directed bullets at the son, who was near the barn. With a yell of terror young Callahan jumped between a fence and the ambushing party and started for cover in the house, which is near the store, but before he reached it a steel bullet tore through his hair and carried his hat 30 feet away from him. However, he was not harmed, and he reached the store in safety. The assassins had sought to kill Callahan, his son and his brother Green, threats to that effect having been numerous of

	<p>late. When bending over his brother immediately after the latter had fallen. Green Callahan saw two men run from an old coal mine, but he steadfastly refuses to tell the authorities whether or not he recognized either one. "Remarkable bravery was shown by Mrs. Callahan." Said a witness of the shooting. "Hardly had the firing ceased when she ran out of the house and to the store, where she tried to stanch the flow of blood from her husband's wound, but fainted." "The store had been splintered in a score of places by bullets." A messenger rode at neck-break speed to Ekatawa, a distance of 25 miles, but the nearest telegraph station, to wire to Lexington for blood hounds. Seven hours later the Lexington man-hunters were on the trail of the assassins, but no captures had been made at a late hour Monday night.</p> <p>The Winchester Democrat Friday, June 11, 1909</p> <p>Callahan will recover</p> <p>Noted Breathitt feudist on the road to recovery – Lively times promised in near future</p> <p>Ed Callahan, the noted Breathitt feudist, will recover from the effects of his wounds, and there promises to be lively times in that county in the near future. An associated press dispatch Sunday from Jackson says: "Sam Callahan called up Commonwealth's Attorney Kelley Kash over the long distance telephone from Crockettville and informed him that his brother, Ed, desired that the investigation in regard to his shooting be postponed until he had a chance to assist in the investigation. Callahan's physicians have now given him pretty full assurance that he will recover from his wound, and it is for this reason that he wants the special grand jury discharged. Mr. Kash and Judge Adams held a short consultation this morning and determined to proceed with the investigation. Both the Judge and the Commonwealth's Attorney agree that the rights of the public require an immediate inquiry and that the best interests of the community cannot be subserved by acceding to the wishes of one man or set of men. Callahan-Strong feud	<p>Died With His Boots On.</p> <p>A few weeks ago we chronicled what was supposed and hoped to be the closing act in the feud which had long existed in Breathitt county between the Strong and Callahan clans. Both parties went to the county seat fully armed and prepared for blood. At the solicitation of mutual friends the leaders shook hands and agreed to live in peace and the members of the two bands rode home together in seeming amity and good fellowship. The hopes that this would end the scenes of bloodshed and assassination which have disgraced the fair name of Breathitt county seemed well founded, but proved to be illusive.</p> <p>Sunday morning Capt. Bill Strong, the leader of that faction left his home about ten miles east of Jackson, to visit a neighbor. He had gone about half a mile when his family heard firing and ran to see what was the matter. He was found dead in the road seven bullets having entered his body. Investigation showed that seven or eight men had lain behind a "blind" construction to command a view of the road, and scraps of bread and meat showed that they had lain for him.</p> <p>He has a very large circle of friends and relatives who will avenge his death and more trouble is expected.</p> <p>He was quite wealthy, owning two farms and a half interest in very fine cannel coal lands. He is credited with having killed a score or more of men in various feuds with which he has been connected. Callahan met the fate of his father. The former sheriff was shot from ambush at 6 o'clock Monday morning, when he stood at the front door of his little store at Crockettville, conversing with his brother, Green Callahan. A steel bullet from a repeating rifle passed entirely through his abdomen, inflicting a wound which is pronounced fatal. His brother dodged into the store and was not hit. Callahan's son, William Callahan, escaped with his life by the closest margin. When fire was opened upon the elder Callahan – some say from a clump of trees about 200 yards distant, while others say from behind a huge pile of coal – at least two of the feudists directed bullets at the son, who was near the barn. With a yell of terror young Callahan jumped between a fence and the ambushing party and started for cover in the house, which is near the store, but before he reached it a steel bullet tore through his hair and carried his hat 30 feet away from him. However, he was not harmed, and he reached the store in safety. The assassins had sought to kill Callahan, his son and his brother Green, threats to that effect having been numerous of late. When bending over his brother immediately after the latter had fallen. Green Callahan saw two men run from an old coal mine, but he steadfastly refuses to tell the authorities whether or not he recognized either one. "Remarkable bravery was shown by Mrs. Callahan." Said a witness of the shooting. "Hardly had the firing ceased when she ran out of the house and to the store, where she tried to stanch the flow of blood from her husband's wound, but fainted." "The store had been splintered in a score of places by bullets." A messenger rode at neck-break speed to Ekatawa, a distance of 25 miles, but the nearest telegraph station, to wire to Lexington for blood hounds. Seven hours later the Lexington man-hunters were on the trail of the assassins, but no captures had been made at a late hour Monday night. Callahan's physicians have now given him pretty full assurance that he will recover from his wound, and it is for this reason that he wants the special grand jury discharged. Mr. Kash and Judge Adams held a short consultation this morning and determined to proceed with the investigation. Both the Judge and the Commonwealth's Attorney agree that the rights of the public require an immediate inquiry and that the best interests of the community cannot be subserved by acceding to the wishes of one man or set of men. "Dr. Abshear, of Booneville, Ky., one of the physicians who has been in attendance on Callahan, arrived here late last night and reported that all the physicians who had been in consultation on the case had finally determined that the shot had not penetrated the cavity and that there was little doubt of his recovery." To the latter a daughter named Miriam, after her grandmother. She married W. Z. Eubank and died a number of years ago leaving three sons.</p> <p>During all this time nothing had been done looking into the interpretation of the seemingly contradictory clauses of the old Calmes will and about eight years ago Mr. Eubank's brought suit on behalf of his children to have the will construed and quite the title to his children's property. The Circuit Court decided in their favor, none of the opposing heirs being before the court.</p> <p>Spencer Calmes, the son of Marquis Calmes, who was mentioned in his will went to Missouri and died there almost half a century ago, and his heirs are scattered all over the country from Maine to California. In cases similar to this suit brought by Mr. Eubank, five years are allowed for persons with opposing interests may take action. Nothing was heard of these descendants of Spencer Calmes until this time had nearly expired. As Thomas Eastin, the last child of Miriam Calmes Eastin, had died in the meantime they brought suit for the property claiming that under the will it should revert to the heirs of Spencer Calmes. Marquis Calmes was evidently not a scholar and had used words in his will with the full meaning of which he evidently was not familiar, and the work of the court was to say what he did mean. This the higher court has decided as meaning that the descendants of Miriam Calmes should have a fee simple title to the property.</p> <p>This property is very valuable. He was the eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Waller Calmes, who with one brother, Waller, Jr., and two sisters, Mrs. Lee S. Baldwin and Miss Alice Calmes, survive. For many years Mr. Calmes had battled with an incurable malady and for several weeks past his condition was extremely critical. But, through it all, with a Christian fortitude that was truly edifying, he bore his sufferings and calmly awaited the final summons. His family and friends left nothing undone that would conduce to his comfort and happiness, and he repaid their kind efforts by a gentle appreciation that was both touching and beautiful. While quiet and retiring in manner, he was frequently called to fill public positions. He had been Deputy Sheriff, United States Marshal, Chief of Police and City collector, which latter position he was filling for the second term at the time of his demise. In each of these positions he performed his duties in a manner satisfactory and well. The funeral was held at the First Christian church Saturday afternoon at two o'clock, services being conducted by Rev. J.H. MacNeill and Rev. Wm. Seventy years ago there lived a man in Woodford county Marquis Calmes, who came originally from North Carolina. At his death in 1828 his will was probated. It was written by himself and provided that certain lands in Clark county should be given to his daughter, Miriam, who had married a man named Eastin. At her death it was to go to her children, with revision to Spencer Calmes, the son of the testator, who was charged with the duty to see that this property was settled upon by Miriam Eastin and children as the testator declared his intention should be done.</p> <p>To Miriam Eastin four children were born, Columbus, Mark, and Thomas Eastin and Pricilla, who afterward married a Weaver. To the latter a daughter named Miriam, after her grandmother. She married W. Z. Eubank and died a number of years ago leaving three sons.</p> <p>During all this time nothing had been done looking into the interpretation of the seemingly contradictory clauses of the old Calmes will and about eight years ago Mr. Eubank's brought suit in behalf of his children to have the will construed and quite the title to his children's property. The Circuit Court decided in their favor, none of the opposing heirs being before the court.</p> <p>Spencer Calmes, the son of Marquis Calmes, who was mentioned in his will went to Missouri and died there almost half a century ago, and his heirs are scattered all over the country from Maine to California. In cases similar to this suit brought by Mr. Eubank, five years are allowed for persons with opposing interests may take action. Nothing was heard of these descendants of Spencer Calmes until this time had nearly expired. As Thomas Eastin, the last child of Miriam Calmes Eastin, had died in the meantime they brought suit for the property claiming that under the will it should revert to the heirs of Spencer Calmes. Marquis Calmes was evidently not a scholar and had used words in his will with the full meaning of which he evidently was not familiar, and the work of the court was to say that he did mean. This the higher court has decided as meaning that the descendants of Miriam Calmes should have a fee simple title to the property.</p> <p>This property is very valuable. Campbell touched the lives of thousands of students during his 31-year career, first at GRC, then later at East and North Hardin High schools. He also served as interim director of the University of Louisville Symphonic Band from 2008 to 2009, and after retiring in 2006, founded and conducted The Heartland Winds ensemble in 2007 because he “felt like something was missing in the community.” In an effort to keep his friends and former students informed of his condition during his illness, Campbell’s family created a profile on carepages.com. Wellwishers flooded the page, with heartfelt prayers, poems and support for Campbell and his family during his illness. After his passing, someone started an “I miss Chuck Campbell” page on the social network Facebook, where hundreds have posted their fondest memories of Campbell and how he inspired them through his love and passion for music and his students. “As a band director myself, I have spent the better part of my professional career trying to figure out how Mr. C. motivated not just the band students he worked with, but the parents and communities in which he worked. I’m still trying to understand this riddle, as I have never seen it happen anywhere else. His accomplishments were and still are extortionary,” John Laverty posted. Laverty added that he knew how life-altering a teacher can be, and that because of Campbell’s influence, he would work harder than ever to help his students understand how that is possible. Former GRC color guard member Elizabeth Gabbert said Campbell motivated and inspired people to reach heights they never thought they could. “Mr. Campbell motivated all of us to be perfect — no mistakes. Anything else was unacceptable. He was strict, but allowed us to show our individual ideas and put</p>

		<p>them into the show. The feeling when 200 members were marching as one is unexplainable,” Gabbert said. “He taught us discipline, working together as a team, that working hard has its reward and to have courage to achieve an idea, and we took those lessons on with us into adulthood.” She also said she didn’t really know just how far-reaching Campbell’s influence had been throughout the state until she read some of the comments on the Facebook page. Cathy Johnson may have summed up the feelings of the majority of Campbell’s former students with the following post.</p> <p>“Thousands of books have been written over the years about leadership. Yet few leaders or coaches are able to motivate and influence people like Mr. C. did. He scared us to death by threatening to sideline us, or worse, humiliate us in front of our peers, yet we recall him fondly because he made us believe in ourselves and accomplish performances that still amaze us today. Most of us did not follow him into music careers, yet the principles he taught of persistence and the pursuit of excellence have made us all better people, no matter what career path we chose. Thank you, Mr. Campbell. May your reward be in heaven.” Judy Campbell told the Elizabethtown newspaper, The News-Enterprise, that she asked the rest of the family to leave the hospital room before he died so she could read all the letters and notes of support he received. “From about 2 a.m. until they pronounced him gone, that’s what I was doing,” she said. “It’s so neat, don’t you think, that someone gets to see that support while they are still alive?” Campbell’s funeral is scheduled for 5:30 p.m. Wednesday at Glendale Christian Church in Elizabethtown. Canewood	<p>Canewood, The Seat of the Gist Family. By Hon. James Flanagan.</p> <p>In the last part of the eighteenth century, Col. Nathaniel Gist, a soldier of distinction in the Continental Army under General Washington, was granted a military warrant for 7,000 acres of land in Bourbon and Clark counties, Kentucky, for meritorious and gallant services to his country in the war of the Revolution. Col. Nathaniel Gist was the son of Col. Christopher Gist, who accompanied Washington as a guide to Logtown and Fort Duquesne, and saved his life twice on that expedition. He was subsequently killed at Braddock's Defeat, where his son, Nathaniel, was taken prisoner. At the time the warrant was issued about three-fourths of the land was situated in Clark county and the remainder in Bourbon county. Subsequently the line between the counties was changed by an act of the Legislature, and all of the land except a few acres, was placed in Clark. The grant contained some of the finest land upon earth, unsurpassed in fertility of soil, and abundance and quality of timber. Before it was settled it was covered by a dense growth of cane, and such was the luxuriance of the grass, cane and peavine, and the tract contained so many pretty streams of water, that it was a kind of rendezvous for all sorts of game, such as deer, elk, buffalo, wild turkeys, pheasants, etc., and it was a noted hunting ground. The streams abounded in various kinds of fish, and one of the small tributaries to Stoner Creek was considered so beautiful that it was called "Pretty Run."</p> <p>In the year 1793 Col. Gist sold the southern half of the grant to Thomas Lewis, of Fayette county, for 900 pounds in current money. Thomas Lewis was the father of Asa K., Stephen and Thornton Lewis, and Mrs. Green Clay, wife of Gen. Green Clay, of Madison county, and the 3,000 acres conveyed by Col. Gist was known in the early times as the Lewis Territory. The Northern half of the 7,000 was retained by Col. Gist, upon which he erected a house for his residence which he called "Canewood," the name being taken from the character of the land and cane woods. These lands are now owned by Matthew D. Hume's heirs, Eli Bean's heirs, L. B. Cockrell, Thomas Sydner and the heirs of George Owen. Col. Gist settled at Canewood in the early days of the county and established the seat of the Gist family in Kentucky. He died in 1793 and is buried in the family cemetery, now a part of the farm on which Matthew D. Hume lived. He left a widow, Mrs. Judith Gist and the following children: Judith, who married Dr. Joseph Boswell, of Fayette county, Sarah H., who married the Hon. Jesse Bledsoe, of Bourbon county; Maria C., who married the late Benjamin Gratz, of Lexington; Eliza, who married Francis Preston Blair, a daughter who married Capt. Nat Hart, of the River Raisin; Davidella, who died unmarried; Thomas M. Gist and Henry C. Gist. A granddaughter, Judith Ann Bledsoe, married Judge Mason Brown, father of Col. John Mason Brown, of Louisville.</p> <p>When the children came into the possession of this magnificent property they soon sold out their interest in the estate to other people, except Benjamin Gratz, whose wife inherited 177 ½ acres on which Canewood, the old residence was situated. Mrs. Gratz kept the old homestead until 1852, when she sold it to Matthew D. Hume. Martin Sydner bought Davidella's share of the land, where Sydner's famous water mill was built on Stoner Creek now in Clark county. In the establishment of the county in 1792, the site of Sydner's mill was then in Bourbon county, but by an act of the Legislature in 1798, it together with the lands of Evans Wade and others, was attached to Clark county. The descendants of Col. Gist were people of uncommon gifts and attainments and the daughters all married men of ability and learning. Among them was Benjamin Gratz, one of the most respected citizens that ever lived in Lexington, and for whom Gratz Park, in that beautiful city is named.</p> <p>Capt. Nat Hart, a brother of Mrs. Henry Clay, of Ashland, and who was killed at the battle of the River Raisin in the war of 1812, also married a daughter of Col. Gist, of Canewood.</p> <p>Francis Preston Blair was the editor of the Globe, at Washington City for eight years during the administration of Gen. Andrew Jackson and for four years during the administration of Martin Van Buren. He was the father of Francis P. Blair, Jr., who was a Major General in the United States Army in the War of the Rebellion and Montgomery Blair who was Postmaster General under the administration of President Lincoln.</p>

	<p>Jesse Bledsoe was the peer of any lawyer or advocate in the State and was characterized by Henry Clay as the formidable man he ever met at the bar in Kentucky. Dr. Boswell was one of the most eminent men of Lexington in his day, one of whose daughters was the first wife of Gov. Luke P. Blackburn, of Louisville.</p> <p>Judge Mason Brown was an eminent scholar, lawyer and jurist and was the father of the late distinguished John Mason Brown, of the Louisville bar, at one time the leading lawyer in the city of Louisville, and perhaps more learned in law than any man in the State. Col. Gist's sons were men of fine natural endowments, enjoyed the advantages of collegiate education and began life with prospects which bid fair to shed luster upon the escutcheon of their heroic ancestry and were cherished by their friends as a part of the hope and expectancy of the grand old Commonwealth. But they were so unfortunate as to inherit a large estate and yielding to the fascinating seduction of conviviality, they failed to leave that impress which their talents and attainments should have won for them.</p> <p>Col. Gist was buried in the cemetery at Canewood and several years after his death a hickory tree sprang up at the foot of his grave, which in a few years grew to be a very tall tree. It is claimed that this tree was an omen that the descendants should be Democrats and support General Jackson. Accordingly the sons were strong Democrats and ardent supporters of Gen. Jackson, as were the sons-in-law, except Mr. Gratz, who was a Whig. The hickory tree is still standing at the foot of the grave.</p> <p>"Canewood" was the seat of refinement and elegant hospitality, the ideal country home of the olden time. The writer was at Canewood in 1841, before time had wrought her vengeance and demolished this primeval house, surrounded by yard and grounds as lovely as nature in her prodigality could make them, and he remembers no spot upon the earth that has since looked more beautiful to him than did this old time mansion on that glorious morning in June, 1841. The place was then owned by Mrs. Gratz, and the old negroes belonging to Col. Gist, were the only occupants of the premises. It was kept at that time by Mr. Gratz as a summer home, where he would bring his family every year to spend about two months. Flowering plants, rose trees in full bloom, attested, the care once bestowed upon this Eden, and gave play to the imagination to picture the loveliness of the spot where woman's gentle touch mingled with the invisible in helping to adorn a home of man.</p> <p>Mrs. Gist was a woman of great strength of character, and capacity, and must have been a very remarkable woman in every respect to have been the mother of girls, whose hands were sought by the character of men who married them.</p> <p>A few years after the death of Col. Gist his widow intermarried with Gen. Charles Scott, one of the early Governors of Kentucky, and a distinguished soldier in the war of the Revolution. After his marriage with Mrs. Gist, Governor Scott lived at Canewood until his death, which occurred in 1813. He was buried in the family cemetery at Canewood and the Legislature erected a monument over his grave at this place. Subsequently the Legislature removed his remains to Frankfort and interred them there in 1853 or 1854. After his marriage he was frequently a visitor to Winchester, and such was his reputation that he was the cynosure of all eyes, as being one of the survivors of the Revolution and the compatriot of General Washington.</p> <p>He was buried at Canewood with Military honors, the Old Light Infantry Company, composed of the battle-scarred heroes of River Raisin and Dudley's Defeat that had served under Capt. Nathaniel Hart in the war of 1812 coming from Lexington to perform the funeral rites over the dead soldier. Governor Scott is said to have been a very original man, possessed of a great amount of strong sense, and with a discriminating judgement of men and things.</p> <p>He was the author of the famous expression that "The people, when they got wrong had to get damned wrong before they could get right." In his contest before the people for the office of Governor his opponent was a learned man in the law and literature, and one of the best orators of that day. Gen. Scott, in reply to him upon the hustings, upon one occasion, said in his blunt style, that he could make a pretty speech and honey fuggle the people and belonged to that class of politicians, who lick the people's feet before the election and want the people to lick his feet after the election.</p> <p>Canewood with all its beauty and glories has passed away. He was for some time chairman of the Clark County Republican Committee, at one time was the Republican nominee for Commonwealth's Attorney for this judicial district, and was frequently mentioned as a suitable candidate for Congress. When McKinley was elected President he was strongly urged for the Pension Agency of Kentucky. At the time of his death he was United States commissioner. He was twice married. Berkley wanted to go to Jefferson City and surrender himself, and had proceeded as far as Centralia when Mr. Roberts acting under orders arrested him. Berkley will be taken to the penitentiary to-day. This is the end of one of the most famous cases in Missouri and one which has cost the State in criminal fees many thousands of dollars. In the Spring of 1883, mine years ago, Sinnett Berkley killed Martin Carlos in Hallsville, this county. Then came the legal battle to escape the consequences. The case has been tried five times, three times in the same circuit court and twice in the supreme court. On the first trial there was a hung jury. On the second Berkley was given ten years in the penitentiary. He appealed to the supreme court, and secured a new trial. The supreme court ruled that a defendant in a criminal case must be confronted with the witness against him and that even though the testimony of an absent witness was admitted by the state, an affidavit of defendant asking continuances must be granted. In the Berkley case a continuance was asked on the material witness whose actual existence has always been doubtful. The courts decision has been used as a precedent in many other cases. At the third trial, in 1891, Berkley received a sentence of three years in the penitentiary. An appeal was taken and it was asked that the case be reversed because the names of the prosecuting witnesses did not appear on the indictment. The supreme court however, affirmed the decision of the lower court and the sentence stands. — Columbia (Mo.) Herald. D. Haggard. Nearly a score of years ago Willie Carson, of this county, married the only child of Richard Haggard, who had gone from this county to Scott county and who amassed a large fortune. To them were born three children—Bettie, John and Nellie. Mrs. Carson died and Mr. Carson subsequently married Miss Emma Bigby. Shortly after the latter marriage Mr. Carson also died leaving his children heirs to the large fortune of their grandfather who had also died. She claimed that she was shut up and force was freely employed to prevent her from communicating with her stepmother and sister to whom she seemed devotedly attached. She also claimed that she was sent by him to Jas. D. Haggard, of this county—who is a second cousin to prevent her mother and sister from obtaining a knowledge of her whereabouts, and that Mr. Haggard had used all means in his power to prevent her holding communication with them. She also said that every effort had been made to prejudice her against her stepmother but without avail. She alleged that Mr. Haggard had carried her to various places to keep her mother from finding her and had even left church with her before the close of services to prevent detection. She was firm in her desire to be allowed to return to her mother and sister to both of whom she seemed much attached. On the other hand Mr. Haggard claimed that he had received her from her lawful guardian and had taken care of her at his request, that he had been informed and believed that her stepmother was not a proper person to have charge of her; that he had treated her kindly and that in his treatment of her he had done what he thought was best for her welfare. During the progress of the case the interest of the people present was plainly manifested and the decision of Squire Parrish giving her to her stepmother was greeted with much applause. Nellie is a very bright, intelligent little girl and received marked attention from the numerous ladies present. Messers. Haggard and Benton have filed a suit in her behalf against Jas. D. Haggard for \$10,000 and two suits of \$10,000 each in behalf of her and her sister Bettie, against their guardian Jas. B. Finnell of Georgetown. These suits will be tried I this county. J. M. It was claimed that he had been shot by Cassell at the time of the killing, but his legs were so mutilated by the cars that no signs of a bullet wound were found, even if they existed. Catesby Jones Book	<p>An Interesting Book</p> <p>The Richmond (Virginia) Daily Dispatch, of 16th Intity, says: "The distinguished Catesby Jones family are in receipt of a handsome and well-written volume of the history of their family from the pen of Judge Lewis H. Jones, of Winchester, Ky. The book is embellished with the coat of arms of the family and numerous portraits of its family members—men who are distinguished for valor and intellect. It is seldom that THE WINCHESTER DEMOCRAT representative has had the pleasure of perusing a more valuable book of its class than the one alluded to above and entitled "Family History" written by our talented young townsman, Judge L. H. Jones, and published by Munsell's Sons, Albany, N. Y. The typographical make-up of the volume is at once handsome and elegant. Fine heliotype portraits adorn the work and its composition is in every way credible, alike to the head and heart of the author, who has spent much time and labor upon it during the past decade. With him it was a labor of love and without hope o compensation. No attempt is made to excel the author's family in fulsome fashion, and the book is pervaded with modest merit throughout. The spirit in which the work was done is well worthy of emulation and many more such family histories would add greatly to the historical annals of our county and State. The work begins with a history of Capt. Roger Jones, founder of the family in Virginia, who came to this colony with Lord Culpepper in 1680 and died in London in 1703. The volume then brings the family down to the present generation, the first settler of the name in Clark being Thomas A. Jones, who built the old homestead on the Combs Ferry pike in 1810 and died there in 1848. Among the portraits is an elegant cabinet sized-likeness of General Walter Jones, the great lawyer of Washington City who died in 1861. Of him Bishop Pinckney, of Maryland, says: "His mind was singularly clear to the last and a more remarkable mind was never incased in a frail mortal body. I had often been spellbound by his majestic eloquence, the vigor and scope of his logic and the breath and compass of his imagination over which there were constantly playing the flashes of a wit that nothing could resist. I considered him one of the first of the mental giants of his day—the last link in the chain of mental greatness that bound us to a greater age. He united in a wonderful, degree the most opposite qualities, brilliancy and depth, and poured forth the stream of his rich and original thought in a fluency not more wonderful for it richness than for its classic purity. You can well imagine when I was called to see him as a pastor. I felt that I was in the presence of one who illuminated every subject that he touched; he saw deeper into a subject than any other man I have ever approached in so near a relationship, and his powers wee not weakened by age. I felt too that the great truths of the gospel were familiarized to his mind by long study and extensive reading of the work of God and its ablest and most learned expounders. No one held hypocrisy in greater dread. No one bore a more willing testimony to the truth of revelation or more scathingly denounced infidelity in all its phases." There are likewise portraits of Commodore Thomas A. Catesby Jones, of the United States Navy, who fought the British fleet on Lake Borgne in defense of New Orleans in the war of 1812; of Major General Roger Jones who was Adjutant General of the United States Army for twenty-five years; of Commander Catesby Ap. Roger Jones, who was, perhaps, the most accomplished ordinance officer in the late Confederate service and who commanded the Confederate Ram, the "Merrimac", in her second day's engagement with the Federal gun boat, the "Monitor" in Hampton Roads during the late war, which was perhaps, the most important naval battle that has occurred in modern times, since it revolutionized the Navies of the world. Cecil, Charles		A Desperate Battle. Mountaineers and Officers Fight, Six Killed and Six Wounded. It is thought That Several of Turner's Men Perished in the Burning "Quarter House"—More Trouble Is Expected. Middlesboro, Ky., Feb. 13.—Six are dead and as many more are dying as the result of a battle between officers from Middlesboro and mountaineers. The battle, which was one of the most desperate things of its kind in the history of mountain warfare, occurred between 4 and 6 o'clock Wednesday evening at Lee Turner's "Quarter House" saloon, three and a half miles from Middlesboro. Last month some mules and other goods of Turner's were levied on payment for a debt and a few night ago, it is alleged, he with others went to Virginia where the property had been taken, secured what was formerly his and returned to the "Quarter House." Wednesday Deputy Sheriff Wat Thompson summoned a posse of ten or fifteen men for the purpose of arresting Turner at his "Quarter House" saloon Turner had heard that an attempt would be made to arrest him and he and his men, 15 in number, gave the officers a warm reception. The saloon is well suited for an attack like this. It is built of huge logs and is surrounded by a 30 foot fence in which loop holes are cut so that the inmates can shoot outsiders. Turner's surrender was demanded. His reply was a round of shots. Charley Cecil, of Middlesboro, was riding a palfrey in plain view of the Turner men. Some one raised a window of the log house and shot Cecil, who fell dead. Instantly the man at the window fell back pierced by half a dozen bullets. Then the firing began in earnest. The officers scattered and hiding behind trees and roots poured a galling fire into the mountain fortress. In the fight John Doyle, a former railroad man was badly wounded, perhaps fatally, and Simon Bean, another ex-railroader was shot in the hand. The town men gathered closer around Turner's place, undaunted at the shots which whizzed around them. As soon as Cecil was killed his companions determined to burn Turner's rendezvous, and in the midst of the battle a man applied a torch to an exposed side of the building. A few minutes later the building was in flames. Several of the mountaineers came to the window and were immediately shot down. Lee Turner and several of his friends in some manner escaped and he is now at Mingo mines, eight miles from Middlesboro. Several of his men perished in the flames. The Middlesboro men are greatly alarmed and have mustered into service all who are available. The band that went after Turner Wednesday have remained together all day. Wednesday night ten coal miners from Excelsior went to Mingo mines, where Turner is staying, and offered him their services.</p> <p>Mrs. Turner, Lee's wife, who lives here was seen Thursday night by a press correspondent and asked for an opinion on the situation. She said that she had not heard from her husband since the battle occurred, excepting once, when he telephoned her that he was safe, but she would give an authentic that Turner will remain in the mountains and will rebuild his place. The stockade was on a bluff on the Columbus side of the river going from Lebanon and was under command of Lieut. Miller, who belonged to some Michigan regiment, we believe. Col. Chenault wrote a note demanding the surrender of the stockade and the men, to which Miller laconically replied: "On any other than today I would consider the matter, but under the circumstances, if you want it, you will have to come and get it." Chenault attempted to do so with the assistance of Cluke's regiment and met with disastrous loss. After the fight was over Miller had the wounded Confederate taken to farm houses in the neighborhood and told the people with whom he left them that he would hold them personally responsible for their treatment, and the

		<p>result was that they received the best attention. For this act Miller became endeared to all the Confederates, and had they subsequently captured him, they would have vied with each other in treating him the best they possibly could under the circumstances. Knives and pistols showed, themselves in great profusion, when Lawyer Bigstaff started for help; and came back immediately with W. M. Barnes who keeps a store there, who stepped over the prostrate body of Mr. Chenault and threatened to kill the first man who came nearer. Under Mr. Barnes protection, Mr. Chenault was moved to his home, where he lies in a critical condition. Barnes is a very determined man, and bears a reputation for great bravery, and it is to him that Mr. Chenault owes his life, as the infuriated fiends of Mr. Martin would surely have murdered him. Mob Wanted To Hang O'Brien and Whitney, Who Confessed.

Lexington, Ky., Oct. 16.—Both Earl Whitney and Claude O'Brien have confessed to the murder of Merchant A. B. Chinn and the wounding of his son here. The revolvers used were delivered to the police. The murder occurred at the Chinn home, Friday night.

George Bain and Al. De Long, two citizens of high standing, were admitted to the jail as representatives of several hundred men present and permitted to search the prison from top to dungeons.
They reported that the men wanted were not in jail. The crowd in front then raised a howl, and at the suggestion of leaders, adjourned to the court-house square.
Ex-County clerk Claude Chinn accompanied the crowd and made a speech to about two hundred men. He is a brother of the man murdered. He said:
"I do not know what to advise you to do at this moment, but something must be done. Those murderers must be punished. I had a man watch the jail since noon. He says the men have not been moved."
"Will you go with us?" was asked by a member of the crowd.
"I will go any place with you. You know my record." Replied the old confederate soldier.
One of the more quiet of the crowd suggested that before anything radical was done Mr. Chinn search the jail in person. With this the crowd, now numbering about four to five

hundred, went to the jail. A strong force of police guarded the entrance to the jail. Mr. Chinn, at 3:45 o'clock, mounted the jail steps and addressed the crowd. The deceased was born near Harrodsburg in Mercer County, then in the State of Virginia, on the 6th of April 1787. His father removed to the eastern end of Clark county in 1793, bringing Samuel with him, and near to the farm to which his father then removed, he spent the residue of his life, except about four years, from early in 1812 till 1816 he resided in the State of Ohio with his brother, Capt. John Chorn. When a boy he was sent to the best schools in the vicinity of his father's residence, and acquired a very good English education. While he resided in Ohio he served two campaigns in the war of 1812, the last under his brother, Capt. John Chorn. After the close of the war he returned to his former home in Clark County, Kentucky. His first vote was cast for James Madison in 1808. Since then he has unflinchingly supported the nomination of The Winchester Democratic party, and was at the polls last August. In 1817, he attached himself to the Baptist church, at Lulbegrud, in Montgomery county, of which he continued a devout and prominent member to the close of his life; constant in his attendance on the meetings of his church, and was prompt in the discharge of all his Christian duties, always ready to aid the destitute, and to sympathize with others in their sorrow, ardent in his attachments and never deserted a friend. Samuel Chorn was over the medium size of his fellows, was erect and comely in person, engaging in manners, commanding in appearance, firm and decided in his convictions, and self-relying in his business, acting promptly on his own judgment, and without wavering, made life a success. In 1820, he married Miss Nancy McKee, a most estimable Christian lady; they were members of the same church, and the union was felicitous, but she preceded him several years to the grave, and he never ceased to mourn her loss. Five children were the fruits of that marriage, three of whom survive their father, and may the blessings of his God always attend them. Samuel Chorn has finished his labors, and having been sustained by the word of God in passing through the dark valley of the shadow of death, has reached his final home to receive his reward. He was born in Virginia and reared to mature manhood in Clark county, Kentucky, and received as good an education as could be had at that early day. His great intellectual vigor and commanding talent gave him a position in the front rank of the legal profession. His mind was characterized by breadth and judgment more than by eloquence and display. At 28 years of age he was appointed as one of the Judges of the Court of Appeals, which position he held about one year, when he resigned it and returned to the practice of law. Afterward he was appointed Circuit Judge and, while presiding as such, he rendered decisions on constitutional law which attracted the attention of the whole bar and people of Kentucky and which were severely criticized. One of those decisions gave rise to partied in this State known as the Old and New Court parties and the event was finally settled in accordance with his decisions. These discussions had the effect to give him a standing and position that resulted in his election to the lower house of Congress. He was afterwards a State Senator and then governor of the State, and a statesman of renown. community was thrown into mourning by this sad intelligence, and we suppose, no one has died in this neighborhood for years, whose life and labors will be remembered by so many people, and so fondly remembered as that of our dear friend and brother J. T. Clark. He was educated in the common schools of his native county, and united with the Cumberland Presbyterian Church at Sugar Ridge. He was a quite and unpretentious Christian, regular in his attention to church duties. About this time the trouble with Mexico was being agitated, and always a lover of justice and right, and moved by a brave and patriotic spirit, when volunteers were called for to assist the Lone Star State in resisting the Mexican invasion, he was among the first to respond, and joined the Independent company of Capt. John S. Williams. He served throughout the campaigns of that war, and was with his company at the storming of the city of Mexico, and in that hotly contested struggle of Gerro Gordo. At the conclusion of hostilities, he returned home to the fond embrace of loved ones; crowned with the laurels of the soldier; but, to a nature like his he soon gave his attention to the more congenial duties of learning the "Healing Art," under the instruction of Dr. E. M. Combs. He attended Starling Medical College, Columbus, Ohio from which institution he graduated February 20th, 1852, making him had he lived two days longer a practitioner of medicine for thirty six years. Soon after graduating he began the practice of his profession in the adjoining county of Powell, where he was held in the highest esteem. A short time after his arrival to Powell Co., he made the acquaintance of Miss Jincie, daughter of Madison Stewart, to whom he was married October 14th, 1852; which proved to be a most fortunate and happy marriage, as she was a true helpmate, ever ready to share his joys and sorrows. The Lord blessed their union with six children. Two of them he has taken to himself, and four are left with their widowed mother, to mourn the loss of the devoted husband and loving father. He administered to the sick and afflicted of Powell county for about eleven years. In 1863 he was elected by the voters of Montgomery and Powell counties to represent them in the Lower House of the Kentucky Legislature. About this time he moved back to his native county of Clark, where he soon built up a large and lucrative practice. In his chosen profession, he was the model family physician, faithful, earnest, and true to the interest of his patrons, with the faculty of when once gaining friends, of holding them through life and retaining their confidence rarely excelled. They not only consulted him as a physician, but went to him in their troubles, and he was ever ready to console, advice, and comfort. He was truly a peace maker in his neighborhood, going in and out before the world so quietly, modestly, and retiringly, his work was scarcely appreciated by those who saw men occasionally; it was only his intimate friends, who really knew the value of the man. In the social circle, while never a brilliant conversationalist, he had such a vein of never failing good humor, and his remarks were so interspersed with apt anecdote and repartee, he was a companion sought by young and old alike. He petitioned Red River Iron Works Lodge No. 233 F. A. & M. July 8th, 1854 and was duly elected and initiated to the degree of Entered Apprentice August 5th, passed to the honorable degree of a Fellow Craft Sept. 30th, and raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason November 5th. He held almost ever, office from Junior Deacon up to Worshipful Master in this Lodge. Was one of the brethren who worked in Stanton Lodge U. D. and when a charter was granted in November 1852, he was the first S. W. of said Lodge, and like the above was honored by the brethren by being elected to various offices in the lodge. Also assisted in organizing W. H. Cunningham Lodge U. D. , and acted as Master while working as such. The Charter was granted Oct. 20th, 1876, and he was the first Worshipful Master, which position he was duly elected to fill for five years, and can truly be said to be the father of this lodge. He was a truly bright and honored member of the "Mystic Tie," punctual in attending the meetings of the lodge, regular in paying all dues, faithful in discharging of every duty, and ever ready to advise and assist distressed brothers, their widows, and orphans. And for his many acts of kindness and good qualities, W. H. Cunningham Lodge No. 572, on the 3rd, of June 1886, made him a life member, and for the same reason we believe, the Lord transported him from the lodge below to the Celestial Lodge above and made with hands, eternal in the Heavens. Therefore be it: Resolved 1st, That in the death of Brother Clark, our fraternity and this lodge particularly, has lost one of its best and most honorable members, the county a valuable citizen, the church one of its pillars, his family an affectionate husband and father, his patrons a true friend and physician.

2nd, That in the death of brother Clark, we recognize a severe dispensation of Divine Providence of the living God, that ruleth and governs all things well. And that we bow in humble submission to it, and look with implicit confidence and unshaken faith to God the giver of every good and perfect gift and say, "Thy will be done."

3rd, That the lodge be draped in mourning and the members wear the usual badge of mourning for thirty days; and that we tender his bereaved family our most sincere sympathy in this hour of sad affliction.

Another of our number is gone. He has answered the last call and we shall see Dr. John Clark here no more. He was born in Clark county, Kentucky, on the 19th of January 1826, of good old pioneer stock and died near his birth place on the 18th of February

	<p>1888. So he had gone in and out among his people for over 62 years. He married Miss Stewart on the 14th of October, 1852, and she, with four children are left to know what it is to lose a good husband and a kind father. He was for many years a member of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church at Sugar Ridge, in his native county, and he illustrated the beautiful and the holiness of the Christian religion in his daily walk and conversation. His pastor, Rev. B. F. Patton, chose his text well for the funeral sermon: "There remaineth therefore a rest to the people of God," and all felt that a good man had gone to rest. He was long one of the lights of Masonry and his brethren tell hoe he ordered his life according to the beneficent code of the lodge. They with one accord call him blessed. When the young chivalry of Kentucky were summoned to the battlefields of Mexico, he was one of the first to answer; and as soldier on the march, in camp and on the stricken field of Buena Vista, he was faithful to duty and true to his country. Yet John Clark was not what the world would call a hero. Embry Allen and Capt. Fred Wilson, guided by Deputy Sheriff Stubblefield, left Manchester in two jolt wagons. They arrived at the home of Perry Collins on Cane creek, 12 miles from here, about 8:30 o'clock. As per his agreement Tom Baker was there. With him was his wife, his son, his brothers, Dee and A. w. Baker and their friend, Robert Henley.

Immediately upon arrival at Collins' home Stubblefield read to Tom Baker a warrant sworn by county Judge Wright, charging him with the murder of Burch Stoor, who was killed from ambush on April 6, 1898, along with Wilson Howard, and at the same time that a. B. Howard was punctured in the back, for all of which tom Baker is held responsible. The arrest of Baker by Stubblefield on such a warrant was as much a surprise to the soldiers as it was to Baker, who on the other hand, regarded the troops, whom he believed had come merely for the purpose of protecting him, with suspicion, believing, for a time, that he was being entrapped.

The entire party named above entered the wagons with the guards and were driven back to Manchester. The Bakers were uneasy all the route and kept watchful eyes on the hilltops and ever tried to penetrate the denseness of the roadside brush and foliage for evidence of some lurking enemy with an assassin's heart. The journey, however, was without particular incident, nothing occurring that was the least in evidence that the opposing faction had made a move to take Baker's life.

Baker says he is innocent of the murders charged against him and can easily prove an alibi.

The Trial of the Bakers at Manchester terminated in a tragedy in spite of the presence of the troops. The indictments against the Bakers were quashed, new ones found, and a change of venue to Knox county had been granted. Tom Baker, the principal prisoner, stepped out of the tent in which he was guarded and was shot through the heart by a bullet fired from the house of Sheriff Bev. White across the street. The assassin was not found, although when broken into, White's house was found to be well stocked with guns.

The troops left Sunday for Barbourville with two of the other Bakers as prisoners. John G. White, of this city, brother of Sheriff and of Will White who was killed by Tom Baker, left Sunday for the seat of war. It is expected that trouble will break out afresh. The Philpot Faction Will Take the Part of the Bakers—John Philpot Chosen Leader of the Combined Forces.

London, Ky., June 15.—Things look more warlike now than ever in Clay county. Since the troops have left the feudists have the county to themselves and will no doubt battle it out at the first move on either side.

A new faction is coming into the feud now—the Philpots. They will help out the Bakers. The Bakers are without a leader, and John Philpot, the witness who testified that he was "feelin' for the Bakers," will lead their forces. The Philpots are the strongest and most feared faction in this section. They number 200 fighters. They are preparing for war.

They have had three dozen Winchesters shipped into the county. The guns arrived Tuesday. Bob Baker, aged 21, cousin to Tom Baker, came to London Wednesday

morning saying he expects to live here, where his life is not in danger. He says he knows who killed Tom Baker.
I happened to be looking at the window where the shot was fired. About a minute before the shot I saw a man and know who he was. I saw him shoot and run. I'm afraid to tell now, but when we get all prepared I'll tell who he is and drop him myself.
"They tried to kill me in Manchester the first night I went there. A newspaper correspondent was talking to me and I was standing behind his chair. I heard something behind me just across the fence in the garden and saw Tom Watt, a colored man, pointing a pistol at me.
"I sat down in a window so he couldn't get at me. Daugh White was making signs to him. I got my brothers together and we went right then to Col. Williams and asked him for protection."

Another victim Of A Feud.
James Howard Assassinated in the Shadow of the Manchester Courthouse Near Where Tom Baker Fell.
Manchester, Ky., (via London) June 16.—Another tragedy occurred in the famous Baker Howard feudal war Thursday, and this time the Howards, in turn, lost one of their bravest and ablest leaders. James Howard was standing in front of the courthouse Thursday afternoon conversing with friends and was just turning to enter the building, when a sharp report like the crack of a whip was heard, and a puff of smoke curled slowly from a window not half a block away.
Howard whirled about facing the locality from which the shot had been fired and fell to the ground, gasping, "They've shot me!" The bystanders scattered for a moment, fearing more firing, and then returning, gathered up the prostrate man and carried him into an adjacent residence. There a physician examined the victim and found him mortally wounded, the shot having entered the right side.
No trace could be found of the man who fired the shot, and, indeed, little effort was made in that direction for a time, so great was the excitement and so general the fear of those not directly involved in the long and deadly feud. When Sheriff White and his deputies were summoned and organized a search nothing could be found, though many of the friends of the dying man were not slow to express their opinion as to the identity of the assassin.
James Howard is credited with killing George Baker, the county attorney, and the father of Dee Baker, on April 7, 1898. His own tragic death has been predicted for some time, and since the killing of Tom Baker by an unknown the other day these predictions have been renewed with stronger force. Baker was slain while surrounded by soldiery near the courthouse, and Howard was shot Thursday within a few paces of the spot where the brave leader of the hostile clan met death.
Manchester has resembled a town in a state of siege for days, but the women and children were just beginning to return from the hills, where they fled after Baker's death, as it was thought that the trouble might be over for a time. Thursday's tragedy has plunged the little mountain city into an unparalleled reign of terror, as it is believed that the clans will not end the war of extermination until many more have bitten the dust.

Barbourville, Ky., June 28.—Some details have been received here of the attempted killing of Beverly Baker and Edward Garrard, near Manchester Saturday. Four shots were fired from bushes on a hill opposite Baker's house on Goose creek. One lodged in the door jamb four feet from where Baker was sitting. Beverly is a cousin of Tom Baker.

As Edward Garrard was en route from his home to his farm three strangers approached and asked him to take a drink of whisky. When he refused they said they would shoot him if he did not. Garrard was afraid the liquor might be poisoned and talked awhile regarding it, giving three of his farm hands time to overtake him, which they did, and the strangers disappeared. The Garrards are Baker supporters.

THE GOVERNOR HOAXED.

Bradley's Hurry Call for Troops—Two forged Messages—The governor is Very Indignant. LEXINGTON, Ky., July 4—Gov. Bradley arrived here Sunday from Cincinnati with the information that the call for 800 state troops Saturday night was the result of forged messages to him purporting to be from a gentleman in Lexington in whom the governor had confidence and a message from Frankfort purporting to be from a state officer. He was informed by these messages that there was much trouble in Clay county; that the Howards were surrounded and were at the mercy of the Philpots and Bakers and that unless troops were sent at once many lives would be sacrificed. The governor immediately issued the order for the troops to go to Clay county Sunday morning. Later he became suspicious, and after a telephone consultation with Adj. Gen. Collier and Col. Williams, the orders were revoked. The governor says he will do all he can to fix the responsibility for the fake.

Terrible Feud Outbreak.

Five Men Reported Killed in Clay county Ky.—War Between the Philpot and Morris Factions.

Louisville, Ky., July 18.—A special from London, Ky., tells of a report reaching here of the outbreak of another feud in Clay county by which five men lost their lives Monday. The dead are said to be: Robert Philpot, Ed Fisher, Aaron Morris, Jim Griffin and Hugh Griffin.

These fatalities resulted from a pitched battle fought near Little Goose creek, three miles of Manchester.

The feud dates back nearly two years. On Christmas, 1897, James Philpot was killed by Aaron Morris, but before he died he shot and killed Wm. Bundy, a friend of Morris. The Morris and Griffins were closely affiliated. Since then the feuding between the two factions has been very bitter, and it has been aroused recently by the White-Baker hostilities.

The Philpots, who are the strongest faction in the mountain numbering about 750 voters, openly espoused the cause of the Bakers, White, the Griffins took sides with the Whites. The story that reaches here from Manchester is to the effect that Bob Philpot was arrested Monday morning by Deputy Sheriff Wash Thacker. While very circumstantial, in other respects the report does not show clearly the origin of the trouble nor give the reason for Philpot's arrest.

It is said that while Thacker was taking Philpot's bond, the latter was shot from behind by a member of a crowd that had gathered. This precipitated a general fight with Winchester and revolvers, which was participated in by George, Granville, Robert and Peter Philpot and Ed Fisher on one side and Aaron Morris, Hugh, Jim and Green Griffin on the other.

The battle began about 9 o'clock and raged fiercely for ten or fifteen minutes. When it was over it was found that the five men mentioned above had been killed outright, three of the belligerents were seriously wounded, while Pete Philpot was the only one on either side to escape injury. Granville Philpot is said to be one of the most seriously wounded. He is a union veteran having lost a leg at Stone river. He is an ex-member of the Kentucky legislature and is said to have killed three or four men.

Ed Fisher, who is reported dead, was another man with several nicks in his cane. He was but 23 years old but was said to have killed three men. The story of this battle caused consternation here notwithstanding the fact that serious trouble has been expected to break out among the mountaineers of Clay county ever since the assassination of Tom Baker several weeks ago. An effort was at once begun to secure deputies to go to the seat of the trouble and attempt to restore quiet, but up to a late hour in the afternoon there had not been enough responses to make up a force that would command respect. The situation at Manchester is deplorable. Since morning the place has been in a state of terror, scarcely anyone daring to venture out of doors. Business is suspended and the residents are momentarily expecting a renewal of hostilities.

The entire county of Clay is filled with men mounted and armed. Other battles may occur at any moment.

A relative of the Philpots has just left here to join his family and swears vengeance.

London Depot, Ky., July 18.—Clay county has another killing for its annals. Dick Lovens' body has been found three miles from Manchester. He was beaten to death in the night. When found his head was severed from his body and had been beaten to a pulp.

A 45-calibre revolver was found on the body. Having killed three men and injured several, he was probably killed by the friends on one of his victims. He leaves a widow and eight children.

An attempt has been made to kill Will Gray, near Manchester, Clay county. After three shots had passed through his clothes, one of them scraping his body, he escaped by running through a forest. Gray is one of the Baker's friends.

Are Preparing.

The Two Factions Getting Ready for the Coming Struggle.

Arms Said to Have Been Received from London—Victims of the Fight the Other Day Escorted to Their Graves by a Heavily Armed Guard.

London, Ky., July 21.—Clay county appears to be alive with armed men both sides to the feud have suspended all Labor and are assembled in their respective neighborhoods. Preparations for war go on. Arms are said to have been received from this point and taken to Clay county. It is believed they were for both sides.

Judge W. L. Brown, London, who has tried many mountain feud fighters, says that he regards this as the most serious trouble Clay county has ever had, and he expects to hear

of a desperate fight. Hugh Griffin and Aaron Morris were laid in the same grave. Harvey Griffin was placed beside them. The funeral procession escorted the corpses to the burial grounds under a heavy guard, armed with Winchesters.

The Philpot-Morris feud can be traced back over eight years. It began in the Philpot Roost fight, in which the Philpots and Fishers were engaged with a number of alleged followers of Morris. On election day I. B. Philpot was killed, and a young man, named Nicholson, a clerk in the pension department at Washington, who had come home to vote had a leg shot off. George Cole, who last year killed Marshal Roach at Barbourville, and is now a fugitive from justice, was riddled with bullets. Several others were wounded. Sam Philpot, who figured prominently in that fight was wounded at the battle of San Juan hill.

The next fight was about six years ago. One of the Stuarts and Maj. Jack Downey, of the Chadwell-Downey forces were killed. The Stuarts are alleged allies of the Chadwells and Griffins in the present feud. Joe Nance and John Bowling were sent to the penitentiary on account of their participation in this battle, but were afterward pardoned.

The next engagement was four or five years ago, when Tim Philpot, Ed Fisher and others on one side were engaged by the Chadwells and George Thompson on the other. Thompson was killed, and both Tim Philpot and Ed Fisher were indicted and tried, but they were acquitted.

One other fierce but short battle occurred at Dripping Springs, clay county, in which, Dave, Hugh and Joe bowling lost their lives at the hands of the Hamptons, who are now in the Morris-Griffin ranks. Others were wounded.

The next battle was fought on Horse Creek, at a saloon, a year ago. In this fight Jim Crow Philpot shot and killed William Bundy, and was in turn killed by Aaron Morris, Bundy's son-in-law. Morris was sentenced for 31 years, but on a new trial he was acquitted.

It is charged that the Whites, of the Howard-White-Baker feud, assisted him. As a result of last Monday's battle four men, Hugh Griffin, Aaron Morris, Harvey Griffin, of the Morris side, and Ed Fisher of the Philpot faction, have been buried. Two others will probably die.

 Gov. Bradley Has Not Decided on any Plan With Reference to the Latest Outbreak—Authorities Criticized.

There are very severe criticism of the Clay county civil authorities, in state official circles at the state capital, and it is hinted that some of the judicial authorities in that district will be made the subject of rigid investigation by the legislature next winter which will have impeachment proceedings as its ultimatum object.

Sheriff Beverly White, of Clay county, who with his deputies are credited with belonging to one of the fighting factions, does not call on the state for assistance and objected to the governor sending troops to Manchester last month for the Baker trial.

 Gov. Bradley Will Not Call the Legislature Together, Neither Will He Send Troops to Clay County.
 Frankfort, Ky., July 21.—Gov. Bradley will not call a special session of the legislature, neither will he send troops to Clay county under present conditions. He thinks the legislature would enact legislative laws relating to the judiciary necessary to reach the Clay county situation and he doubts if the military would do any good there. A well known mountain official, who was called on by the governor, for an opinion as to what was best measure to be resorted to for the restoration of order in Clay county, responded that he thought the whole thing could be settled by introducing a better grade of whisky into Manchester to take the place of moonshine liquor, distilleries for which are almost on every farm.

IN CLAY COUNTY.
 Gov. Bradley Issues an Elaborate Statement Regarding the Situation in That Section.
 FRANKFORT, Ky., Aug 4.—Gov. Bradley Wednesday night issued an elaborate statement regarding the situation in Clay county covering 2,100 words. He shows that he had replies from only one or two members of the legislature on his inquiries about a special session, and that the legislature disregarded recommendations in former message for amending laws in this respect. He shows that the governor can not declare martial laws that he can not make arrests except through local authorities; that all officers in Clay county are involved in feud; that none of them have asked for aid; that they objected to presents of troops while Tom Baker was being tried; that troops did not prevent Tom Baker's murder while he was a prisoner, etc. Seven persons have been killed within a year in the Baker-White-Howard feud. All have been tried except the slayer of John Baker, Frank Clark and Tom Baker, and these are not known. Gov. Bradley recites that the regular judge is related to the Howards, Beverly White is sheriff and Daugh White, clerk of the court. Gov. Bradley says there is not enough militia in Kentucky to patrol Clay county owing to the character of warfare raging there. They

were powerless to prevent the murder of Tom Baker in the court house yard, to protect the grand juries or witnesses. He then refers to the recent Philpot-Griffin-Morris affray in which five men were killed and as many more were wounded. He says that the battle ten miles from Manchester, with the limited force of militia, could not cover forests and larger area of mountains. Most of this elaborate statement is devoted to recommendations for appointment of special judges, special commonwealth attorneys and other officers when local officers themselves are involved. All responsibility for existing conditions are thrown on the legislature.

JIM BAKER TRIAL

The Prosecution Concluded Its Testimony by Introducing Four Witnesses-Baker Claims an Alibi.

BARBOURVILLE, Ky., Aug 5.-In the Jim Baker trial the prosecution concluded its testimony by introducing four witnesses. A. B. Howard testified that he was wounded at the time his son William was killed. As they were riding along the road they were shot at by persons in ambush. He recognized Tom Baker and some one whom he thought was Jim. James Robinson, who was working at Bakers' house when the killing occurred, testified that soon after shots were fired Tom and Jim came home greatly excited. Just before the shooting he said Tom went down the road in the direction whence the shots came, with what he thought to be a gun. Robinson testified in the examining trial that Tom and Jim were both home when the shots were fired. Now he claims that he was forced by the Bakers to swear to a lie as they threatened to kill him. John Collins testified that when he heard shots he immediately ran up the hill in their direction. He saw two men enter Tom Baker's house, but could not identify them. Fuller Barrett had testified twice before that Tom and Jim were at home when Wilson Howard was killed. This time he swore that he, in company with Jim, Tom and Wiley Baker were together in the road when Howard came up: that Tom fired and Burch Storr fell dead and Bill Howard was wounded. Jim Baker fired and there was a fusillade of bullets. He said the Bakers forced him to swear false the first two times. Barrett was indicted with the Bakers for the murder, but after his indictment had been canceled by the commonwealth he turned state's evidence. He is a first cousin to Tom Baker. The defense claims to be able to prove an alibi.

The Bakers said Monday night that the other side are attempting to bridle the Bakers' witnesses.

Baker-McCoy Feud.

It Was Continued in the Army—Thirty-First Regiment Soldier Reported Fatally Shot by One of the Bakers.

Williamsburg, Ky., Oct. 19.—According to a report received here the Baker-McCoy feud has suddenly been transferred from Clay county, Kentucky, to the military post at San Francisco. The information is that on last Tuesday one of the Bakers shot and mortally wounded a McCoy at that place. About a month ago a number of the Clay county feudists left Manchester and joined the army and were mustered into the 31st regiment, now under quarantine at the presidio. The regiment is composed almost entirely of Kentuckians.

The story is that one of the McCoys attacked a Baker and was beating him up, when Baker drew his revolver, and shot McCoy in the right groin, hand and leg. Baker was arrested and ordered to attend a court-martial. McCoy can not survive.

Tom Whitemore Was Killed and Dan Barker Wounded on Horse Creek—Bob Travers Was Killed at Hamlet, Ky.

London, Ky., Oct. 26.—Tom Whitemore and Dan Barker were ambushed Monday on Horse creek en route to Clay county circuit court. The former was killed and the latter injured.

Bob Travers was killed at Hamlet. A report states that a Philpot, en route to Manchester court was ambushed and killed at Pigeon Roost Tuesday.

Trouble is reported on Saxtons creek between the White and Baker factions.

Circuit Judge Eversole, fearing assassination, did not go to Manchester, and the opening of the court was delayed.

The Griffins and Philpots are present in large numbers, heavily armed. Manchester is crowded and the situation looks grave.

True Bills Returned.

Sol, Jim and Tom Griffin indicted for Murder, and Ed and Floyd Chadwell Charged With Complicity.

Manchester, Ky., Oct. 27.—The grand jury impaneled here at the term of court which began Monday has a big task before it. There are twelve murders besides the assassination of Tom Baker to be investigated. Wednesday the jury returned true bills against Sol, Jim and Tom Griffin charging them with the murder of Deputy Wash Thacker and Eddy and Floyd Chadwell, charging them with complicity in the crime. Eddy Chadwell confessed that the plot was made and executed by the Griffins to revenge the advantage Thacker had give the Philpots by his testimony against the Griffins after the battle of July 17, in which four Griffins and one Philpot were killed. The town is full of witnesses and feudists.

Judge Eversole did not arrive and C. B. Little is holding court.

Shot From Ambush While on His Way to Attend Court—State Troop May Be Needed.
London, Ky., Oct. 25.—A courier from Manchester Tuesday reports another of the Philpot factions killed in ambush in Clay county Monday en route to Manchester to attend the Philpot-Griffin feud trial.

Circuit Judge Eversole, who left Sunday to open court in clay county, reached Bengetown, 13 miles from Manchester, and learned of the critical condition of affairs. He decided to go no further. He is still at Bengetown, but he has sent word to Manchester he will be there some time this week. The town is full of feudists. It is believed Eversole will call state troops.

The Feud Cases.

There is a Contest in the Clay county District Over the Question of What Judge Shall Try Them.

Lexington, Ky., Nov. 2.—There is a contest here over who shall be circuit judge of the Clay county district to try the feud cases. The present judge, Harry C. Eversole, was elected last fall to succeed Judge W. L. Brown, who was appointed by Gov. Bradley to fill out the unexpired term of Judge A. H. Clark, who died in April of last year. It is asserted that the election of Judge Eversole was illegal, and now Judge Brown is contesting it, and claims that he is entitled to hold the office until a legal election can be held, which can not be before one or two years.

The case was argued before Judge Watts Parker, of this city, Tuesday afternoon by Judge Brown and Eversole, who reserved his decision until Wednesday. After he passes on it the case will be taken to the court of appeals for final adjudication.

Nov. 2.—The feudists charged with murder at Manchester, Clay county, Ky., have comparatively easy sailing, as witnesses summoned to appear and testify against them will not testify against the warring factions. Mrs. Sarah Collins, chief witness against James and Millard Philpot, and Alex Fischer, charged with the murder of her husband, committed suicide by taking poison, fearing to testify against them. Other feud cases have been postponed from day to day on account of the absence of witnesses, who refuse to attend court and testify against the feudists, believing that their evidence against the warring factions would imperil their own lives.

The defendant filed an appeal for continuance but the appeal was not granted and the case was passed till Monday, February 19 and processes will be sent to Clay county to bring the absent witnesses. Although Bakers and Howards were together at the court there was not the least manifestation of trouble. In the previous trials of Howards his defense was made on the plea of insanity at the time the murder was committed. London, Ky., May 30.—The case against Jule Webb, charged with killing Chad Hall, both members of the Garrard-White feud in Clay county, but on opposite sides, was given to the jury at 4 o'clock Wednesday evening. The jury, after being out five minutes, returned a verdict of acquittal. This case was brought to this county on a change of venue from Clay county. The cases against Bill McCollum and Taylor Spurlock, jointly indicted with Webb for the killing of Hall, were dismissed by the court after Webb was acquitted. The evidence against Jule Webb showed that he killed Chad Hall, but acted in self-defense in doing so, as Hall was trying to kill him at the time and would have done so if his (Hall's) pistol had not snapped. George Hall, a brother of Chad Hall, attacked Attorney Sam Cash, who was defending Jule Hall, in the court house during the noon adjournment, and would have killed him had not friends interfered. When court met in the afternoon Hall was put under a \$1,000 bond to keep the peace. Mr. Cash made a statement to the court that his house in Manchester had been shot into and his windows smashed, and that he believed that George Hall was the man who did it, and George Hall had on several occasions tried to kill him, and that he tried again to kill him during the noon adjournment of court. Clay, Brutus	<p>A Noble Brother</p> <p>During the war no man in Kentucky was a more pronounced union man than was the Hon. Brutus Clay, of Bourbon. Mr. Clay was a man of great wealth, as rich men go in Kentucky, which consisted principally of lands in his county, and he owned a great deal of the very best. No man was ever more popular in his county or more deservedly so. He was a kind neighbor, a warm friend, and liberal to every deserving man in trouble. He had three sons and a daughter, and gave them every advantage in the way of education and improvement, and they were a credit to their father. His eldest son, Ezekiel, called "Zeke" for short, had graduated at Yale College and came back home shortly after the war commenced. He enlisted in the Confederate army which was a great grief to his father and disappointment, for he had other views for his son. Possibly thinking that his son would never return or that he had forfeited his father's love and confidence by this great act of disobedience, he made his will, leaving to his youngest son, Cassius M. Clay, Jr., now candidate for Governor, most of the property that he would have left his rebel son under other circumstances. Every one thought that "Zeke" being disinherited, would have to go to work as any poor man's son had to do. Not a great while after the death of the father, the sons had a conference in an upper room in Paris, which lasted several days, the result of which was an exchange of deeds to various farms in Bourbon, lately belonging to the Hon. Brutus Clay, and it appeared from these that the disinherited brother was made equal in these lands and for more than twenty years has enjoyed a full share of his father's estate. It was all so quietly done that no man was the wiser till the deeds were filed for record. It is believed in Bourbon that the brother Cassius, suggested the arrangement as he certainly had the lion's share under his father's will and made the largest concession. A man who could do so handsome a thing and give such evidence of fraternal affection is deserving of any position his fellow-citizens can bestow upon him. But Mr. Cassius Clay, Jr., is a thoroughly honest man, and besides having abilities of a high order, is a scholar and more widely read than any agriculturist in Kentucky, for he is a farmer, pure and simple, and cultivates his fields as his father did before him. He wishes to be Governor and the above incident coming recently to our knowledge has made us an enthusiastic advocate of his election and when it becomes widely known, will bring tens of thousands of Kentuckians to his support, for magnanimity of this kind will touch men's hearts and commend him to their confidence and esteem, more than any silver tones that can proceed out of the mouth of the most gifted orator.—Lexington Gazette.. Gen. C. M. Clay Dead.
Was Ambassador to Russia During Lincoln's Administration.
He Was A Member of the Harrison Whig Convention in 1840, Which Nominated Gen. W. H. Harrison For the Presidency.
Lexington, Ky., July 23.—Gen. Cassius Marcellus Clay, ambassador to Russia under Lincoln, noted abolitionist and author, died at his home at Whitehall, Madison county, Wednesday night at 9 o'clock. Gen. Clay was born October 19, 1810, in Madison county. He was the son of Gen. Green Clay. He graduated at Transylvania university and later studied law at Yale. He served in the Kentucky legislature in 1824, being re-elected, representing Madison county. He then moved to this county and served another term as Fayette's representative. Radical views on slavery led to his defeat on offering for re-election.
He was a member of the Harrison Whig convention in 1840 which nominated Gen. William H. Harrison for president. He denounced the proposed annexation of Texas as a scheme to protect and extend slavery. June 8, 1845, he issued the first number of his abolition paper, "The True American," which was published here. His advocacy of abolition was so bitter that citizens threatened to mob him. He made an arsenal of his office, providing iron doors and procured two brass cannon, which were loaded with shot and nails. Mexican Lances and guns with a quantity of ammunition were also provided and a keg of powder was kept ready so that if finally overpowered he could destroy the building.
He was taken ill and a mob seized the plant and shipped it to Cincinnati. There he resumed publication of the paper. He was an ardent supporter of Henry Clay, his kinsman, for the presidency, and campaigned in northern states in his behalf.
When war with Mexico was declared in 1846 he enlisted as captain in a volunteer company that had won distinction at Tippecanoe in 1811. While in the van he was taken prisoner at Encarnacion along with 71 others. He was in captivity several months and on one occasion by his bravery saved the lives of his companions. When he returned a sword was presented to him by the citizens of Fayette.
In 1848, he carried Kentucky for Taylor. In 1849 he left the Whig party and called a convention of emancipationists at Frankfort. In 1850 he became anti-slavery candidate for governor. He fought several noted duels during the canvass. He always carried a large Bowie knife and revolvers in saddle bags. He supported Fremont in 1856 and Lincoln in 1860.
In 1861 he was appointed minister to Russia. When he returned in 1862 he was made major general succeeding General Lew Wallace. He was re-appointed minister to Russia in '63 and served under Lincoln, Johnson and Grant.
He was president of the Cuban Aid society in 1870, supporting the Cuban revolutionary movement. In a speech at the St. Louis fair in 1871 he attacked Grant's administration. He supported his old friend, Horace Greely, but later joined forces with The Winchester Democratic party. He supported Tilden, but was for Blaine in 1884. In 1848 a volume of his speeches was edited by Horace Greely.
Memoirs, Writings and Speeches of Cassius Marcellus Clay in two volumes was published by the author in 1886.
A life full of turbulence began to tell on Gen. Clay in late life. He believed that a conspiracy to assassinate him had been formed and some years ago fortified his home at Whitehall, and entered a life of seclusion that ended only a few weeks ago when the court appointed a committee to take charge of him and his effects.
He was found desperately ill and has had every care since then.
Children long estranged by reason of his eccentricities were again able to be with him and were at the bedside when death ensued, which was due to general exhaustion. Surviving children are Brutus J. Clay, prominent in national politics, of Richmond; Miss Laura Clay, noted as an exponent of woman suffrage, Lexington; Mrs. Dabney Greenshaw, Richmond, Va.; Mrs. Mary Barr Clay and Mrs. James Bennett of Richmond, Ky.

Hart, the famous Kentucky sculpture were brought from Florence, Italy, where he died, and buried by the State in the Cemetery at Frankfort. Gov. Proctor Knott invited Judge W. M. Beckner to deliver an address on the occasion of the final interment. Judge Beckner wrote to Italy and to New York, Philadelphia and other places for information concerning Mr. Hart and his work. Among others he addressed a letter to Gen. Clay, who had been Hart’s first patron as a sculptor, asking his recollections of the dead artist. He got an answer on a postal card, the substance of which was that the General had put all he cared to say about Joel T. Hart into his memoirs, which had been published and were being sold at \$6 per volume. Judge Beckner immediately sat down and wrote him as follows: “I received your curt advertisement of your book written on a postal and must say that I was surprised. If you had been spending as much time and energy to do honor to a dead friend of mine as I have been to pay a public tribute to one who was as devoted to you as was Joel T. Hart, and I had written as good a book as they say you have, and you were as poor as I am, and I as rich as you are supposed to be and you wrote me for facts about my friend which I had put into print in my book. I would send you a copy, even if it’s price should be so enormous a sum as \$6.” The next mail brought to Judge Beckner the following reply: “White Hall, Ky., April 12, 1887.—Dear Judge, I have ordered the Memoirs to be sent you. Clay, Hume		Our usually conservative city was startled yesterday afternoon by the report that one of our most prominent business men was a defaulter or worse is said to bear a striking resemblance. When he did not return in due time, it was whispered at first and soon loudly proclaimed that all was not right financially. A quiet investigation followed and the community was astounded by the intell, that he owed large amounts. First one bank and then another was heard from and the figures grew with a rapidity that was astonishing until the people were appalled. Upon investigation, it was found that he borrowed money in large amounts from our local banks and also in other cities. In this city he obtained twenty thousand dollars from the Winchester Bank, as much from the Clark County National and half the sum from the Citizens National. He also obtained about fifteen thousand dollars from the Paris banks and a large sum, variously estimated from eighteen to thirty thousand from a Covington bank. All these sums or by far the larger portion of them, were obtained within the last six months, and a considerable quantity at a later date. While Mr. Clay was considered a good business man and one whose name was above reproach, it was not his name alone that enabled him to secure a credit at the banks that was almost unlimited; in addition to his signature these notes bore the well known name of Mr. Clay's maternal grandfather, Matthew D. Hume, a man whose broad acres and conservative business habits make him a tower of strength in the financial world, and whose paper is eagerly discounted by banking institutions in Central Kentucky. Several of them also bore the name of his father, John Clay, a prominent citizen of Bourbon county. These names are as good as gold, and no apprehension was felt until it became known that both Mr. Hume and Mr. Clay absolutely and unequivocally deny having signed these notes. As this places Hume Clay in the light of a forger of stupendous magnitude, his many friends here were loath to believe it and many refuse to believe it yet. As soon as it was found that these signatures were forged the Winchester Bank swore out an attachment on the planing mill, machinery, lumber, etc, of his big establishment on North Main street and placed it in the hands of the Sheriff, who at one took possession, Messrs. Albert Conn, Waller Azbill and James Overall were selected as appraisers and will be in work this morning. Until their labors are finished no definite idea can be formed as to the amount of his assets. In addition to the sums above mentioned the Clay City Lumber Company are said to be sufferers to the amount of two thousand dollars, and the Asher Lumber Company for an indefinite amount. It is also probable that he owes other parties not yet heard from which will bring the amount to over a hundred thousand dollars and may go to a much larger sum. Mr. Clay came to this city from Paris a few years ago and established a planing mill and lumber yard. His business evidently prospered and during the past year he built a large planing mill equipped with all modern machinery and of large capacity. Business came in so rapidly that the mill was at times obliged to run day and night to keep up with the orders, and the firm of M. H. Clay & Co., was

evidently on the high road to prosperity and wealth. Since the recent denouncement many inquires have been made as to whom the Co., was composed of. At first it was thought to be Capt. J. M. Thomas, of Paris, the father-in-law of Mr. Clay, but his is denied and many think the Co., is a myth and that Mr. Clay, and he alone, was the firm. What became of those vast sums of money? Was asked time and again. It was known that he had invested more or less heavily in the land syndicates formed this Spring, that he had taken some stock in the Street Car Line, etc., but no adequate investment here could be found for such large sums of money as those borrowed in the last few months.. It is accounted for, however, by the statement of those in a position to know, that he invested seventy-five thousand dollars in the capital sock of the Chadwick Cart Company which proposed to remove from Olean, New York to this place. He was a large contractor and had been awarded the contracts for building the new Ky. Wesleyan College, the new public school building for this city, and numerous private contracts. He is about thirty years old, of agreeable manners and is quite a favorite with his acquaintances. His wife was Miss Mary Thomas, a daughter of Capt. J. M. Thomas, of Paris, and a most lovely woman. His many friends would be glad to see him cleared of the ugly charges against him, but in the face of the positive denials of his father and grand-father, there can be but one conclusion, if they have told the truth, Hume Clay is guilty of enough forgeries to send him to the penitentiary for the remainder of his life, if caught.

THE RETURN OF HUME CLAY

Interest in the Hume Clay case, which had partly died out was revived on Monday by a telegram that he was on his way home. Capt. Thomas sent a letter from him to his wife, which was evidently the outpouring of a broken spirit. In it he said that all the notes were forgeries, but that at the time he thought he would make money enough by the speculation to redeem them and none would be any wiser, but when they became due he was unable to do so and fled.

He went from Winchester to Chicago, thence to New York, where he sailed for Liverpool. He spent some time in London and also at the famous watering place Brighton. Wherever he went there was no rest. The terrible strain was fast making him a mental and physical wreck, and he resolved to return. He sailed for the United States, and wrote to his relatives from Albany, N. Y. Capt. Thomas and Mr. Clay's brother went to Dayton, Ohio, Sunday, to meet him, and the party arrived in Paris Monday noon. Sheriff Farney went down on the afternoon train after Mr. Clay and returned on the evening train with him accompanied by Mr. Clay's father and Capt. J. M. Thomas. Mr. clay was taken before Squire Parish and released upon a bond of \$15,000, with his father and Capt. Thomas as sureties.

THE HUME CLAY CASE

Gov. Buckner Declines To Issue a Pardon, and Will Let the Courts Decide the Matter
A special from Frankfort to the Courier-Journal, says: "During the past month petitions have been circulated at Winchester and Paris in behalf of a pardon for Hume Clay, the young forger, who victimized the banks at the two places named to the amount of \$60,000 last summer. These petitions were numerous signed by some of the most influential citizens and these together with many strong personal letters, were presented to the Governor a few days ago. The Governor gave them careful consideration, but today declined to issue the pardon.

The Governor in giving his reason for his action says:

"The petition in behalf of Hume Clay, indicted in the Clark and bourbon Circuit Courts for forgery, are numerous signed by persons occupying prominent positions in social life in Central Kentucky, who have great interest in the enforcement of law and who, in their own lives are an illustration of good citizenship. The wishes of such men are entitled to the fullest consideration and the Executive has sought to find reasons which would justify him in an official act which would result in complying with their request for him to pardon the indictments pending against the accused. But from the investigations which he has been enabled to make it does not appear that the offenses charged are denied; and while it is urged in palliation that the speculative excitement chiefly in 1890, led to the commission of the acts and deprived them of any criminal purpose, it is stated by the Protestants that these acts were systematically pursued from the year 1888,"

"After a mature consideration of the question as presented for his action, the Executive is convinced that a judicial investigation alone can determine all the facts in this case, and that the interposition of Executive authority before the action of the courts can e had would be to divert the extraordinary power from the purpose designed by the people in confiding to him this trust."

"He does not feel justified, therefore in interfering to prevent a judicial investigation which will develop any facts which may disprove or palliate the offenses charged."

Mrs. Clay is a young woman possessed of rare beauty and but to see her will win her many admirers. Her loyalty is to be greatly admired."

FROM the following statement of Gov. Brown's views it would seem that Hume Clay must stay in the penitentiary during his term at least. While everybody sympathizes with his unfortunate family and even with the man himself, a proper regard for the majesty of the law will cause the thinking people to agree with Gov. Brown in his views of the case: "Application for the pardon of Matthew Hume Clay has been made to me. He is in confinement in the penitentiary under judgement of the Bourbon Circuit Court, for a period of ten years, upon a plea of guilty to ten different indictments for forgeries aggregating many thousands of dollars. It appears that there are fifteen untried indictments for forgery pending against said Clay in the county of Clark. It appears that these forgeries cover a period of more than five years systematically and persistently committed. He forged the name in all these cases in which he pleaded guilty, of his grandfather, Matthew Hume, a very old and wealth citizen of Bourbon county. Clay is a young man, of the education reared in luxury, and a member of a most wealth and influential family. His wife is also a member of one of the most reputable families in the State. His pardon is asked by a multitude of the leading citizens in that part of Kentucky, including farmers, lawyers, merchants, bankers, and men of almost every

vocation. The only plea urged is that this man was invading the community and believed that enterprises in which he had embarked, and to carry on which he repeatedly forged his grandfather's name, would yield him profits, and no harm result to his old kinsman. His schemes failed, and he confessed his guilt in open court, in his pleas to the indictments." "I feel the most sincere respect for the generous sentiments of sympathy on behalf of this man and his wife and relatives, moving those who request the pardon, but I fail to find any palliating circumstances in his case. The safety of society justly demands more from one of Clay's environments than from one whose heritage was poverty and ignorance. I do not regard the prisoner as deserving. Executive clemency. The application is refused."

She visited him frequently, but it is said of late she has not been there. When Clay serves his present term there are other indictments waiting and if the same punishment is meted out to him, the aggregate terms would be more than a life time.

A celebrated case decided

The litigation between the Winchester Bank and Capt. J.M. Thomas, growing out of the Hume Clay forgeries, has been finally disposed of so far as the Circuit court is concerned. The case has been in the courts since Aug., 1890, when it was learned that Hume Clay had absconded and that the signatures of his father and grandfather to the notes were forged, the Winchester Bank which held two notes against Clay on which M.D. Hume's name appeared as surety amounting to about \$20,000, procured an attachment and had it levied on the planing mill property, as the property of M.H. Clay, and realized from its attachment in the fall of 1890, the sum of \$18,671.47. Capt. Thomas, Clay's father-in-law was made a party to that suit and set up a claim that he was a partner with Clay in the planing mill business and was entitled to receive the proceeds of the planing mill to pay the debts of M.H. Clay & Co., amounting to something over \$10,000, and to receive half of what was left as his share of the partnership property. Judge Scott decided in February 1891 that Capt. Thomas was not a partner with Clay. Thomas had in the meantime paid debts for Clay & Co., to the amount of \$10,176.01. He took the case to the Court of Appeals, which tribunal in December 1894 reversed Judge Scott's decision, and held that Thomas was a partner and directed the partnership matters between Thomas and Clay to be settled and only such amount as Clay should be found to be entitled on such a settlement should be retained by the bank. At the September term 1895 of the Circuit court the case was referred to J.H. Evans, Master Commissioner to hear proof and made a settlement of the partnership. During last fall and winter a great deal of proof was taken by Mr. Evans, Master Commissioner to hear proof and make a settlement of the partnership. During last fall and winter a great deal of proof was taken by Mr. Evans, and all the books kept by M.H. Clay & Co., as well as the books of all the banks with which that firm or Clay individually had done business were examined thoroughly and at the May term 1896 of the Court, Commissioner Evans filed a voluminous report showing that Clay contributed to the business \$61,432.62 and withdrew from it \$37,261.85, that Thomas contributed to the business \$9,209.49, paid debts and interest for it amounting to \$12,286.11 and had withdrawn \$2,320.83. Clayhole Murder Case	<p>Trial Is Set For Clayhole Cases Louisville Courier-Journal, February 9, 1922</p> <p>"The Clayhole cases," as the murder indictments against 13 participants in the battle at Clayhole precinct, Breathitt County, on election day, 1921, are commonly known, have been set for trial in the Breathitt Circuit Court March 25. And on that date Judge D. W. Gardner, it is expected, will send them to another county.</p> <p>Judge Gardner, who is in Florida, has already indicated such an intention, according to Commonwealth Attorney Grover Cleveland Allen, but he has not said to what county he plans to send them.</p> <p>They have been sent back here from Boyd County, where three trials have been held, the total net result of these lengthy hearings being that one of the defendants, William Barnett, received a two-year-term in the penitentiary.</p> <p>Barnett belongs to the so-called Republican group of defendants, which includes, besides himself, Andy Barnett, Willie Davis, Marion Barnett, Will Campbell, Ed Davis, Alfred Barnett, Ed Combs, and Chester Davis. Each faces three murder charges, except Barnett, against whom, in view of his conviction, only two are pending.</p> <p>The nine men of this group are accused of the murder of Cleveland and Asbury Combs and Ethan Allen, Democrats.</p> <p>In addition to 17 wounded, a fourth man, George McIntosh, Republican, was killed. Leslie, Shade, and French Combs and George Allen, Jr., Democrats, are under indictment for his murder.</p> <p>They were tried jointly in Catlettsburg in the summer of 1922. Leslie Combs and Allen each received a 15-year prison sentence and the other two got five-year terms. This verdict was later reversed by the Court of Appeals.</p>

The following March the cases of the defendants who were on the Republican side in the battle were called at Catlettsburg. The defendants demanded separate trials, and William Barnett, the first to be heard, received the two-year sentence. No appeal was taken, nor were any of the men indicted with Barnett tried at that time. Later, the other group, on being called for trial, also demanded separate hearings. Leslie Combs was chosen as the first to face a jury. The panel failed to agree on a verdict.

Judge Gardner's reported decision to transfer the cases to another county indicates that he regards the state of feeling in Breathitt such that the trials could not be heard impartially in Jackson. It was for that reason they were originally sent from Jackson to Catlettsburg.

Met With Difficulties

The original change of venue to Boyd County was not effected without difficulty. It will be recalled that Judge Sam Hurst, then presiding in the Breathitt Circuit Court, refused at first either to grant a change of venue or to vacate the bench.

Judge Hurst was a Republican and also had been a candidate in the 1921 election. The Winchester Democratic defendants did not want him to try their cases.

Ryland C. Musick, chief of the attorneys for The Winchester Democratic group, was fatally injured in an automobile accident near Lebanon, Virginia, last summer, and some persons doubt that, in view of his death, the cases ever will be pressed.

Mr. Musick was aggressive, not only in the defense of the four Democrats, but also in the prosecution of the nine men on the other side in the fight.

However, Clay Watkins, who was associated with Mr. Musick from the start, said emphatically today that there is no disposition among his clients either to avoid trial themselves or to let the prosecution of the opposing group drop.

Mr. Watkins said John Waugh, of Ashland, probably will take Mr. Musick's place as chief counsel, while Chester A. Bach, of Jackson, also will be employed. Henry L. Spencer, of Jackson, like Mr. Watkins, has been in the case from the outset.

On the other side, the chief attorneys are A. H. Patton, of Jackson, and A. Floyd Byrd, of Lexington.

History of Case

The suggestion that, because of Mr. Musick's death the whole affair might be "forgotten" is not as outlandish as it might seem to persons unacquainted with the history of the Clayhole case. Soon after the original indictments were returned, all 13 defendants signed a petition to Judge Hurst and Commonwealth Attorney J. M. McDaniel, stating they wanted to "let bygones be bygones."

The wording of this agreement described the bloody election-day battle in the light of a little difficulty among friends in which the authorities could not conceivably be deeply interested. The defendants, in the language of their petition, failed to see "where any good can result either to the community or to the Commonwealth of Kentucky in litigation over the matter."

Since the Clayhole battle, the judicial district in which Breathitt County is located has been altered and Judge Hurst no longer presides over the court here. This district was one of six changed by the 1924 legislature under a law, designed, its title said, to relieve congested dockets in Boyd and Perry Counties.

Approaching the Clayhole cases in interest here are the so-called "jail raid" cases, which also are set for trial at the next term. they are 11 defendants named in five indictments:

Bud Noble, Soldier Noble, Luther Noble, Will Penn Watts, Lewis Watts, Beecher Noble, Hagins Noble, Sam Grigsby, Tom Porter, Tom Noble, and Alfred Noble.

These cases date back to one o'clock one morning in December 1921, when A. A. "Smokey" Allen, Breathitt County Jailer, was awakened by a band of men who said they had brought in a prisoner. Allen directed his son, Oscar Allen, to let them in, and he did so. But the visitors had brought no prisoner. They came, instead, to "rescue" some of Allen's charges.

In the shooting melee that followed, Albert Roberts, deputy jailer, was killed; Miss Maggie Allen, the jailer's daughter, was mortally wounded; and Mrs. Sarah Allen, Oscar Allen's wife, received injuries which are believe to have caused her death more than a year later. The indictments charge the 11 defendants with the murder of Roberts and Miss Allen.

The men indicted, with the exception of Hagins Noble, who lived at Grapevine, Perry County, all were residents along Lost Creek, Breathitt County, and for the most part were relatives of Hargis Noble, Willie Noble, Alton Grigsby, and Isaac Watts.

These four men had, shortly before the attempted "rescues," been convicted for the killing of Joe Napier and were in custody. Hargis and Willie Noble, who had received life sentences, had been taken to the Clark County jail for safe keeping, but Alton Grigsby, who also had been given a life sentence, and Isaac Watts, who got a two-year term, were in "Smokey" Allen's jail. Neither Grigsby nor Lewis Watts got away in the raid. Will Penn Watts, however, received a death sentence. His attorneys took the cae to the Court of Appeals and obtained a reversal of the verdict. The Appellate Court found fault with the presiding judge's instructions to the jury.

The "jail raid" cases alone, even if the defendants should not demand separate trials, as is their right, might conceivably take up a good part of the 18 days of the next term, lawyers here say. Twenty-eight commonwealth witnesses are listed in the circuit clerks records. The defense would present that many or perhaps more.

Bud Noble and his two sons, Soldier and Luther Noble, have never been captured. they were the alleged leaders of the raid.

First Witness Tells Story

Louisville Post, June 14, 1922

The commonwealth this morning called Mrs. George McIntosh, widow of George McIntosh, one of the men killed, as the first witness in the trial of Leslie Combs, French Combs, Shade Combs, and George Allen, Jr., Democrats, under murder charges growing out of the Breathitt County election fight. The stage was cleared for the introduction of evidence after two days of preliminary activities.

Mrs. McIntosh was not an eyewitness of the battle. Her testimony told of her husband's wounds and his activities the day and night before his death.

Politics Charged

Despite assertions that politics would be kept in the background, repeated charges were made yesterday that politics entered into the trial preliminaries. Counsel for the four Democratic defendants declared that the decision of State Attorney John F. Coldiron to reverse the order of trial so as to reach the cases of The Winchester Democrats first was a result of politics.

The second instance which bore the mark of politics grew out of the selection of the jury. Five jurors excused by Mr. Coldiron were Democrats. The regular venire of the jury was exhausted at the afternoon session. Of ten men summoned for jury service from the bystanders all were Republicans. Counsel for The Winchester Democrats complained to this alleged effort to "load" the jury. Deputy Sheriff George Nicholson, who summoned the men, denied any purpose to get Republicans for the jury.

"I do not know the name of a man I secured, do not know their politics and such a thought never occurred to me," he said. "If anyone had suggested such a thing to me I would have arrested him and taken him before the judge. I worked under pressure of time and picked the first men who looked as if they would make good jurors."

Counsel for the defense told reporters before the opening of the night session that every prospective juror called would be a Republican and subsequent developments proved the assertion well founded.

Jury Selected

Impaneling of the jury to hear evidence in the Clayhole precinct election day murder cases, transferred here from Breathitt County, was completed late last night.

Immediately afterward the four Democrats of the group of 13 defendants, went on trial jointly pleading not guilty to a new indictment returned by the Boyd County grand jury charging conspiracy to prevent an election and murder. The original Breathitt County indictment charging only murder was quashed. The nine Republican defendants will stand trial on the murder indictment.

The Jurors

The members of the jury, with their reported political affiliations, are: J. T. Riffe, retired farmer, Democrat; T. R. Fowler, cook, Republican; John Moore, farmer, Democrat; George Dent, lumber inspector, Democrat; Henry Menshouse, foreman at a steel works, Republican; J. F. McComas, farmer, Democrat; Fred Kitchin, barber, Democrat; J. C. McNeal, telegraph operator, Independent; Eugene Hite, merchant, Republican; Green Ross, merchant, Republican; Harry Libie, laborer, Republican; James Sebastian, farmer, Republican.

In selecting the jury the commonwealth used all of its five peremptory challenges and the defense 13.

Democrats' Case Strongest

When Commonwealth Attorney John F. Coldiron elected to try The Winchester Democrats first, John M. Waugh, one of their attorneys, made vigorous objection, intimating that the court was playing politics. He pointed out that the case of the nine Republicans charged with killing Cleveland Combs was docketed first in Breathitt County.

Mr. Waugh filed demurrers to the new indictment against The Winchester Democrats, contending that the Boyd County grand jury had no legal right to add to the charges made by the Breathitt County body. Judge W. C. Halbert overruled the demurrers and also told Mr. Waugh that the commonwealth attorney had a legal right to select any of the cases he pleased for first trial.

Mr. Coldiron said the case of The Winchester Democrats was taken up first because it was the strongest of the four. The Winchester Democrats are Shade Combs, Leslie Combs, French Combs, and George Allen, Jr., accused of slaying George McIntosh.

Thought Continuance Sought

Coldiron said he would have selected the case of the nine Republicans for first trial for the murder of Asbury Combs if The Winchester Democratic attorneys had agreed to have that indictment quashed and a conspiracy bill substituted.

He pointed out that a conspiracy charge allowed a much broader field of evidence in that acts of the defendants prior to the slaying could be gone into. That fact, he said, made the case against The Winchester Democrats strongest. The Winchester Democratic attorneys refused to ask for a conspiracy writ against the Republicans on the ground that they feared their opponents would seek a continuance.

The reason behind The Winchester Democratic attorney's objections to the case against them first is said to lie in the fear that in case of conviction their clients would be discredited as witnesses against the nine Republicans. However, they showed some confidence of acquittal in not asking a separate trial for each of the defendants.

Usually, when men are jointly indicted, their attorneys demand a severance of the cases rather than "stake all on one throw."

In spite of their surprise when Mr. Coldiron selected their case for trial first, The Winchester Democratic attorneys announced ready and the work selecting a jury was begun. This started at two o'clock, and seven men had been agreed on at seven o'clock, when a recess was taken. The remainder was chosen in the night session.

Political Bias Feared

It was found that few of those summoned knew anything about the Clayhole cases, but peremptory challenges were taken advantage of by both sides in cases in which it was

	<p>thought that prospective jurors were biased politically one way or the other. The Winchester Democratic side objected to partisan Republicans, and the Republicans to partisan Democrats.</p> <p>"Can you try this case as though there were no politics in it?" was an infallible question of Mr. Waugh, in examining prospective talesmen.</p> <p>Behind the defense counsel sat "Aunt America" Combs, whose two sons fell in the Clayhole battle; her widowed daughters-in-law; Mrs. Cleveland Combs; and Mrs. Ethan Allen, whose husband was also a victim. Both Mrs. Cleveland Combs and Mrs. Allen held their babies in their arms, and the mothers cried a little every now and then. Mrs. McIntosh, whose husband the four Democrats are accused of killing, sat with the Republican attorneys.</p> <p>The attorneys for the nine Republicans are, with Mr. Coldiron, doing the prosecuting in the case now being tried. When the Republican cases are taken up, The Winchester Democratic attorneys will become prosecutors.</p> <p>http://www.breathittcounty.com/Clayhole6.html</p> <p>Clayhole Cases Are Dismissed Louisville Post, March 26, 1925</p> <p>The state's famous Clayhole election day killing cases was dismissed from the court record for all time today, nearly three and a half years after four men were killed and 17 wounded in election rioting in Breathitt County.</p> <p>Judge O. H. Pollard, acting upon a petition of 13 men under indictment, and four widows whose husbands were victims of the 1921 disturbance, dismissed the cases. The judge sustained their petition which asserted that the state would be put to great expense to prosecute the case, and that testimony undoubtedly would be so conflicting that no jury would be able to determine the guilt of those under indictment.</p> <p>Motions for dismissal of the cases were made yesterday. It was the second time an attempt had been made to petition the cases out of court; the previous petition having been presented in 1922.</p> <p>The alleged successful attempt to prevent the November 8, 1921, election in Clayhole precinct resulted in the slaying of Asberry Combs, Cleveland Combs, Ethern Allen, Democrats, and George McIntosh, Republican. The ballot boxes were destroyed and the balloting terminated.</p> <p>Several months later the grand jury returned indictments against Leslie Combs, French Combs, Shade Combs, and George Allen, Jr., charging them with murder in connection with the death of McIntosh. At the same time Will Barnett, Willie Davis, Will Campbell, Alfred Barnett, Andy Barnett, Marion Barnett, Ed Davis, Ed Combs, and Chester Davis, Republicans, were indicted for murder in connection with the death of the three Democrats. All of the defendants later were indicted on charges of conspiracy to prevent an election.</p> <p>A change of venue to Boyd County was obtained when it was alleged that the two factions had attempted to effect a compromise by which the indictments were to be dismissed.</p> <p>Democrats Found Guilty</p> <p>At the first trial in Catlettsburg, Boyd County, the four Democrats were found guilty and sentenced to prison for terms ranging from five to 15 years. The nine Republicans who testified against them in the conspiracy charge pleaded immunity on the ground that they had incriminated themselves in their testimony. Subsequently the conspiracy charges against them were dismissed.</p> <p>On appeals decided by the Court of Appeals, the sentence against The Winchester Democratic defendants were reversed on the ground that defendants were denied the right to offer testimony purporting to show that the Republicans had planned an attack on Clayhole precinct, the largest Democratic precinct in the county, and thereby elect a Republican ticket, or a large part of it.</p> <p>The action of the lower court in dismissing the conspiracy charges against the nine Republicans also was reversed by the Court of Appeals. The court held that the statute under which the dismissals were granted did not refer to common law offenses.</p> <p>Will Barnett, the first of the Republicans to go on trial at Catlettsburg in February 1923, was found guilty of manslaughter and conspiracy. He was sentenced to two years imprisonment, and when in June of that year, the Court of Appeals denied his motion for a new trial, accepted the sentence. Was There Ever Anything Worse.

The following is a letter written by Mr. John Patrick, from Lexington, to Judge D. B. Redwine, who is holding court in Breathitt county. We hang our heads in shame when we think that such a state of affairs as this letter reveals can exist in our own loved State.

I never heard of Mr. Patrick until this letter appeared in the Lexington Herald of Saturday morning. Upon investigation, I find that he is a worthy gentleman whose word is not doubted:

Lexington, Ky., Nov. 7, 1902,

Hon. D. B. Redwine, Judge of Breathitt Circuit court, Jackson, Ky.:

“Dear Sir:--I have been summoned to appear before the grand jury of Breathitt county on this day; I suppose for the purpose of making an indictment against the assassins of James Cockrill. It is not my desire to disobey the orders of your court, but I fear, should I come there under the present conditions, that I would likely be assassinated also, as I do not put any confidence in the protection that would be furnished me by the Sheriff of your county, some of the parties implicated in the killing being his deputies, as I am reliably informed; and two of his deputies having made attempts upon my life, one of them being made a deputy the day after he made the attempt.

“I was an eye witness to the killing of Cockrill, and there were some two or three persons doing the shooting, and I recognized one of them, who is now deputy sheriff, as I am informed, and if I should come before the grand jury I think I could furnish enough evidence to indict and convict most of the parties if not all of them, who are implicated in the Cockrell murder. At the time of the killing a number of the deputy sheriffs took positions in the different doors of the court house, from which the shooting was done, thereby preventing persons from entering the court house and making an investigation.

“I left your county because I thought I would have no protection in remaining there, from the Sheriff and his deputies, and I have no reason to believe that I would have any more protection now, as the Sheriff still retains those deputies; especially as I saw the killing and would be an important on the trial of these parties. And from what I can learn, the same state of lawlessness now exists that existed at the time I left.

“If you will ask the Governor to send a company of militia to Jackson and place them under a special bailiff, and have them take charge of the court house and the buildings surrounding it, so that I may be fully protected, I will very cheerfully come to Jackson and give evidence before the grand jury as to all the facts I know, and will furnish the officers of the Commonwealth with sufficient evidence to indict and convict the parties connected with the killing.

“Hoping that you will give me the proper protection and that the guilty parties may be brought to justice, I am, Yours truly, “John Patrick”

Breathitt.

The reports from Breathitt county get worse as the days go by.

Judge James Hargis went to Frankfort last week. While in Lexington last week he told reporters that he was going to Louisville on business, and that the affidavits of Marcum and Feltner were false. He said that there was no danger in Breathitt for anyone who would behave himself. Upon this we assume that Dr. Cox and Jim Cockrill didn't behave. Redwine refused to give John Patrick, who knows one of the men who shot Jim Cockrill, the protection asked, but issued an attachment for him. One of the deputy sheriffs has been indicted for assault on a woman. One who is a deputy turned loose with his gun in the Court House, but fortunately no one was killed. The judge did not even fine him. County Attorney Blanton has written a letter in which he promises to give Patrick protection aside from the Sheriff and his deputies. No reward has been offered for the assassins of Cox or Cockrill. The Governor last week appointed Judge Cooper of Mt. Sterling to try the contested election cases. Truly the good people of Breathitt county are reaping the fruits of a democratic administration of law with a vengeance.

County Attorney Blanton.

He Offers Capt. Patrick Fullest Protection If He Will Return To Jackson.

Lexington, Ky., Nov. 13.—In a signed statement received here Wednesday night from W. H. Blanton, county attorney of Breathitt county, he promises the fullest protection to Capt. John Patrick if the latter will return to Jackson to testify before the grand jury regarding the assassination of James Cockrell. Blanton says that on account of recent murders in Breathitt, the county is losing opportunity for development and calls upon the citizens of the county to throw aside their weapons and give up the feuds. As county attorney, he claims to have made all possible efforts to bring the guilty parties to justice, and says that one witness summoned, Silas McIntosh, has now been thrown into jail for refusing to answer questions asked by the grand jury. This fact and the protection offered Patrick is evidence that the authorities at Jackson want the law upheld.

John Patrick, formerly attorney at Jackson, in a published statement several days ago, claimed to know the assassins of Cockrell, that he saw the shots fired from his office window and recognized the murderers. He left Jackson and came to Lexington soon after the shooting. In his statement he said he was willing to testify before the Breathitt Grand Jury if Gov. Beckham would allow a company of state militia to accompany him, as he would be killed at Jackson without military protection. An attachment from

Jackson for Patrick is in the hands of the local sheriff, but Patrick can not be found.

Saturday (not Sunday, as reported) Dec. 3, 1904, all the men being admitted to bond on the same day in the sum of \$2,000 each.

The records of Justice Edwards' court show that on December 3, 1904, James and Elbert Hargis were arrested on a charge of murder and admitted to bail in the sum of \$2,000 each, and E. Callahan and Alex Hargis were arrested and admitted to bail in the same amount, December 3, each of the accused going on the others bond.

The following is the affidavit upon which they are alleged to have been arrested:

Affidavit.

The affiant, Henry Freeman, says that he was in the town of Jackson on the day that James Cockrill was shot and killed, and that while the shooting was going on or about the time said shooting was done, he believes that he saw Elbert Hargis, James Hargis and Ed Callahan and A. H. Hargis in the said court second story of the Courthouse. He says that he did not see any one else in said second story of the Courthouse on that day.

Subscribed and sworn to before me by Henry Freeman, this December, 3, 1904.

A peculiar thing about this affidavit is that it is signed by Freeman whom if his allegations be true could have cleared both Curt Jett and Britton, now under conviction for killing Cockrill. We are inclined to think that Mr. Freeman is mistaken in locating his men. All of the witnesses that have testified about those men have placed Judge Hargis and Sheriff Callahan on the second floor of Hargis Bros. Store and no one of them said that they saw either Alex or Elbert Hargis on the second floor of the courthouse when the shots were fired.

The magistrate, Edwards, was one of the star witnesses for the defense in the Marcum damage suit.

The whole proceedings in Breathitt county were evidently gotten up for no other purpose than to prevent the accused from being taken to Fayette county.

Judge Parker, of the Fayette court, refused to hear the question of jurisdiction until the accused are brought before him.

Judge J. H. Hazelrigg, Lewis McQuown and J. Smith Hays, representing the accused parties, after a conference with them, went to Frankfort, where on Tuesday they made a motion before the Court of appeals for a stay of proceedings. The Court of Appeals granted a temporary writ of injunction against the Judge of the Fayette Circuit Court. Final hearing of a motion for a permanent writ of prohibition will be had on Friday, February 10th.

Nothing further will be done until the question of jurisdiction is determined by the higher court.

The More You Hear the Worse It Gets.—Mose Feltner and Sam Fields Now Giving Depositions in this City.—What Next.

The name of Breathitt county is so significant of wrong doing that nothing else is thought of when the name is mentioned and there are certain names that come readily to mind at the name of Breathitt. We will keep our readers informed as best we can of Breathitt's doings.

Following the action of the higher court at Frankfort granting a temporary stay of proceedings against the Breathitt county gentlemen indicted in Fayette county. Col. John R. Allen, attorney for the Fayette court, filed a motion and the Court of Appeals issued an order for James W. Edwards, Magistrate of Breathitt county, to appear before it tomorrow, February 10th, and produce all records, warrants, bonds, memoranda, etc., in the Hargis-Callahan cases. It is the purpose of Col. Allen to show that they are forgeries; that Edwards was in collusion with the Hargises and did not act in good faith.

On the rules issued by the Clark court, Sheriff McCord and Deputy Stokely went to Perry county last week and arrested Mose Feltner and Sam Fields. These are two of the witnesses that are alleged to have been spirited away from here during the Marcum damage trial. They were brought before the Court Saturday morning and failing to give bond they were placed in charge of officer Dock Pigg.

Senator Hargis came down from Jackson Saturday afternoon and gave bond in the sum of \$2,000 for an appearance. The rule and warrants of arrest for Judge Hargis and Sheriff Ed. Callahan were sent to Jackson. They will be served by Coroner M. C. Bailey. Mr. Bailey executed the bonds and returned them to the Sheriff of this county yesterday. James Hargis, in the sum of \$1,000, signed by A. P. Crawford, Steven Cundiff, W. H. Blanton and Jacob E. Lane. Ed. Callahan's bond for \$4,000 was signed by the same parties.

For satisfactory reasons, the depositions of Mose Feltner and Sam Fields have been taken; that of Feltner, occupying the day Tuesday, and until late yesterday afternoon. A letter was given to Feltner since he has been a prisoner here in which dire consequences were threatened in case he gave his deposition. He denies being in contempt saying he left the state through fear. Feltner says that he had been employed to kill Marcum and implicates Alex. Hargis, Jim Hargis, Ed Callahan, and B. F. French. He implicates the first three in the killing of Cockrill. His reward for killing Marcum was to be an acquittal on the charge of killing Jesse Fields, who was one of French's lieutenants in the French-Eversole feud or, if convicted, a pardon would be obtained for him. If, on the other hand, he refused to carry out the orders, he would be sentenced and hanged. The deposition of Sam Fields will be taken in connection with that of Feltner.

More and More Of It.—It Looks Like the Beginning of the End..

We referred to the affidavit of Mose Feltner that was then being taken, last week. Later, that of Sam Fields was given. These affidavits reveal in detail the plans that were formed to assassinate James Cockrill and J. B. Marcum; they also throw some light on the assassination of Dr. Cox.

James Hargis, Alex Hargis, Elbert Hargis, B. F. French and Ed. Callahan are the men implicated by the testimony of Feltner and Fields. B. F. French appears to have been the leading spirit in enticing the witnesses to leave this city during the Marcum damage trial, though James and Alex Hargis and Callahan appear in the same connection.

It would be difficult to believe the horrible story told by these witnesses were it not for the fact that nearly all of it is corroborated by witnesses that have testified in former trials.

The stenographic report of Feltner's testimony was printed in the leading papers Sunday. It would occupy four solid pages of this paper which is much more space than we can give to it. It is a story of crime unparalleled in our history.

The threatening letter that we referred to last week was given to Feltner by Lewis Hays of Jackson, who suddenly disappeared. It was feared that the lives of Feltner and Fields were in danger and Judge Benton ordered that they be placed in the jail where they are at the present time.

The efforts made by the Breathitt authorities to have Feltner returned to Jackson on a bench warrant failed.

It is held that being a prisoner under the jurisdiction of this court he cannot be turned over to another until his case is disposed of. Before the Court of Appeals, the injunction proceedings have been continued until Saturday next. A number of witnesses have been summoned to testify.

It is a question of jurisdiction between Fayette county, where James, Alex, Elbert Hargis and Ed Callahan are under indictment for killing James Cockrill and Breathitt county, where it is alleged, warrants were sworn out for their arrest before the indictments were made in Fayette county. Cockrill was shot from the Courthouse in Jackson, but died in a hospital at Lexington.

Intimidating a Witness.

One way to intimidate a witness is to have them indicted. Riley Coldiron was indicted at the special July term of the Breathitt Circuit Court, 1903, for perjury because he had testified before the grand jury of said court that he saw Wm. Britton at one of the windows in the courtroom on the day that Cockrill was shot and killed.

(This is the grand jury that was "busted up.")

Monday a motion was entered by Attorneys T. T. and W. N. Cope demurring to the indictment because same was not drawn in conformity to the code and statute, which was sustained by the court. The case has been referred to a grand jury now in session for a new hearing.

Britton has been convicted and no one now doubts but that Coldiron told the truth.

Breathitt.

Riley Coldiron has been re-indicted by the Breathitt county grand jury for false swearing. He swore before a former grand jury that he saw Bill Britton at the window when James Cockrill was assassinated. This indictment is astounding in view of the fact that no one now doubts from the evidence that Britton was at the window and that he fired some of the shots. He is now under conviction for life imprisonment.

The trial of Mose Feltner was called at Jackson and Breathitt officers came here for him, but Jailer Boone refused to give him up.

Later a rule was issued by Judge Riddle against Boone for contempt and an officer was sent to arrest him.

Boone refused to recognize the authority of an officer of Breathitt county to arrest him. It is understood that if Mr. Boone is properly summoned by a Clark county officer he will go to Jackson.

The Court of Appeals has not yet rendered a decision on the question of jurisdiction between the counties of Breathitt and Fayette.

Breathitt. There is no lack of interest in incidents growing out of the Breathitt county condition. Judge Riddle, on Jailer Boone's refusal to deliver the prisoners, Feltner and Fields, from the jail here to the Breathitt bailiff, had Boone tried by a jury at Jackson in his absence and fined \$500. In the meantime, Boone went, with his attorney, D. L. Pendleton, before the Court of Appeals and had a writ of prohibition issued against Judge Riddle.

The Breathitt Grand jury made no effort to indict the murderers of Dr. Cox and J. B. Marcum but did indict Sam Jett of this city, for arson. It is alleged he burned his own house in Breathitt county in 1889. They also indicted Mose Feltner on two counts; one charges him with murdering a peddler a number of years ago, the other with confederating with the late J. B. Marcum to kill James Hargis. Sam Fields was also indicted. We noted the indictment of Riley Coldiron last week. All four of these men have been strong in the prosecution of the Hargises.

Friday morning on the grounds of fraudulent proceedings in Breathitt county the Appellate Court, Judge Orear writing the opinion and other Judges concurring, rendered a decision giving Fayette county jurisdiction on the indictments for killing James Cockrill, against A. H. Hargis and Elbert Hargis, and Ed. Callahan. Their attorney at Jackson, J. J. C. Back wired that they would come to Lexington at once. Later they requested that a special bailiff be sent to arrest them naming Chief Reagan, of the Lexington Police force as the man preferred. Reagan went to Jackson Saturday morning and was expected to return with the prisoners the same evening but did not. Saturday evening he sent the following dispatch to the Lexington Circuit Judge.

"The three Hargises are in my custody. I am waiting for Callahan to come in from the country. Will be down Monday morning."

Monday morning Reagan with Alex and James Hargis arrived in Lexington. Elbert Hargis came to Lexington on the afternoon train. All three of the brothers were placed in the custody of the Fayette county Jailer and were locked up in the hospital ward.

Various reasons were assigned as to why Callahan did not come; one that living twenty miles from Jackson he did not know of the Court of Appeals decision; another that he was on the river rafting logs, and another that he was sick. It does not appear that Mr. Reagan made any effort to find him.

Sheriff Callahan came down from Jackson Tuesday and surrendered. The defendants applied for bail before Judge Parker Tuesday. Commonwealth's Attorney objected. Col. Allen said that if a motion for bail was to be made he wanted to produce evidence to the court to show why the defendants were not entitled to bail. He said that the Hargises was much stronger than that produced by the Commonwealth against William Britton, who had been found guilty and given a life sentence. He said that in this case the evidence and presumption were great, and he did not think the Hargises entitled to bail.

Judge Morton for the defense contended that the purpose of bail was to bring the accused before the court and that there could be no doubt of their presence at the proper time and that the introduction of evidence was unnecessary.

After a conference between the attorneys and the court it was decided to begin hearing evidence on the application for bail Monday next March 20.

The evidence will be in substance the same as was presented in the Britton trial.

The efforts of certain Democratic politicians to inject politics into the trials of the Hargis brothers and Callahan, should be frowned upon by every honest citizen. The fact that Judge James Hargis is chairman of the 10th District Democratic Committee should cut no figure one way or the other. The troubles in Breathitt county are but remotely connected with politics. Dr. Cox and James Cockrill were Democrats, J. B. Marcum was a Republican.

There is a stigma resting on the State now because of a belief that partisan trials have been held.

Let us have no more of it.

Hargises and Callahan.

Testimony on the application for bail by the Hargis brothers and Callahan was begun at Lexington Monday. The court decided that the burden of proof was on the Commonwealth. Mrs. J. B. Marcum, Mose Feltner and a number of other witnesses testified in substance the same as given in former trials.

A. C. Bowman, foreman of the grand jury, that was said to have been "busted up" was a witness. He said Alex Hargis came to the grand jury room during investigation and told him and the other grand jurors that Riley Coldiron must be indicted for perjury. Witness said Alex Hargis was mad and demanded the indictment, claiming that Coldiron had testified to a lie against William Britton.

Witness said that B. F. French, Judge Redwine and Judge Fleener were with Alex Hargis when he came to the grand jury room. Witness said other members of the grand jury told him that unless he dismissed them they would adjourn themselves, and the grand jury broke up in a hurry.

Yesterday morning Anse White, a brother of Tom White, was on the stand. His testimony was new and sensational. It was to the effect that Judge James Hargis had arranged with himself and others to kill Dr. Cox, James, Tom and McKinley Cockrill and attorney Vaughn. This work was to be done in the Courthouse during the trial of Tom Cockrill for bail for killing one of the Hargises.

Testimony for the defense was begun. It is probable that the question will be decided this week.

Marcum, came the decision reversing the case of Curt Jett sentenced to hang for killing James Cockrill. Jett is now serving a life sentence for killing Marcum.

On the application for bail of Aleck, James and Elbert Hargis and Ed Callahan, Judge Parker at Lexington, granted Aleck Hargis bail in the sum of \$15,000 but held the others without bail. They are charged with being parties to the assassination of James Cockrill.

The Hargis Trials.

The three Hargis brothers and Ed Callahan will be put on trial next Tuesday, at Lexington, on the charge of conspiring to have James Cockrill assassinated. We have no feeling of prejudice against any one of the accused. We are not acquainted with Elbert Hargis or Callahan, but we do know the two older Hargis brothers. We did business with them for twenty years in a pleasant way and they are both subscribers to our paper. In all that we have reported from Breathitt we have not tried to do other than give the facts. Ours was the first paper in the State to take up Breathitt county in matters seriously. Week after week we reported the conditions there; we did it without favor and without fear. Now that we have done our part in bringing before the public information that will bring a judicial investigation of those accused of perpetrating some of the crimes in Breathitt county, we would lose our self respect, if we said or did anything that would prevent any one or all of them from getting a fair and impartial trial.

This is what we have contended for in the Goebel cases and we contend for the same thing for the Hargises.

If there should be any attempt to pack the jury with men politically or otherwise prejudiced against the Hargises we will show it up to the best of our ability. On the other hand, if the political or other friends of the Hargises undertake to manipulate matters regardless of the facts, we will also as readily show that up. The Lexington Herald of Tuesday has a two-column editorial that breathes the spirit of justice and right. We give the following extract:

“Those accused of crimes are entitled to a fair and impartial trial, by an honest and unbiased jury, and that official or citizen who would attempt to secure a jury certain to convict, or influence a jury to convict without respect to the evidence and the law, should be, and would be, condemned by every honest citizen of the State. But not only are the accused entitled to a fair and impartial trial, but the people of the Commonwealth, in whose name the prosecution is carried on, and the law which has been violated by the assassination of a citizen of the State, are also entitled to a fair and impartial trial, before an honest and unprejudiced jury; that official or citizen who would attempt to have a jury selected which would acquit irrespective of the evidence and law is as much to be censured as is the one who attempts to pack a jury to convict.”

Circuit Court.

Judge Benton Wednesday morning over-ruled the motion of Felix Feltner and B. F. French for a continuance of the cases against them for contempt. He said that the contempt cases would be tried at this term of court even if the term should have to be extended, but that he would not assign the cases for trial until the cases at Lexington had been disposed of.

The papers were served by Deputy Sheriff Stokley.

Hargis Trials.

After ten days delay it is expected that the trials of the Hargis brothers and Callahan will be entered into at Lexington today. The accused elected to be tried separately and the commonwealth decided to try Judge James Hargis first. Five jurors have been selected, subjected to preemptory challenges by either side. Unless there is another hitch the work of completing the jury will be begun this morning. The activity of the political friends of Judge Hargis in Fayette and other counties in his behalf, is noticeable around the Courthouse at Lexington.

The Hargis Trial.

The trial of Judge James Hargis at Lexington is going on. The Jury was completed last week. As usual, in all of those cases, there has been some sensational features. A Mr. Bacon was accepted on the jury who stated after his acceptance that he had been active in the interest of the accused and had suggested to the attorneys for the defense the name of a man to accept on the jury who would be favorable to the defense. On motion of the Commonwealth, Bacon was excused. It is openly charged that Deputy Sheriffs during the selection of the jury were active in the interest of the accused.

The action of the city authorities of Lexington from the Mayor down is a subject of criticism.

The examination of witnesses began Monday.

Five witnesses testified Monday.

With the exception of Charles Robbins, all had testified in the Britton trial in January and gave substantially the same testimony here.

Robbins testified in the Jett trial at Cynthiana, but when wanted in Lexington failed to appear and was located in Cincinnati with B. F. French. On the stand yesterday he admitted his friendliness with the defendant but his testimony was very strong against Jett and Britton. The Commonwealth was not allowed to prove why he failed to appear in the Britton case.

Dr. A. H. Barkley, the physician who attended James Cockrill at the Good Samaritan Hospital after the wounded man was brought from Jackson to Lexington testified to the nature of the wounds which caused death.

Riley Coldiron, of this city, testified the same as in the Britton trial. Miss Sue Williams, of Jackson, on the day Cockrill was shot, was upstairs in the Day Bros. Store. She heard the shooting, or at least three of the shots and reached the front store window as the last shot was fired.

She saw Curt Jett come out of the Courthouse and cross toward the Hargis store about two minutes after the shooting. He could hardly have had time to enter the store before he turned back to the Courthouse.

Harrison Blanton was on the Crawford corner opposite the side of the Courthouse from which the shots were fired. He saw two men at the window nearest the corner on the second floor of the courthouse, but could not say who they were and heard about six shots. He saw Cockrill running down the street.

Witness then went to the front door of the Courthouse and saw Curt Jett and Jesse Spicer. Jett had a pistol by his side. Britton was coming down the steps on the left, that

is from the side where the shooting came from.

Sebastian Williams, a Breathitt county farmer, testified that he went to Jackson with his brother Cash Williams, a school teacher, the day of the shooting. When the shots were fired, witness and his brother were in Judge Fleenor's office in the courthouse.

The firing sounded at first like planks being thrown down. People ran down the street. The two Williams stayed in the office only a short time and went into the hall. Curt Jett was at the front door.

Looking out the front door, witnesses saw James Hargis in the second floor window of his store on the opposite side of the street. He was standing up and it looked like he had a gun in his hand. Hargis called to Jett, "You'll get shot," or "Who's shot," and Jet replied something.

A number of witnesses were introduced by the commonwealth apparently for no other purpose than to establish the killing of Cockrill.

On Tuesday and yesterday some very damaging testimony against Judge Hargis was given. Anse White testified that he was in the court room when the application for bail for Tom Cockrill for killing Ben Hargis was made.

Judge Hargis at that time, he said, gave him a 45-calibre revolver with instructions that when trouble occurred to shoot Jim Cockrill, Attorney Vaughn, who was Tom Cockrill's attorney; McKinley Cockrill, Dr. Cox and another man whom he now believes was Marcum.

A large number of Democratic politicians are active in the interest of Judge Hargis and there is a suspicion that it will be a hung jury, regardless of the testimony. It is probable the trial will last for several weeks.

The Hargis Trial.

The trial of James Hargis, County Judge of Breathitt county, at Lexington, continues with unabated interest. The testimony of Mose Feltner was given since our last report. He gave in detail the plans that were laid to kill Cockrill and Marcum. It was in substance the same as the affidavit that was published several weeks ago.

S. S. Taulbee, the County Clerk of Breathitt, told of a conversation in which Judge Hargis declared that "while he would not have Jim Cockrill killed himself, he would employ lawyers to defend the man who did." Taulbee also read from the county records, orders of Judge Hargis appointing Jett, Britton and Spicer, Deputy Sheriffs and testified that Hargis refused to accept bond from James Cockrill from office about two weeks before the killing.

M. J. Peters declared that when Hargis and Callahan were at the Hargis store window, both had guns. This is the first intimation that both were armed.

J. B. Little said that Hargis threatened to kill him and kicked him in getting off the train, pointing gun at him and cursing him because of his testimony in the Curt Jett trial at Cynthiana.

Sam Hays testified to seeing Hargis at the front door of his store after the shooting and hearing him tell Jett to go back and guard the court house and Jett's reply that "nobody was bothering the court house now."

A light was also thrown upon the alleged movements of Elbert Hargis at the time of the shooting. M. W. Carter and J. B. Little saw Bill Jett and Hargis coming toward the court house from the direction of Jett's whisky house, where witnesses in the Britton trial located them, and saw them go back after looking in the alley where Cockrill lay.

Hacket Combs said he saw Elbert Hargis some minutes afterward coming toward the court house by the way of the back street.

A witness that was recalled, stated the reason he did not answer the summons of the court, was fear; that Breck Combs, the acting County Judge of Breathitt, threatened to shoot his damned head off for testifying against the Hargises.

The testimony of County Clerk Taulbee was sensational. He swore he had heard Judge Hargis say: "I would not kill Cockrill myself, or have it done, but I would like to sit in court by the side of the man who would do it, and I would pay the fee of the best lawyer in the State to defend him."

It was also shown by Taulbee's records that Jim Hargis, as County Judge had made orders appointing Curtis Jett, Bill Britton and Jesse Spicer deputies under Sheriff Callahan, and that an order reappointing Britton had been made after the killing of Cockrill.

The records of Clerk Taulbee also showed that an order had been entered by Hargis, as county Judge, July 14, 1902, in which he declared the office of Town Marshall vacant. This was while Cockrill was filling the office, and was just one week before he was shot.

Monday morning a surprise was sprung by the Commonwealth introducing as its own witness, Felix Feltner, the cousin of Mose Feltner, and the man who is claimed by the latter to have assisted Judge Hargis, B. F. French and Callahan in intimidating or buying him so that he would leave the State and not testify in any of the trials growing out of the Marcum and Cockrill murders.

Feltner was discovered on a train coming from Winchester to Lexington and was summoned as a witness by Deputy sheriff Kit Wilkerson.

He corroborated Mose Feltner in every detail as to the trip made by the two Feltners, Hargis, Callahan, French and others between Leslie county, Jackson and Winchester and in the afternoon he admitted that the purpose of these trips was that Hargis and Mose Feltner might agree "not to prosecute each other."

He further admitted receiving \$1,000 from Hargis for the purpose of defending his cousin Mose, but declared he had borrowed the money of Hargis. The manner in which he transferred this amount to the Winchester Bank corresponded with Mose Feltner's account.

As to the \$1,000, Mose Feltner said had been entrusted to his cousin for him, the witness' account also tallied with that of Mose, but he declared a stranger, he did not know who, had given him this money. His description of the man leads many to believe that he is a Clark citizen.

William Smith, a former deputy of Sheriff Callahan, testified that before Cockrill was killed, Judge Hargis had declared the doomed man must die and that if witness would not kill him Curt Jett and George Smith would.

The testimony for the Commonwealth closed Monday.

Tuesday morning the defense entered a motion which was argued briefly by Judge Morton, that the testimony of Felix Feltner, the alleged accomplice of B. F. French and Judge Hargis in bribing Mose Feltner to leave the State, be excluded from consideration of the jury. This motion was overruled and Judge Hargis was then placed of the stand as the first witness in his own defense. He made sweeping denials of the statements made by "Anse" White, Mose Feltner, Dan Bush, S. S. Taulbee, Jeff Smith, Hardin Childers, J. B. Little, Sherman Cope and other witnesses for the Commonwealth, as to conversations and plots with him in which the murder of Cockrill was alleged to have been either planned or discussed.

Judge Hargis was on the stand during the day and was being cross-examined by Mr. Bronston when court adjourned.

As we went to press Wednesday, Hargis was still on the stand.

Circuit Court.

Tuesday the contempt cases against Alec and James Hargis, Ed Callahan and B. F. French were called, but owing to one of the defendants being of trial at Lexington, they were continued to a special term to be held May 29th.

Hargis Trial.

Judge Hargis in leaving the stand at the close of his testimony and against the protest of attorneys on both sides, make a dramatic statement to the effect that he was innocent of any crime. King Ford was the most important witness for the defense.

All of the witnesses introduced by the defense were for the purpose of contradicting the commonwealth witnesses. Considerable importance is given to the money transactions between Judge Hargis and Mose and Felix Feltner. Hargises version of it is different from that of the Feltners. Sheriff McCord, of this county, was a witness. He was shown a note by Judge Hargis that was different from the one presented in court. Hon. J. F. Winn was summoned yesterday, it is alleged for the purpose of contradicting McCord. Curt Jett and Tom White, both under life sentence for killing J. B. Marcum, were brought from the penitentiary as witnesses.

The testimony of Jett did not amount to anything, as he declined to answer all pertinent questions, the Court telling him that he could decline any question which might tend to incriminate him. White was not placed on the stand.

Rufus Lisle, of the Winchester Bank, this city, was a witness in regard to the alleged notes, but could give no information.

The testimony, subject to conditions, was concluded at noon yesterday. Arguments before the jury will consume the remainder of the week, there will be six speeches. For the Commonwealth Bronston, Allen and Byrd. For the defense, Lee, Morton and one other.

The opinion prevails that it will be a hung jury regardless of the evidence.

The grand jury of Fayette county in the name and by the authority of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, accuse James Hargis, Elbert Hargis, Ed. Callahan, Alexander Hargis and Jesse Spicer of the crime of murder, committed as follows, viz: That said James Hargis, Elbert Hargis, Ed. Callahan, Alexander Hargis and Jesse Spicer in connection with Curtis Jett and William Britton on the 24th day of January, 1905, in the county of Breathitt, and State of Kentucky did unlawfully, feloniously and with malice aforethought shoot and kill James Cockrill with guns and pistols loaded with powder and leaden balls and other hard substances from which shooting and wounding, he, the said Cockrill with in one year and a day after said shooting and wounding died in Fayette county.

Second.—The said James Hargis, Elbert Hargis, Ed. Callahan, Alexander Hargis and Jesse Spicer, together with Curtis Jett, William Britton and other persons unknown to the grand jury on the 25th day of January, 1905, and prior thereto and before the finding of this indictment formed and entered into a conspiracy with each other, the purpose of which conspiracy was to kill and murder James Cockrill and pursuant thereto and in furtherance of said conspiracy and while the same existed the said Curtis Jett and William Britton and others to the grand jury unknown and with the knowledge and consent and by the direction and procurement of said James Hargis, Alexander Hargis, Elbert Hargis and Ed. Callahan on the 25th day of January in the county of Breathitt and State of Kentucky did unlawfully, feloniously and with malice aforethought shoot and wound James Cockrill with guns and pistols loaded with powder and balls and other hard substances from which shooting and wounding the said James Cockrill within one year and one day from the time of said shooting and wounding died in Fayette county, Kentucky, and he said James Hargis, Elbert Hargis, Ed. Callahan, Alexander Hargis and

Jesse Spicer before the time of said killing did unlawfully, willfully, feloniously and with malice aforethought, advise, incite, procure and advise the said Curtis Jett and William Britton and others unknown to the grand jury to so shoot and wound and kill the said Cockrill and at the time said shooting and wounding occurred which resulted in the death of said Cockrill as above stated, that said James Hargis, Elbert Hargis, Alexander Hargis and Jesse Spicer were present conveniently near, and did unlawfully, willfully, feloniously and with malice aforethought aid, abet, counsel, advise, incite and encourage the said Curtis Jett, William Britton and others unknown to the grand jury to do said shooting, wounding and killing.
Against the peace and dignity of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Franklin Circuit Court.

Commonwealth of Kentucky, Plaintiff, vs. Indictment, Caleb Powers, Defendant.

The grand jury of the county of Franklin, in the name and by the authority of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, accuse Caleb Powers of the crime of being accessory before the fact to the willful murder of William Goebel, committed as follows, viz: The said Caleb Powers in the said county of Franklin, on the 30th day of January, A. D., 1900, and before the finding of this indictment unlawfully, willfully, feloniously, and of his malice aforethought, and with intent to bring about the death and procure the murder of William Goebel, did conspire with W. H. Culton, F. W. Golden, Green Golden, John L. Powers, John Davis, Charles Finley, W. S. Taylor, Henry Youtsey, James Howard, Berry Howard, Harlan Whittaker, Richard Combs and others to this grand jury unknown, and did counsel, advise, encourage, aid and procure Henry Youtsey, James Howard, Berry Howard, Harlan Whittaker, Richard Combs and other persons to this grand jury unknown, unlawfully, willfully, feloniously and of their malice aforethought, to kill and murder William Goebel, which one of the last five above-named persons, or another person acting with them, but who is to this grand jury unknown, so as aforesaid then there, thereunto by said Caleb Powers before the fact counseled, advised, encouraged, aided and procured, did by shooting and wounding said Goebel with a gun or pistol loaded with powder and other explosives and leaden and steel ball and other hard substances and from which said shooting and wounding the said Goebel died on the third day of February, 1900, but which of said last above named persons, so as aforesaid, actually fired the shot that killed the said Goebel is to this grand jury unknown; against the peace and dignity of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Editor's Note.—Under the instructions of the Court at Georgetown, Powers was convicted of conspiracy, sentenced to be hung and is now in jail. Under the instructions of the Court at Lexington, Hargis could not be convicted of conspiracy and is now a free man.

The Hargis Trial.

The trial of county Judge James Hargis was the most remarkable in the State's history; it lasted from April 11th to May 6th. The attorneys for the prosecution were, Commonwealth's Attorney John R. Allen, Charles J. Bronston, of Lexington and Byrd and Jouett, of this city.

Defense, Morton, Webb & Wilson; John L. Lee, of Lynchburg, Va.; E. P. Farrell, George R. Hunt, O. H. Pollard, C. W. Miller.

One hundred and ten witnesses were examined.

The jury was given the case at 9 p. m., May 5th, and discharged on a failure to agree at 1 p. m., May 6th. It stood for acquittal as follows; Fred Roser, John W. Lancaster, J. H. Tucker, George D. Karsner, James Friley, C. W. Hardeman, S. C. Robinson, David McCord, C. J. Graves, Jr., and Sam Buchanan.

Those who stood for conviction were, Roger Cannon and John Scully.

The greatest surprise was the instructions given by the trial Judge.

Weeks had been given by the prosecution to establish a conspiracy, but, under the instructions, the jury could not consider that part of the testimony. It is not believed that it would have been possible to convict Hargis before a jury on any kind of testimony.

Following the discharge of the jury a number of them stepped immediately over to Judge Hargis and shook him heartily by the hand, one patting him affectionately on the back and whispered something which was unheard by other ears.

Judge Hargis was taken by Deputy Jailer William Ahern to the Phoenix Hotel and café, where they ate dinner. When asked why Judge Hargis had been permitted to go to the hotel for dinner, Jailer Wallace replied: "Because he wanted to, I suppose."

It is significant fact that James Cockrill, the man assassinated, was a Democrat and Judge Hargis is also a Democrat, (Chairman of the 10th district committee). A political color was given the case by many of the leading Democrats, using every manner of means to prevent a conviction. We do not believe that a very large percent of The Winchester Democrats in the State believe in prosecuting their party for such ends but the facts as we have stated them cannot be controverted.

Monday morning Judge Hargis was given bail in the sum of \$25,000.

In the afternoon he returned to his home at Jackson.

The cases against Ed Callahan and Elbert Hargis will be considered today.

Judge Parker's Error.

We are not lawyer enough to criticize Judge Parker's instructions, and we would not like to criticize his motives without any information as to what they were, but there is one thing we do feel able to criticize and that something is the bane of our courts all over the Union. It is vulgarly spoken of as "influence." We believe if it was carefully analyzed by a scientific social economist he would call it "Anarchy." Judge Parker erred in allowing the jury to find out that the defendant was a Democrat, that he had business friends. He erred in allowing all the "fuss," to be made over Judge Hargis in the presence of the jury. Whether Judge Hargis had one friend or one million, whether he was a Democrat or Prohibitionist, made no difference in the question at issue as to whether or not he was guilty of complicity in Cockrill's murder; and all such questions were brought into the case for the sole purpose of befuddling the judge and jury. Any "influence" brought into a trial that is not demanded by strict and impartial justice is out of place and ought to be at once excluded while the party guilty of bringing it in ought to be fined and punished to the extent of the law for contempt of court. Such contempt cannot inspire respect, and without respect for courts the people will continue to lynch.

Sent His Love.

Judge Hargis on his way to Jackson, Monday, was accompanied by Mr. Doug Hayes, also Mr. B. F. French of this city, when the train arrived at the depot here Mr. French got off and was leaving, when Judge Hargis hailed him as follows: "O Fult, give Sam Jett my love. Tell him I will see him in Jackson when he comes to be tried for burning his father's house. Tell him I will have money to pay the witnesses."

French answered: "Want me to tell anyone else anything?"

Hargis: "Yes, give Woods McCord my love."

McKinley Cockrill, a younger brother of the assassinated James Cockrill was at the depot and all of this was said for his benefit.

In the mean time Mr. Hayes stepped off the train and watched Cockrill.

Hayes is an ex-convict, convicted for murder and pardoned by the Governor.

Up to a late hour yesterday neither McCord or Jett had received the loving message from Judge Hargis.

Office Holders, Office Seekers And Butters In.

"I know my action is not pleasant to many in this Courthouse. Have we not seen the maneuvers of many officers in this court? They say he is a powerful Democrat. My God, haven't we seen evidence enough from the time this case was brought here that he is a powerful Democrat. These minions of this powerful Democrat have censured and criticized me because I refused to be an automaton, ignore my oath of office and allow these men to go back to Breathitt county, never to be tried. This man is a power in his county; none can deny that. He is a power in the party of which I have been a humble servant all my life. They say he has done more for Breathitt county than any other man. He has amassed a fortune, but what has he done for the good of the people, for religion, law, anything?

Although a prisoner in the county jail, he wields more influence among a certain class of people, I believe, than I do. It is because he is a masterful man, a man of strong influence, strong personalty, a trait dangerous for those who cross his path."

The above is an extract from Col. John R. Allen's speech in the Hargis case. The truth of what he says will be corroborated by everyone that was around the Courthouse during the trial. Not only were there county and city officers playing the game of intimidation, but some were present from the State's departments at Frankfort, and in addition, from several counties there were the office holders, office seekers and rubbers in, all trying to gain the favor of Judge Hargis and the powers that be, by hampering the prosecution.

It is a significant fact that among the gang of hoodlums that were working to clear Hargis, were some of the same men that were conspicuous at Georgetown trying to secure the conviction of Caleb Powers. To what degree of degradation has The Winchester Democratic party fallen when officers and office seekers in order to curry favor will seek to clear one man, regardless of the facts because he is a Democrat and convict another, regardless of facts, because he is a Republican.

Breathitt Cases.

Last Saturday Ed Callahan and Elbert Hargis were admitted to bail in the sum of \$10,000 each and all the cases continued until September. In the meantime the court of Appeals will be asked to pass on the instruction given by Judge Parker in the James Hargis case. It is claimed by the Commonwealth that the instructions were contrary to the indictment and the facts as proven.

Breathitt.

The regular term of the Breathitt Circuit court began at Jackson Monday.

Mose Feltner last week wrote to the Governor and to Judge Riddle, asking for a guard. The Governor referred the matter to Judge Riddle who stayed the proceedings against Feltner until Monday. Feltner filed Tuesday an affidavit setting forth the reasons why he was afraid to go to Jackson. He cites that J. B. At the first term of court after the case had been transferred Mr. Jett was ready with his witnesses but the Commonwealth was not and the case was set for the 11th day of July, last. On that day Mr. Jett was again present in court with his witnesses and urged a trial, but the Commonwealth was not ready. The court announced from the bench that he would continue the case until the 8th day of the November term. Again Mr. Jett was ready, but the Commonwealth was not. No Witnesses, Judge Riddle continued the case until Friday of last week. Again there were no witnesses for the Commonwealth, and

<p>Judge Riddle dismissed the case. The Sun-Sentinel, Thursday, November 30, 1905</p> <p>The following letter was sent by Mr. Sam Jett of this city, to Judge James Hargis of, of Breathitt county. "Winchester, Ky. Dec. 14, 1905 "James Hargis, Judge Breathitt County, Jackson, Ky. "Sir, - As you are doubtless aware the grand jury of Breathitt county last February indicted you, Ed Callahan, John White and John Abner and others for the murder of James Cockrill. The court of appeals decided that Fayette county had assumed jurisdiction of you and Callahan prior to Breathitt county's taking this jurisdiction, but there was no indictment in Fayette county against John Smith and John Abner. These two men now stand indicted in Breathitt county for the murder of James Cockrill. They have never been arrested, and, of course, have never executed bond. At present they are fugitives from justice. As an uncle of James Cockrill I am writing to you as Judge of Breathitt county to ask that you kindly request the Governor to issue a reward of \$500 each for the arrest and conviction of Smith and Abner. This reward, Judge, should be for the 'arrest and conviction' for if it is issued only for the 'arrest and delivery' to the Jailer of Breathitt county, you, yourself, might have the two men brought in to the Jailer and then execute a 'strawbond' for them and thus get possession of the \$1,000 reward. Do you recall any kindred transaction ever having taken place between you and B.F. French in the arrest of any other person for whom a reward of \$300 was offered. If this has escaped your memory and you will ask me, I will refresh it and refer you to James B. Marcum's description of such a transaction which he had published in the Lexington Leader of Thursday, November 20, 1902. "If you will request the Governor to issue a reward for the arrest and conviction of Smith and Abner, and for fear that you may not be able to locate these parties, I will state to you that I have been reliably informed that since this indictment was returned, both of these men have frequently been to your house, and that their habitual boarding or loafing place is with Ed. Calahan, the Sheriff of your county and I am informed that at the late election John Smith was present with Ed Callahan at the Crockettville precinct. You Judge, doubtless know the connection that these two parties had with the assassination of James Cockrill; you doubtless remember the testimony which was elicited relative to their connection with same on the trial of William Britton, in Fayette county, and also your own trial in that county; therefore, you can have no doubt but that they are fugitives from justice, and I sincerely trust you will ask the Governor to issue a reward for their arrest and conviction. Believe me, Most respectfully. Sam Jett – Uncle of James Cockrill. "P.S. – While you are requesting the Governor for these rewards I will also ask you to kindly request him to issue a reward for the murders of Dr. Cox and who had him assassinated, but other parties do and this reward may be the means of apprehending his murderers. Attorney Blanton, counsel for Jett, made application to have the case sent back to Breathitt, alleging that no lawlessness prevails there at this time. He said that Jett ought to be sent there for trial, as that was his native heath, the place where he was born, and reared, and where his friends, his mother and his relatives lived' that there a jury would and could weigh the evidence better for and against him, as it would know the witnesses and their characters for veracity. This motion was overruled by the court and the case was continued at the instance of Jett until June 4th. As noted in former issues, "Judge Bill Carnes" transferred the case of Judge Hargis and others charged with assassinating Dr. B.D. Cox, from Breathitt to Elliott county.

Commonwealth's Attorney, J.P. Adams, asks the Court of Appeals by madamus proceedings to compel Carnes to reverse his action. The Court of Appeals has refused to grant a new hearing in the case of B.F. French, convicted of spiriting away witnesses during the Marcum damage trial here. His fine was fixed at \$5000. The case of Wm. Britton, charged with assassinating James Cockrell is on trial at Lexington. John Smith, one of the assassins, has made a full confession. Cockrell was shot from the courthouse at Jackson. Smith's story connects Judge James Hargis, Ed. Callahan, Elbert Hargis, Wm. Britton, Asbury Spicer, John Abner and himself with the crime. The Hargises, Callahan, Britton and Spicer, he claimed, planned and assisted in the execution of the deed. Smith, Abner and Curt Jett did the shooting.

A.F. Byrd, of this city, and Commonwealth's Attorney J.R. Allen, of Lexington; for the defense by Geo. Hunt, George Webb and E.P. Farrell. The headlines in the two Lexington Democratic papers at the beginning of the trial indicated their leanings in the favor of Hargis. It looked like they were trying to clear him with headlines that were at variance with the testimony that was printed below them. The case was given to the jury late yesterday, but no verdict was rendered up to going to press. A hung jury is expected.

The Hargis verdict

As good citizens, we accept the verdict of the jury that said James Hargis was not a party to the assassination of James Cockrell. But the verdict has not changed our opinion, nor will it of other citizens. If there are those that do not believe in his guilt, they will continue of the same opinion. Those that think he is guilty but would exempt him from punishment for political or other reasons will continue in the same line. No one acquainted with public sentiment will question the fact that it is the general belief that he is guilty. These are the conditions as we see them. If as good citizens we accept the verdict, for the same reasons as good citizens we should know the facts connected with the trial and the verdict. At the former trial of Judge Hargis for this offense, the instructions of the trial Judge were of a nature to favor his acquittal, and it would have been done but for the fact that two of the jurors relied on the evidence rather than the instructions. In order that the conditions may be understood, we will state that Judge Hargis is, as was stated by the Lexington Democratic papers, the leading Democrat of the Tenth Congressional District. He is a member of The Winchester Democratic State Central Committee and is a man of recognized force in party affairs. It was through the influence of Judge Hargis that Judge D.B. Redwine was made Chairman of the Music Hall Convention in 1899. The court that tried Judge Hargis with all the officers was composed exclusively of his political associates. The sheriffs that summoned the jury were his personal as well as his political friends. A.W.O. Lee, the foreman of the jury, is a Lexington saloon keeper. The other eleven were from one section of Scott county. All twelve of the jury are partisan Democrats. At the conclusion of Col. Allen's speech, Wednesday afternoon, the jury was sent to the jury room. After about one hour, they adjourned for supper. It was then that the politicians, including the deputy sheriff in charge of the jury, got busy. Democratic office holders from Georgetown began to appear. At an early hour Tuesday morning, the tip was out that the jury had agreed and that it was acquittal. The friends of Judge Hargis were promptly in the court room. When the verdict was read there was an outburst of applause. After the demonstration was over and the jury was discharged, Judge Hargis shook hands with the members of the jury and thanked each of them personally for their verdict, which acquitted him. Leaving the courthouse, Judge Hargis, accompanied by his friends, including several of the jury, adjourned to the Leland Hotel, where he celebrated his acquittal by ordering drinks for the crowd. Later, one of the jurors from Scott county, R.T. Herndon, said to Bill Britton in the county jail: "Britton, there is a report that I pulled this jury over for your side, and its d—d right. I am a citizen of the old type and I will stand by you fellows always. If you ever get hard run just come to me and as long as I have a bank account you can have my help." From the evidence produced, the action of the court officers, with the exception of Col. Allen, and the verdict, we conclude that it was an expense to the Commonwealth and a waste of time to introduce evidence, that Judge Hargis, because of his standing and influence in The Winchester Democratic party, is immune from punishment no difference with what crime he may be charged.

Callahan's son, William Callahan, escaped with his life by the closest margin. When fire was opened upon the elder Callahan – some say from a clump of trees about 200 yards distant, while others say from behind a huge pile of coal – at least two of the feudists directed bullets at the son, who was near the barn. With a yell of terror young Callahan jumped between a fence and the ambushing party and started for cover in the house, which is near the store, but before he reached it a steel bullet tore through his hair and carried his hat 30 feet away from him. However, he was not harmed, and he reached the store in safety. The assassins had sought to kill Callahan, his son and his brother Green, threats to that effect having been numerous of late. When bending over his brother immediately after the latter had fallen. Green Callahan saw two men run from an old coal mine, but he steadfastly refuses to tell the authorities whether or not he recognized either one. "Remarkable bravery was shown by Mrs. Callahan." Said a witness of the shooting. "Hardly had the firing ceased when she ran out of the house and to the store, where she tried to stanch the flow of blood from her husband's wound, but fainted." "The store had been splintered in a score of places by bullets." A messenger rode at neck-break speed to Ekatawa, a distance of 25 miles, but the nearest telegraph station, to wire to Lexington for blood hounds. Seven hours later the Lexington man-hunters were on the trail of the assassins, but no captures had been made at a late hour Monday night. The drowning at Ford last week brings forth these remarks. From the settlement of this locality, 1775 to about 1885, a period of eighty years, it is believed nobody was drowned. About the latter year Capt. Turnbull, of Winchester was drowned at the mouth of Bear Run. Probably three years later, Pen Coe, another Clark county man was drowned just below the mouth of Four Mile. In 1882, a dozen negro men and a white woman were washed out of a railroad camp on Two Mile creek into the river and drowned near Ford during a sudden rise. A few years later, several boys from Clark were drowned at the Mouth of Upper Howard's creek. Since that time the number of drownings especially at Ford, have been too great to be recalled, but perhaps every instance except that of John Sewell, several years ago and the boy East a year ago and a colored boy the past Spring that were from Clark. Thus it spans that for nearly a century and a quarter only four or five Madison county people have been drowned along about fifteen miles of river and those within the brief period of less than six years, while Clark has been unfortunate for nearly forty years and the extent of dozens. But our Madison people on the North side never had any great love for water except for farming purposes.—Richmond Register. This is only a partial list of those drowned near Ford is even the last generation: Rufus Emerson was drowned at Boonesboro; a man named Tillet near the Mouth of Otter Creek; John Atkinson some where near the same place; two sons of Commodore Richardson at the mouth of Two Mile, and a negro boy in the big eddy above the Mouth of Four Mile. Zach Hukill drowned himself on account of ill health near Riverside; Bennie Butler was drowned in Two Mile creek and his body was afterward found in the river. When they arrived at the court house they were met by fully 1,000 people, headed by James Lashbrook, the husband of the murdered woman, and went immediately up Second street through the central portion of the city to the hill, followed by fully five thousand of the citizens of this city and county. This is the first time anything of this kind ever happened in this city, and the excitement is intense. All was done that was possible by the Sheriff and his guard to prevent a lynching, but in the face of such a mob of people, irrespective of color, it was useless to attempt to do anything save deliver him up, which was done. They grabbed him and threw a rope over his head, and took him above the city and strung him up. The poor wretch could be heard above the cries of the mob, pleading for his life, but the mob only heard the cries of Mr.

	<p>Lashbrook, and vengeance they meted out to him was just the thing. About 250 were at the C. & O. train Tuesday night expecting him, but as he failed to come they waited for him Wednesday morning. There is no telling what would have been done had they succeeded in getting him in jail, as there would have, undoubtedly been several killed in the attempt to storm the jail doors.</p> <p>The mob carried Coleman to a small hollow near the railroad tracks, where they bound him tightly to a young sapling. Then they heaped a huge pile of brush wood and timber around and fired the stack, while his eyes rolled horribly. Someone cut out his eyes, and in a moment his head rolled around and he was believed to be dead.</p> <p>Coleman said 15 minutes before he was set afire that he had nothing to say. His death was slow, and, writhing in terrible agony, he was hooted and glared at by the people standing on the edge of the pit. Many women were present. He died at 10:50 a. m. The scene was an awful one, and around the funeral pyre were 10,000 maddened people, headed by the husband of the dead woman. A dozen torches were applied simultaneously, and huge tongues of fire swept up and around the agonized wretch.</p> <p>Coleman's Crime</p> <p>Coleman's crime was a most revolting one. He made a complete confession of the fiendish crime to a Post reporter on his arrival. He is only 20 years old and has a pleasant face. The defense also asks that the Commonwealth pay the expenses of the witnesses for the defense, and that subpoenas for twenty-three more parties at Jackson be issued and sent out for execution. The expense to the Commonwealth will be something enormous as the mileage and attendance of witnesses will amount to thousands of dollars.

The Fields-Adkins Trial

The trial of Jesse Fields and Joe Adkins, at Barbourville for the murder of Judge Combs, of Hazard, has attracted much attention throughout the State. Hundreds of witnesses have attended and whose claims amount to more than three thousand dollars. It has lately been decided that Perry county and not the State must pay these. There has been some of the tallest lying ever done on the witness stand. A number of witnesses have sworn positively that they saw Joe Adkins fire the shot while others have sworn that he was in Breathitt county, thirty-five miles away at the time. But little evidence has been adduced to connect Fields with the crime. For a while it was thought it would go hard with Adkins, but public sentiment at Barbourville seems now to indicate his acquittal. Col. Breckenridge is chief attorney for the defense and special trains will be run to hear him speak. The speaking will probably begin to-day.

The Winchester Democrat, Tuesday, April, 30, 1895

The trial of Jesse Fields and Joe Adkins for the murder of Judge Combs, which has been in progress at Barbourville for some time, ended Thursday. Contrary to the expectations of many, both were found guilty and given a life sentence. The case was one of the hardest ever fought in the mountains. The amount of perjured testimony given must have been enormous, as quite a number of witnesses swore positively that they saw Joe Adkins fire the fatal shot, and perhaps a larger number swore at the time of the killing he was in Breathitt county thirty miles away. The whole story of the French-Eversole feud was gone over again on the witness stand. The witness claims for attendance and mileage will, it is said, amount to more than \$10,000. By a recent ruling of the Attorney-General in a similar case, Perry county will have to pay the greater part of this sum. The State has been freely gouged by the ever-ready and always-willing witness in the mountain counties, and when these witnesses are compelled to look to Perry county for payment the witness business will fall several points in that part of Eastern Kentucky.

Instead of giving them the tightened end of a rope, which they richly deserved, the jury in the case of Field and Adkins on trial for the cowardly assassination of Judge Josiah Combs, allowed cut-and-dried testimony of venal witnesses and the slick tongues of shrewd lawyers to get the better of their judgement and patriotism and brought in a life sentence. The prisoners only smiled while their lawyers entered a motion for a new trial which they hope will give them liberty, but which should give them what Patrick Henry deemed its alternative."

The Execution of Bad Tom Smith at Jackson.

"WORSE than affairs in Breathitt county," which a few years ago was the worst that could have been said of any community, can now no longer be truthfully averred of that action. The church, the schoolhouse and the newspaper have done their civilizing work and instead of crime being avenged by the bullet of the bushwhacker or the rope of the lyncher, the stern majesty of the law, without haste, without hate, but terrible in its awful simplicity, enforces the penalty of the ancient law, "Who so sheddeth man's blood, by man shall his blood be shed."

An object lesson of the stern majesty of the law, an account of which will take its place among the traditions of the mountains and which will be handed down to future generations, was the execution Friday of Tom Smith at Jackson for the murder of Dr. Rader last February.

The day was beautiful and several thousand persons were present including many women. An excursion was run from Lexington and a number from here went up to see the execution. Those present say it resembled a huge picnic or holiday more than anything else. Several days ago Smith professed conversion and at an early hour he was taken under a strong guard to the river where with manacled hands and feet he was baptized by a couple of Baptist ministers. The scene was a most impressive one and strong men wept. He was taken back to jail and the hours sped on until noon, the time set for the execution. Just before the hour fixed Smith told the sheriff that he had been forgiven for all his other crimes, but was not for the murder of Dr. Rader. He telegraphed to Gov. Brown asking for time but the latter refused to interfere and the execution proceeded. On the Scaffold he made a long talk confessing his various crimes interspersed with appeals to God for mercy. K. J. Hampton and John Bosley were there in the interest of the Louisville Post and the following extracts are from their report: "He and Joe Adkins ambushed Joe Eversole and Mick Combs. Joe Adkins fired the fatal shot and he afterwards shot Combs and Eversole. He then took \$30 from Eversole's pocket. He shot at John McKnight, but as Bob Profit was shooting at the same time, could not tell who killed him.

"I shot and killed Bob Cornet while he was sitting on a log. Jack Combs was with me. "He said he was with B. F. French, Joe Adkins, Jesse Field and Boone Frazer at Field's house last fall, when they planned the murder of Judge Josiah Combs. He said he was wounded at the time and could not go with them.

"I heard Atkins say afterward that he fired the shot that killed Combs. I also heard French speak of the job.

"After making this statement to the reporters he talked to the crowd and warned the young men of the dangers of whiskey and bad women. He told how in a drunken

delirium he had killed Dr. Rader. He said:
“No man paid me to kill Rader. I was drunk and Catherine McQuinn roused me from my sleep and said: “He is fixing to kill you.” I jumped up and fired two shots; one of them killed him.”
The preachers then sang, “Guide Me, Oh Thou Great Jehovah,” in which Smith joined as he walked around on the top of the scaffold. After this he knelt under the gallows and prayed most fervently for God to have mercy on him. He arose and another song was sung.
“He then roamed again under the gallows and prayed most pitifully. The black cap was placed on his head and his last words were, “God have mercy upon me.” Sheriff Breck Combs spring the trap.”

The story telegraphed over the country last week that four men had been killed and two seriously wounded in a feud in Perry, is denied in a published card by Sheriff H. C. Combs of that county. He says that Judge Josiah Combs was the last man killed in that county and that happened nearly a year ago.

Mrs. Adkins reports her husband in fine health and good spirits in regard to a new trial.

Boone Frazier of Breathitt who, it is said, was wounded at the time Combs was killed was also indicted. Just before Tom Smith was hung at Jackson this Spring, he made a confession in which he alleged that French and Frazier were both connected with the crime.

Without Authority
Some time ago B. F. French, of this city, was indicted by the grand jury of Perry county for complicity in the murder of Judge Josiah Combs, of Hazard. Sunday, W. A. Byrd, of Wolfe county a Deputy United States Marshall, came here armed with a bench warrant from the Clerk of the Perry Circuit Court and arrested Mr. French. The latter applied at once to police Judge Jonett for a writ of habeas corpus which was granted and made returnable before Judge Scott.
Without hesitation Judge Scott decided that a federal Official had no authority to serve a civil process from the State court and directed that the warrant be placed in the hands of Sheriff Hodgkin to make the arrest. Mr. French was much gratified at this decision as Byrd is a personal enemy and French believes the whole scheme was gotten up to procure his arrest, and while he was being taken to Hazard, to procure his assassination. A letter from S. N. French, his brother, informs him that Judge Howard, the Circuit Judge of that district, had arranged to allow him bail, but the sum is not mentioned. We have no desire to shield Mr. French from any punishment that he may deserve, but we would be loath to see him assassinated, especially while in the custody of the officials, and are glad that he will be in custody of Sheriff Hodgkin who will see that the course of justice shall not be obstructed either by his friends or his foes.

B. F. French Arrested

Sometime ago Deputy Marshall Byrd, of Wolfe county came here with a bench warrant for the arrest of b. F. French charged with complicity in the murder of Judge Josiah Combs, of Hazard. A writ of habeas corpus brought the matter before Judge Scott, who decided that Byrd had no right to execute the writ, which was placed in the hands of Sheriff Hodgkin to execute. Mr. French was of counsel for the plaintiff in the big Alumbaugh case which has been pending in our Circuit Court for some days and was placed under surveillance by the Sheriff. He was also sick in bed for a day or two and was attended by a Deputy Sheriff, Saturday morning, he had recovered sufficiently and was placed in jail by Mr. Hodgkin.

Gibson Taylor and John Bosley went to Pineville to see Judge Hall, who opened court there yesterday, relative to securing bail. If not he will be taken to Perry county at once. Asa Davis, a merchant of that county, was here yesterday, and says it would be dangerous to take him there as his assassination would be probable.

Some time ago, B. F. French, of this city had a suit in the Perry Circuit Court with one of the Eversole's. French was sick and unable to attend, and the case went against him by default. He asked for a new trial which was refused and then appealed to the higher court, which in the following decision reversed the decision of the lower court.

“Where a defendant, who resides in a county from that in which suit was pending against him, was unable by reason of his sickness to attend court and his attorney whom he had employed for that purpose failed to make defense for him, in consequence of which judgement by default was rendered against him, he was entitled to a new trial, and it was error to sustain a demurrer to his petition for a new trial alleging these facts and showing further that he had a good defense.

B. F. French Released on Bail

Monday John Bosley and Gibson Taylor went to Pineville to see Judge Hall in regard to obtaining bail for B. F. French. Hall is a Democrat and was elected in a strong Republican district by the help of the Eversole faction over S. N. French, the Republican nominee, who is a brother of B. F. French. In consequence, Hall is a strong partisan of the Eversole side and much doubt was expressed as to whether he would be granted bail. He was at first inclined to refuse, but when he was told that if Mr. French was killed and the old feud re-opened all the cases against the Eversoles, which are filed away here, would be again docketed and prosecuted, he relented and fixed the bail at ten thousand dollars, which might be given here. A number of our best citizens, both Democrats and Republicans went on his bond, Tuesday morning and he was released. While our people feel that if Mr. French has been guilty of complicity in the crime as charged he should be punished, but it is generally believed that he was the victim of persecution in this case, whatever may be said of the past.

The trial of B. F. French, who is indicted in the Perry Circuit Court for the murder of Judge Josiah Combs and who is out on ten thousand dollars bail comes up at Hazard next week. French was indicted on the testimony of Green Morris who swore that French offered to hire him to kill Combs. This is not probable as Morris had been one of the most persistent and dangerous of the Eversoles and on more than one occasion, by his own testimony, he had watched the road for the purpose of killing French. If it was the purpose of French to have Combs killed he would hardly have chosen so persistent and deadly an enemy to accomplish his purpose.

A Change of Venue

B. F. French has returned from Hazard where he went last week to be present at the trial for complicity in the murder of Judge Combs for which he was under bond in the sum of ten thousand dollars. Judge Hall, the regular Circuit Judge, who was elected over Napoleon French, a brother of B. F. French, after a bitter contest did not preside and Judge Phillips of Knott county was ejected by the bar to preside. This was a victory for French as Phillips was a friend to that side. The principal struggle was the place to which the case should be transferred. French's enemies wanted it sent to Barbourville,

Pineville, or somewhere over in that section. The death sentence given Tom Smith at Pineville and the life sentences given Fields and Adkins at Barbourville show the state of feeling there and of course French did not want to go there. It was finally decided by Judge Phillips to send it to Jackson where it will be tried. This decision suited French all right, as it will be where he can attend to it without trouble. The Jackson correspondent of the Courier-Journal says none of the Eversoles were present, but that Green Morris and Frank Polly, two of their lieutenants were at Hazard with a number of the old Eversole clan fully armed and that French's friends were equally as well fixed. Reversed by a higher court

Some time last year Jesse Fields and Joe Adkins were tried at Barbourville for the murder of Judge Combs of Perry county, and received a life sentence in the penitentiary. The case was carried to the Court of Appeals and this week the verdict of the lower court was reversed and the case sent back. Opinion is divided as to whether they had anything to do with the killing or not, but it is evident to all who watched the proceeding of their trial at Barbourville, that the prisoners did not receive a fair showing. The trial of Joseph Adkins of Ford, for killing Judge Combs, which has been in progress several weeks at Barbourville, ended Friday with the verdict of guilty and life sentence to the penitentiary. One or two witnesses swore positively to seeing him fire the fatal shot, while others swore with equal positiveness to facts, which, if true, would have rendered it impossible for him to have been at Hazard at the time. This is the second time that he has been sentenced for life. The case will again be taken to the Court of Appeals. The prisoner was confidently expecting an acquittal.

His leg was amputated to save his life, but the operation was not successful and he died. James Moore, a deputy Sheriff, was shot while at home in bed at the same time. The Breathitt Circuit Court, which adjourned last week, has indicted Fields for these crimes also, and the probabilities are that he will spend the remainder of his days in durance vile.

Miss Bean's Address Memorial Day is Observed on May 26th, the Date Shackles Were Removed from Jefferson Davis. The United Daughters of Confederacy fiftieth memorial service held at the Winchester cemetery Thursday, May 26th was the most impressive that has ever been held in honor of the dead veterans. The address of Mrs. Jennie Catherwood Bean, was of a historic nature as well as a beautiful tribute to the veterans who passed away. Mrs. Bean in the course of her remarks gave the reasons for the services being held each year on the 26th of May which she stated acted as a memorial of the day in which the shackles were removed from Jefferson Davis. The first Memorial Day ever held by the local Chapter of the United Daughters of Confederacy was inaugurated by the founder of the local Chapter, Miss Jennie Catherwood Bean who is now in her eighty-third year. When the first memorial was organized by Mrs. Bean, Winchester being such a small village, she enlisted her brother and her school children who were then under her as a school teacher to accompany her to the local cemetery to pay respect to the veterans who were then buried in the local cemetery. First Five Deaths. At the time of the first memorial there were only five confederates interred in the local cemetery. The first of whom was unknown man, whose name was never learned, was found ill in the streets and taken to the temporary hospital, the Odd Fellows home over what is now the Winchester Bank building, where he succumbed without his identity ever being established. The second, who was buried in the local cemetery, was a man by the name of Holbrook, a prisoner, who was at the courthouse and when he looked out the window was shot. The third was a man by the name of Kelley, who died at the courthouse while being treated in the temporary hospital quarters of the confederates. The fourth was Thomas W. Lewis, who was killed on a parade, on the McKinney farm, now owned by Colby Conkwright on the Lexington pike. The fifth was Frank Tucker, of Missouri, who died at the home of William Nelson in the county. In the meantime the body of Miss Conway had sunk in deep water and it was not recovered for some time, when Mr. Bert Ross, keeper of the Lock, secured it, using a long pole with a spike in the end. Dr. Williams, who lives near, was summoned at once and every effort was made to resuscitate her, but the spark of life had fled and the efforts were in vain. On Friday, all of Vince Cooper's "best friends" will celebrate the life of the 15-year veteran of the Clark County Fire Department known for his gregarious personality and desire to serve the community. Cooper, 43, who started with the department in 1998, was a lieutenant when he retired in 2013. He died July 17 at St. Josephs Hospital in Lexington. Cooper was born in 1972 and grew up in Memorial Park. As a teenager, he started hanging around the fire department, thanks to a summer program through the parks and recreation department. "Vince had it that it was what he wanted to do," Clark County Battalion Chief William Puckett said. "He started full-time as soon as he could. As soon as he got all the stuff he needed, he applied and he got hired pretty quick." He was also quick to make friends, which could be attributed to his jovial personality and caring nature. "He was a great guy," Clark County Fire Chief Billy Jones said. "I worked with him the whole time (he was with the department). He was always happy. Always laughing and cutting up." "When you met him, you instantly became his friend," Puckett said. "He loved the guys here and they loved him. He put forth a love that was there and you knew it was there. You knew Vince cared about you." Puckett said Cooper treated his co-workers like family, and loved having group dinners at the department. "One of the things he liked the most was to eat," Puckett said. "He loved to get together and have a meal and have everyone sit down and eat. It was something he grew up with. He loved bringing the shifts together and he liked for his fire department family to get together and break bread." Cooper was also quick to volunteer to help out any new additions to the department. He was fond of bringing the new person into the fold and bringing them under his wing. "He was that guy who wanted to be the one who showed them the ropes," Puckett said. "He wanted to be the big brother." Cooper's Facebook page is filled with posts from family, friends and community members paying tribute to a man who appeared to be everyone's best friend. "I look at his Facebook page," Puckett said. "I laugh at it. Everybody on there would comment that, 'He was my best friend.' I wonder how he picked which one of those guys was his best friend, there are so many." Jones said Cooper's interests outside of the fire department were fishing and bowling.

He was in charge of the jailer of Whitley county and was accompanied by his father, Matt Curry, of Harrodsburg, and his brother, Louis Curry, of Colorado. Curry's insanity is not marked or violent. He knows his friends and most of the time talks rationally. He has hallucinations at intervals and during these periods suffers from delusions of impending danger, and is always preparing himself to reply an imaginary attack. An instance of this was seen on the train while the party was en route to Lexington. Curry handed the jailer a razor, which he had secreted on his person before they left Williamsburg. The jailer had no idea that Curry had such a dangerous weapon about him, and was surprised at his voluntary frankness in giving it up. When the jailer asked him about it Curry said: "I had made up my mind to kill one of this party when we left Williamsburg, but I have now concluded not to do so." Some fifteen years ago Cornelison walked into the office of Judge Richard Reid, of Mt. Sterling, and cowhided him into a state of collapse. Cornelison claimed that Reid was responsible for an adverse decision given him in the Superior Court of Kentucky. Public opinion demanded that Judge Reid slay the man that had thus publicly mistreated him, but he was a Christian gentleman that could not stain his hand with the blood of his fellow man. He made a public speech at Mt. Sterling in which he explained his views, but many of his friends thought that the blood of Cornelison could alone atone for this insult. The proud spirit of Reid could not endure the imputation of cowardice, and in less than a week he was dead by his own hand. Cornelison was arrested and his case was kept before the public mind for a long time by a series of habeas corpus proceedings. After spending five years in jail, Cornelison was released. Public opinion was so strongly against him that his career as a lawyer was virtually closed and his life work ended. He has lived in comparative seclusion and his death will carry his case to a higher court than public opinion, or any other earthly tribunal. The Winchester Democrat, Friday, July 12, 1895.</p> <p>The Execution of Bad Tom Smith at Jackson. “WORSE than affairs in Breathitt county,” which a few years ago was the worst that could have been said of any community, can now no longer be truthfully averred of that action. The church, the schoolhouse and the newspaper have done their civilizing work and instead of crime being avenged by the bullet of the bushwhacker or the rope of the lyncher, the stern majesty of the law, without haste, without hate, but terrible in its awful simplicity, enforces the penalty of the ancient law, “Who so sheddeth man’s blood, by man shall his blood be shed.” An object lesson of the stern majesty of the law, an account of which will take its place among the traditions of the mountains and which will be handed down to future generations, was the execution Friday of Tom Smith at Jackson for the murder of Dr. Rader last February. The day was beautiful and several thousand persons were present including many women. An excursion was run from Lexington and a number from here went up to see the execution. Those present say it resembled a huge picnic or holiday more than anything else. Several days ago Smith professed conversion and at an early hour he was taken under a strong guard to the river where with manacled hands and feet he was baptized by a couple of Baptist ministers. The scene was a most impressive one and strong men wept. He was taken back to jail and the hours sped on until noon, the time set for the execution. Just before the hour fixed Smith told the sheriff that he had been forgiven for all his other crimes, but was not for the murder of Dr. Rader. He telegraphed to Gov. Brown asking for time but the latter refused to interfere and the execution proceeded. On the Scaffold he made a long talk confessing his various crimes interspersed with appeals to God for mercy. K. J. Hampton and John Bosley were there in the interest of the Louisville Post and the following extracts are from their report: “He and Joe Adkins ambushed Joe Eversole and Mick Combs. Joe Adkins fired the fatal shot and he afterwards shot Combs and Eversole. He then took \$30 from Eversole’s pocket. He shot at John McKnight, but as Bob Profit was shooting at the same time, could not tell who killed him. “I shot and killed Bob Cornet while he was sitting on a log. Jack Combs was with me. “He said he was with B. F. French, Joe Adkins, Jesse Field and Boone Frazer at Field’s house last fall, when they planned the murder of Judge Josiah Combs. He said he was wounded at the time and could not go with them. “I heard Atkins say afterward that he fired the shot that killed Combs. I also heard French speak of the job. “After making this statement to the reporters he talked to the crowd and warned the young men of the dangers of whiskey and bad women. He told how in a drunken delirium he had killed Dr. Rader. He said: “No man paid me to kill Rader. I was drunk and Catherine McQuinn roused me from my sleep and said: “He is fixing to kill you.” I jumped up and fired two shots; one of them killed him.” The preachers then sang, “Guide Me, Oh Thou Great Jehovah,” in which Smith joined as he walked around on the top of the scaffold. After this he knelt under the gallows and prayed most fervently for God to have mercy on him. He arose and another song was sung. “He then roamed again under the gallows and prayed most pitifully. Card From Dr. Gordon

Mr. Editor: In last Tuesday's issue of your paper, I noticed in the Fox station items the following:

Few are aware of the many deaths that occur at our County Poorhouse. The average is about three a week, most of which are colored people. The largest number of inmates at any time during the past two years has been one hundred and fifty.

This is a great mistake and does the County Judge, Superintendent, Keeper, myself and Clark county a very great injustice. For the benefit of the Fox Station correspondent and others that do not know, I will state that in the last two years there has been only ten deaths at the County House, four in '96 and six in '97. The highest at the County farm during said period is fifty-three, the lowest, thirty-three, only about one-third of the number negroes. This includes men, women, children and five pauper idiots and the county receives from the State \$75 per year each for keeping idiots. The provisions and water furnished the inmates is wholesome; clothing, houses and bedding comfortable, the sanitary condition of the premises is good; all parties connected with the management of the farm have so far as I know and believe done their whole duty and no inmate has died or suffered from neglect. Two-thirds of the inmates are white. I am at a loss to know what purpose could have inspired such a statement from your correspondent.

The report of the grand jury on the condition of the poorhouse is very exhaustive. After speaking in high terms of the management of the present keeper, D. A. Hughs, it states that the present buildings are poor, and are wholly inadequate for the accommodations of the present number of inmates. There is no provision for separating the sick or the well, the moral and the vicious: no provisions for bathrooms, etc. The farm is also too small, and it is badly worn. The jury made no special recommendations in the matter, but from their report it follows that new buildings and perhaps a new location is desirable. The jury also investigated the condition of the public road system, and found the laws very loosely enforced. Many nominal overseers live in other counties or States, and many roads are very poorly worked. A rigid enforcement of the road laws

Killing at Jackson.

Dr. B. D. Cox, a well known and popular physician of Jackson, was assassinated on the streets of that town Monday night. Shortly after dark he left his office to go home and after going a short distance, three shots were heard and he was found dead in a few moments with twenty-seven buckshot in his body. Nothing is known as to who did the killing or the cause of it. He was guardian of the Cockrell heirs, one of whom killed a Hargis some time ago. He was helping young Cockrell in preparing his defense which may have been the motive for the murder. He was formerly President of the Kentucky Valley Medical Association to which a number of our local physicians belong.

Other Breathitt Killings.

Things must be in a very bad fix in Breathitt county. It is said that thirty-six men have been killed in that county since Christmas and in most cases no arrests have been made. The most intense excitement was caused by the shooting in broad daylight Monday afternoon of James Cockrell, a prominent young man of that city. He was shot by some unknown person from the window of the courthouse, much in the same manner as Senator Goebel was. Five balls struck him and he died the next morning at the Lexington hospital where he had been taken; the remains were taken to Jackson and buried under the auspices of the Odd Fellows and Knights of Pythias to which he belonged.

He was a brother to Tom Cockrell who is in the Stanton jail for killing Ben Hargis, and a nephew of Dr. Cox who was assassinated recently. He had obtained a situation at Ford with the men building the new lock and had gone to Jackson to arrange matters to leave. He was a nephew of Sam Jett of this city; a younger brother, McKinley Cockrell, who had been warned to leave Jackson, also lives here.

More trouble is feared at Jackson and a number of persons have left. The whiskey warehouse of W. S. Will (?) a cousin of the deceased, was buried Monday night.

More Deviltry at Jackson.

After Dr. Cox, the guardian of the Cockrell heirs, was assassinated, C. X. Bowling was appointed as their guardian. Saturday night, it is said, an attempt was made to burn his house. A ball of rags saturated with oil was set on fire and an attempt made to throw it through an open window. It missed the window, struck the side of the house and fell to the ground. A young lady saw the act and gave alarm and the fire ball was extinguished without doing any damage.

But One Side.

There is but one side to the alleged feud in Breathitt county. Tom Cockrell is in the Powell county jail without bail and without trial. Dr. Cox, his best friend lies in his grave, sent there by assassins. The only brother who could have given him assistance is in his grave. He too, was assassinated. His lawyer, Mr. Vaughn, will never return to Jackson because he believes that a similar fate would be his. J. B. Marcum knows that assassins were in waiting in front of his house to kill him when he came out. It would be foolish for him to return. T. P. Cardwell, the City Judge, has gone; Dr. Baker has left; Price Cole lives in Lexington; McKinley Cockrell, a mere boy, is working in a store here, trying to make a living as best as he can; another little boy about twelve years old is being cared for by friends. There is not an active friend of Tom Cockrell that would risk staying in Jackson 3 hours. So when the philanthropic gentleman of the Lexington Chamber of Commerce goes to effect a compromise, they will find but one side with which to treat. The others are either dead or gone. We look for no more assassinations in Breathitt until the assassins themselves begin to fall out with each other.

Tom Cockrell Acquitted.

The trial of Tom Cockrell for the killing of Ben Hargis was held last week at Campton. Hon. Ira Julian, of Frankfort, presided as special Judge. The Commonwealth wished to dismiss the case and the defendant objected. The jury was unanimous for his acquittal. He came directly to this city and is the guest of his uncle, Sam Jett.

While he was in jail, his former guardian, Dr. Cox, and his brother, James were assassinated on the streets of Jackson for no other reason as he believes than they were trying to assist in his defense. He feels deeply over the fact that no effort has been made by either county, district or state to arrest the assassins, but he will not resent it. He does not want to kill anyone, neither does he want to be killed. He expects to locate in another State.

TWO AFFIDAVITS FIELD.

Moses Feltner Tells of Alleged Plots to Kill an Attorney.

Alleges He Was to Do the Work, But Each Time Warned the Lawyer of His Danger-Fears to Return to Jackson.

Lexington, Ky., Nov. 11.-Two of the most sensational affidavits ever filed in a Kentucky court have just been filed at Jackson, Breathitt county. That county is the scene of the Hargis Cockrell feud and within its borders 30 men have been killed this year. A number were assassinated and are credited to one or the other of the factions, while several men are exiles from the county because of their fear of assassination. The affidavits, copies of which were sent to the Herald on request by Attorney J. B. Marcum, are by him and Moses Feltner, his client, accused of the killing of Jesse Fields. The purpose of the affidavits is to secure a continuance in the case of Feltner. They follow on the heels of sensational statements contained in a letter written to Circuit Judge Redwine, of Breathitt, by John Patrick, an exile living in this city, in which he said he knew who killed Jas. Cockrell, being an eye witness, but declines to return to Jackson to testify unless the governor will send a company of militia to protect him, alleging that a deputy sheriff attempted to assassinate him and that persons who desire his death will kill him if he returns without the protection of troops. In his affidavit Moses Feltner tells in detail of alleged plots to kill Attorney J. B. Marcum. In several ways, he was to do the work, he says, and fearing to refuse pretended to acquiesce, but warned Marcum each time so that the plans failed. He says he fears to appear on the streets of Jackson, that such a state of lawlessness exists that there is not protection to any citizen, especially to any that are not in sympathy with the county judge and sheriff. He says he has been informed and believes it to be the truth, that those officers have made efforts to have him assassinated. As for Marcum, he says that in last May he was invited to Judge Hargis' office, where he met John Smith and John Abner, friends of sheriff Ed Callahan and County Judge James Hargis. He relates that they told him J. B. Marcum must be killed and that he was the man to do it. He continues that he feared to refuse and by appointment met Hargis and Callahan and Abner and Smith that night. He says the plan as unfolded at the meeting was for him to go to Marcum's house, get him to come to his law office at night and after parting with him on the return trip at a place where a shotgun was to be concealed, he should shoot Marcum in the back. He says Hargis gave him \$35 to pay Marcum on account and handed him a shotgun and shells loaded with buckshot. He says he went to Marcum's house, warned him and then told "Them" that Marcum would not come out after dark. He says that the next plan was for him, John Smith, and Tom White to hide near Marcum's house and shoot him when he left it on a morning he was to go to a neighboring town, though they lay in ambush, Marcum did not appear. He says the next plan was for Tom White to shoot Marcum from Hargis Bros.' store, but that Marcum carried his 4-months-old baby in his arms and White would not fire. He says Hargis said to White, "You ought to have sent it to hell with him." And Callahan said, "Yes, you out to have tied its guts around his damned neck." He says that suspicion finally fell upon him as warning Marcum and on getting a continuance of his case in court he followed Marcum in flight. He says he has returned to Jackson, but fears to leave his room. He asks a continuance. In his affidavit Attorney J. B. Marcum says that he fears to appear at the court house or on the streets of Jackson near the court house, that he has not been in his office, but once since the 15th of July. He says that he has been outspoken against the parties who are accused of assassination or having assassinated Dr. Cox and James Cockrell upon the streets of Jackson and that by reason thereof and by reason of his attorneyship in certain other cases pending in this court he has incurred the enmity of certain dangerous and lawless men and is afraid they will carry out their threats to assassinate him, which he believes they have made.

Some Remarkable Statements.

Some time ago Moses Feltner killed Jesse Fields in Breathitt county, and is now on bail awaiting trial. His attorney is Jas. B. Marcum, the well known lawyer and Republican leader. Circuit Court now being in session at Jackson, both Marcum and Feltner have filed affidavit for a continuance of the case and these affidavits, and especially that of Feltner, contain some very startling statements. Feltner swears that County Judge James Hargis and Sheriff Ed Callahan conspired with him to kill Marcum; that he, Feltner was to decoy Marcum from his house to a point where had been hid a shotgun loaded with buckshot and which was to be used to kill Marcum; that several other plans were laid all of which were told Marcum by Feltner; that Hargis, Callahan and others finally suspected and the latter had to leave Jackson for fear of being killed. As pay for killing Marcum, Feltner was to be pardoned for his crimes. He also says he heard both Hargis and Callahan say that the killing of Dr. Cox was a good thing and that they were glad he was killed. In conclusion both Marcum and Feltner say they are afraid to come to Jackson for fear they will be killed.

Death Of Mrs. Cox

Mrs. Cordelia Cox, widow of the late Dr. B. D. Cox, who was assassinated on the streets of Jackson, less than two years ago, died at the home of Dr. Breck Cox about thirty miles from Jackson Tuesday morning. She had been ill for only a few days from

typhoid fever, and her death was very unexpected. The remains were buried by the side of her husband at Jackson. She leaves two sons and two daughters. She was a niece of the late Maj. I. N. Cardwell, of this city.

Breathitt.

More and More Of It.—It Looks Like the Beginning of the End..

We referred to the affidavit of Mose Feltner that was then being taken, last week. Later, that of Sam Fields was given. These affidavits reveal in detail the plans that were formed to assassinate James Cockrill and J. B. Marcum; they also throw some light on the assassination of Dr. Cox.

James Hargis, Alex Hargis, Elbert Hargis, B. F. French and Ed. Callahan are the men implicated by the testimony of Feltner and Fields. B. F. French appears to have been the leading spirit in enticing the witnesses to leave this city during the Marcum damage trial, though James and Alex Hargis and Callahan appear in the same connection.

It would be difficult to believe the horrible story told by these witnesses were it not for the fact that nearly all of it is corroborated by witnesses that have testified in former trials.

The stenographic report of Feltner's testimony was printed in the leading papers Sunday. It would occupy four solid pages of this paper which is much more space than we can give to it. It is a story of crime unparalleled in our history.

The threatening letter that we referred to last week was given to Feltner by Lewis Hays of Jackson, who suddenly disappeared. It was feared that the lives of Feltner and Fields were in danger and Judge Benton ordered that they be placed in the jail where they are at the present time.

The efforts made by the Breathitt authorities to have Feltner returned to Jackson on a bench warrant failed.

It is held that being a prisoner under the jurisdiction of this court he cannot be turned over to another until his case is disposed of. Before the Court of Appeals, the injunction proceedings have been continued until Saturday next. A number of witnesses have been summoned to testify.

It is a question of jurisdiction between Fayette county, where James, Alex, Elbert Hargis and Ed Callahan are under indictment for killing James Cockrill and Breathitt county, where it is alleged, warrants were sworn out for their arrest before the indictments were made in Fayette county. Cockrill was shot from the Courthouse in Jackson, but died in a hospital at Lexington.

Breathitt. There is no lack of interest in incidents growing out of the Breathitt county condition. Judge Riddle, on Jailer Boone's refusal to deliver the prisoners, Feltner and Fields, from the jail here to the Breathitt bailiff, had Boone tried by a jury at Jackson in his absence and fined \$500. In the meantime, Boone went, with his attorney, D. L. Pendleton, before the Court of Appeals and had a writ of prohibition issued against Judge Riddle.

The Breathitt Grand jury made no effort to indict the murderers of Dr. Cox and J. B. Marcum but did indict Sam Jett of this city, for arson. It is alleged he burned his own house in Breathitt county in 1889. They also indicted Mose Feltner on two counts; one charges him with murdering a peddler a number of years ago, the other with confederating with the late J. B. Marcum to kill James Hargis. Sam Fields was also indicted. We noted the indictment of Riley Coldiron last week. All four of these men have been strong in the prosecution of the Hargises.

Friday morning on the grounds of fraudulent proceedings in Breathitt county the Appellate Court, Judge Orear writing the opinion and other Judges concurring, rendered a decision giving Fayette county jurisdiction on the indictments for killing James Cockrill, against A. H. Hargis and Elbert Hargis, and Ed. Callahan. Their attorney at Jackson, J. J. C. Back wired that they would come to Lexington at once. Later they requested that a special bailiff be sent to arrest them naming Chief Reagan, of the Lexington Police force as the man preferred. Reagan went to Jackson Saturday morning and was expected to return with the prisoners the same evening but did not. Saturday evening he sent the following dispatch to the Lexington Circuit Judge.

"The three Hargises are in my custody. I am waiting for Callahan to come in from the country. Will be down Monday morning."

Monday morning Reagan with Alex and James Hargis arrived in Lexington. Elbert Hargis came to Lexington on the afternoon train. All three of the brothers were placed in the custody of the Fayette county Jailer and were locked up in the hospital ward.

Various reasons were assigned as to why Callahan did not come; one that living twenty miles from Jackson he did not know of the Court of Appeals decision; another that he was on the river rafting logs, and another that he was sick. It does not appear that Mr. Reagan made any effort to find him.

Sheriff Callahan came down from Jackson Tuesday and surrendered. The defendants applied for bail before Judge Parker Tuesday. Commonwealth's Attorney objected. Col. Allen said that if a motion for bail was to be made he wanted to produce evidence to the court to show why the defendants were not entitled to bail. He said that the Hargises was much stronger than that produced by the Commonwealth against William Britton, who had been found guilty and given a life sentence. He said that in this case the evidence and presumption were great, and he did not think the Hargises entitled to bail.

Judge Morton for the defense contended that the purpose of bail was to bring the accused before the court and that there could be no doubt of their presence at the proper time and that the introduction of evidence was unnecessary.

After a conference between the attorneys and the court it was decided to begin hearing evidence on the application for bail Monday next March 20.
The evidence will be in substance the same as was presented in the Britton trial.

Hargises and Callahan.
Testimony on the application for bail by the Hargis brothers and Callahan was begun at Lexington Monday. The court decided that the burden of proof was on the Commonwealth. Mrs. J. B. Marcum, Mose Feltner and a number of other witnesses testified in substance the same as given in former trials.
A. C. Bowman, foreman of the grand jury, that was said to have been "busted up" was a witness. He said Alex Hargis came to the grand jury room during investigation and told him and the other grand jurors that Riley Coldiron must be indicted for perjury. Witness said Alex Hargis was mad and demanded the indictment, claiming that Coldiron had testified to a lie against William Britton.
Witness said that B. F. French, Judge Redwine and Judge Fleener were with Alex Hargis when he came to the grand jury room. Witness said other members of the grand jury told him that unless he dismissed them they would adjourn themselves, and the grand jury broke up in a hurry.
Yesterday morning Anse White, a brother of Tom White, was on the stand. His testimony was new and sensational. It was to the effect that Judge James Hargis had arranged with himself and others to kill Dr. Cox, James, Tom and McKinley Cockrill and attorney Vaughn. This work was to be done in the Courthouse during the trial of Tom Cockrill for bail for killing one of the Hargises.
Testimony for the defense was begun. It is probable that the question will be decided this week.

The Hargis Trial.
The trial of Judge James Hargis at Lexington is going on. The Jury was completed last week. As usual, in all of those cases, there has been some sensational features. A Mr. Bacon was accepted on the jury who stated after his acceptance that he had been active in the interest of the accused and had suggested to the attorneys for the defense the name of a man to accept on the jury who would be favorable to the defense. On motion of the Commonwealth, Bacon was excused. It is openly charged that Deputy Sheriffs during the selection of the jury were active in the interest of the accused.
The action of the city authorities of Lexington from the Mayor down is a subject of criticism.
The examination of witnesses began Monday.
Five witnesses testified Monday.
With the exception of Charles Robbins, all had testified in the Britton trial in January and gave substantially the same testimony here.
Robbins testified in the Jett trial at Cynthiana, but when wanted in Lexington failed to appear and was located in Cincinnati with B. F. French. On the stand yesterday he admitted his friendliness with the defendant but his testimony was very strong against Jett and Britton. The Commonwealth was not allowed to prove why he failed to appear in the Britton case.
Dr. A. H. Barkley, the physician who attended James Cockrill at the Good Samaritan Hospital after the wounded man was brought from Jackson to Lexington testified to the nature of the wounds which caused death.
Riley Coldiron, of this city, testified the same as in the Britton trial. Miss Sue Williams, of Jackson, on the day Cockrill was shot, was upstairs in the Day Bros. Store. She heard the shooting, or at least three of the shots and reached the front store window as the last shot was fired.
She saw Curt Jett come out of the Courthouse and cross toward the Hargis store about two minutes after the shooting. He could hardly have had time to enter the store before he turned back to the Courthouse.
Harrison Blanton was on the Crawford corner opposite the side of the Courthouse from which the shots were fired. He saw two men at the window nearest the corner on the second floor of the courthouse, but could not say who they were and heard about six shots. He saw Cockrill running down the street.
Witness then went to the front door of the Courthouse and saw Curt Jett and Jesse Spicer. Jett had a pistol by his side. Britton was coming down the steps on the left, that is from the side where the shooting came from.
Sebastian Williams, a Breathitt county farmer, testified that he went to Jackson with his brother Cash Williams, a school teacher, the day of the shooting. When the shots were fired, witness and his brother were in Judge Fleener's office in the courthouse.
The firing sounded at first like planks being thrown down. People ran down the street.

The two Williams stayed in the office only a short time and went into the hall. Curt Jett was at the front door.
Looking out the front door, witnesses saw James Hargis in the second floor window of his store on the opposite side of the street. He was standing up and it looked like he had a gun in his hand. Hargis called to Jett, "You'll get shot," or "Who's shot," and Jett replied something.
A number of witnesses were introduced by the commonwealth apparently for no other purpose than to establish the killing of Cockrill.
On Tuesday and yesterday some very damaging testimony against Judge Hargis was given. Anse White testified that he was in the court room when the application for bail for Tom Cockrill for killing Ben Hargis was made.
Judge Hargis at that time, he said, gave him a 45-calibre revolver with instructions that when trouble occurred to shoot Jim Cockrill, Attorney Vaughn, who was Tom Cockrill's attorney; McKinley Cockrill, Dr. Cox and another man whom he now believes was Marcum.
A large number of Democratic politicians are active in the interest of Judge Hargis and there is a suspicion that it will be a hung jury, regardless of the testimony. It is probable the trial will last for several weeks.

Judge Hargis Indicted

More than three years ago Dr. B. D. Cox, a prominent physician of Jackson was shot and killed as he returned home from church on Sunday night. While it created much excitement at the time, no one was arrested for the killing, and apparently little effort was made to find out who did it, and it was simply classed as one of the "feud killings" for which Breathitt county has been made famous. Dr. Cox was a kinsman of the Cockrells and was guardian of the Cockrill children. He was quite active in the defense of Jim Cockrell, who killed Ben Hargis and by this means has incurred the enmity of the opposing faction. There has been talk of an investigation at various times, but nothing resulted until this week when the grand jury returned an indictment against Judge James Hargis charging him with it.

The Winchester Democrat Tuesday, October 25, 1910</p> <p>Swift justice In our last issue we mentioned the assassination of Matt Crawford, a prominent citizen of Breathitt county, who was called to his door and shot down early Wednesday morning. Charles Little and wife were arrested next morning as they were preparing to leave Jackson. The woman promptly told the story of the crime and said her husband did the shooting. He denied it at first, but afterward confessed, but claimed he did it in self defense. Capt. Millikin, with his bloodhounds, were taken from Lexington to the scene of the crime and the trail taken by them verified in every respect the tale told by Mrs. Little of the movement of herself and husband before and after the shooting. After he was placed in jail at Jackson there was much talk of lynching, but Judge Redwine promised an immediate trial. The Grand Jury was in session and reported an indictment against Little for murder. He asked for an immediate trial which was granted. He pleaded guilty and the jury in six minutes brought in a verdict inflicting the death penalty. He was ordered taken to Lexington for safe keeping and in the custody of eight deputy sheriffs he passed through here Thursday on his way to that city. He will be taken back to Jackson for sentence, probably today. Little is a bad man, and though less than thirty years of age, has already served two terms in the penitentiary. The Winchester Democrat Tuesday, October 25, 1910</p> <p>Speedy justice Charles Little, slayer of Hargis' nephew, sentenced to hang Jackson – Charles Little, who assassinated Matt Crawford at his place of business, two miles above Jackson, was tried by a jury and his punishment fixed at death. T.T. Cope was appointed by the court to represent the defendant, and after the jury had been selected entered a plea of guilty for his client and in a short speech pleaded for mercy. Senator E.E. Hogg, of Booneville, Ky., by request, presented the case for the commonwealth, and asked for a verdict that would make an example by the punishment set. The jury was only out 10 minutes and returned a verdict fixing the punishment at death. The trial of the case has established a precedent for speedy enforcement of the law in Breathitt county and perhaps in the entire state. The Winchester Democrat Friday, October 28, 1910</p> <p>Wants a new trial Charles Little, who confessed to the murder of Matt Crawford at Jackson, and who was given a death sentence, has filed papers asking for a new trial. Seven reasons for a new trial are set forth in the prisoner's affidavit, chief of which are he was intimidated by an infuriated mob, a thousand strong which court officials informed him would lynch him on the spot if he did not confess that the judge who tried him made a speech to the mob and procured a death verdict, that the jury was selected with that end in view, and that, as only about thirty-six hours elapsed between the killing and conviction, he had not time to secure counsel and prepare the case. Little does not deny killing Crawford but insists he shot him in self defense after he had fired several shots at him, one of which took effect in his hip. Mr. Curry was about thirty years old, a son of Mrs. Sophia Curry, of this city, and for a number of years resided at Tucson, the capital of Arizona. He was one of the most prominent men of that Territory and had filled many places of prominence and trust. He was twice Mayor of the city and refused a third term. He served with distinction in the Territorial Legislature and was a member of The Winchester Democratic Executive Committees, both county and territorial. At the time of his death he was on his way to Washington where his appointment as Collector of Internal Revenue for the Treasury was practically conceded, and had stopped at El Paso where he had business interests. His popularity as a boy, student and young man, was proverbial and his friends were legion. Daughter Vicki Hogan said he was committed to improving his home county, and doing whatever he could for his fellow citizens. "He lived for the people of Clark County. That's about what you can sum it up as — to serve them — and they would call him any time of day or night," Hogan said. Curtis died Thursday at Clark Regional Medical Center, but he leaves behind a lengthy list of accomplishments, from helping found Clark County Community Services to serving as the last Clark County Judge before the county switched to the judge-executive format. According to his obituary, Curtis, a World War II veteran who was awarded the Bronze Star, also was named Outstanding Sheriff in 1964 and was a Kentucky Colonel. He served on the Winchester Board of Commissioners, as a deputy jailer and on the Clark Regional Medical Center Board of Directors. Curtis also was instrumental in establishing the Clark County Rescue Unit, and, as head of county government, the development of Fort Boonesborough State Park. Curtis' sister, longtime Winchester Sun Society Editor Betty Ratliff Smith, said her brother was involved in so many areas of community development because "he cared."</p> <p>"He was very dedicated to whatever he did," Smith said. "He always gave everything to anything he was involved in." Hogan echoed Smith's sentiments. "There was a whole lot of stuff that I think wouldn't have gotten done if he hadn't been as caring, and wanting the community to grow," Hogan said. "He was not a politician, he was a public servant," Smith said. "When his country called, he went and he served. After combat throughout Europe, he came home on a 30-day leave. Then he shipped out to the Pacific." Winchester Mayor Ed Burtner became acquainted with Curtis through his tenure on the City Commission, and commended him for his desire to give back to the community. "He was just so consistent and dedicated to public service. He would do anything he could to help the citizens of Clark County," Burtner said. He attributed many of Curtis' achievements to the discipline he learned in the military. "It was just his nature to serve and give back to the community. He just wanted to do what he could do to continue that service when he returned from World War II," Burtner said. In addition to his commitment to public service, Curtis also was a devoted father and husband, Hogan said. He was married for nearly 60 years to high school sweetheart, Allie Potts Curtis, whom he met at a carnival in downtown Winchester. Allie Curtis died Jan. 13, 2002.</p> <p>"After she passed away, the one thing he wanted was to be with her," Hogan said. His family always remained his first priority, even when community needs demanded his time. "He would go out in a snowstorm, deliver food, deliver coal.
