The story goes that Gov. Joseph Desha's son, convicted away back in the 20's of murder most foul and pardoned by his father, drifted to Honolulu under an assumed name married a Kanaka woman and raised a Christian family of daughters and sons, one of whom is the present half-breed, pulpit orator preaching to large congregations in the Hawaiian capital. While visiting Louisville last summer, Mr. Willis spoke of the matter to some of his friends and expressed a purpose to more thoroughly test the truth of what was general report among American residents in Honolulu. And on this connection it may be remarked that the official records do not sustain the very general understanding among present day Kentuckians that Gov. Desha followed the pardon of his son with his own resignation of office.—Louisville Times The above recalls a crime that has passed from the minds of most people and brings to my memory a number of circumstances in connection with the Desha murder that are known to but few. Seventy years ago Isaac Desha, whose father was the Governor of Kentucky, killed a traveler, James Baker, and robbed him of seven hundred dollars. He

	<p>was arrested and lodged in jail. The evidence was overwhelming and the only hope was executive clemency. Much pressure was brought to bear on his father, Gov. Desha, for pardon, but the old Governor said he would let the law take it's course. Young Desha was tried, convicted and during some of the legal technicalities growing out of the case, he was placed in the Cynthiana jail for safe keeping. While there he tried to commit suicide and nearly succeeded by cutting a great gash in his throat. Public sympathy was aroused and at last his father pardoned him, just before the former's term as Governor expired. The Governor did not resign as is generally supposed, but served till the end of his term.</p> <p>After the young man was pardoned he lived a wandering life for some time. The brand of Cain was on his brow and he lived a miserable life. Finally he was reported dead and was gradually forgotten.</p> <p>Some time in the early 20's G. W. Crawford, of Greenup county, took a flat boat loaded with produce to New Orleans, as was customary in those days. Each night he would land his boat and only traveled by day. He slept in a portion of that boat remote from the other hands, and one night while tied up to the bank near Vicksburg, a man entered his cabin and awoke him, threatening to kill him if he made a noise. Crawford knew Desha well and when the latter made himself known recognized him at once. Desha told Crawford that he could not live in Kentucky, but had changed his name and was going to change his life; that he was going to some distant island and live as a Christian man should. He refused to tell Crawford the name he had assumed or his intended retreat. At Crawford's invitation he remained on the boat until it reached New Orleans, when he left and was probably never seen again by any of his acquaintances. Crawford asked me at the time not to mention those things and probably told no one else as everybody thought Desha was dead and Crawford thought it unwise to remove this impression. Until Minister Willis discovered his progeny in Honolulu, nothing had been heard of this Kentucky boy who, with all the advantages of good blood, education, and influential connection, was a murderer and a wanderer, and who died an exile from home by his own actions. But blood will tell and we are not surprised to find his son taking a high rank in the island republic.</p> <p>William Fleming, the father of Mrs. P. B. Winn, also knew young Desha well as Fleming, Desha and Crawford worked as boys in the same store in Flemingsburg some seventy-five years ago. Crawford was a brother of the celebrated lawyer, James Crawford, formerly member of Congress from this district, and was raised at Mt. Sterling. L. H. This report is believed here, although Gov. Bradley refuses to discuss it at all. Baldwin, Lewis D.	<p>THE BALDWIN-GREEN TRAGEDY</p> <p>Since our last we have learned the following facts connected with the Baldwin-Green tragedy, which place a somewhat different light on the killing to what our statement last week justified:</p> <p>From the evidence there seems to be no doubt that Baldwin made no effort to strike Green or to draw a pistol until after Green had struck him, and did not fire his pistol until Green had either fired or was about to do so. Baldwin asked an apology from Green, and he declined to give it. Baldwin then denounced him as a liar and scoundrel. Green replied, “ I have heard your opinion of me, what are you going to do about it? Baldwin replied that if he saw fit to take what he had said he could do nothing except to reiterate the statement. Green then placed his hand behind his ear and asked Baldwin to repeat what he had said, and just as Baldwin was finishing his statement, Green dealt him a heavy blow in the face with his clenched fist and being the stronger pressed Baldwin back and continued to strike him until the hand in which Baldwin had his pistol, was caught in such a way as to prevent its use. Green then pushed him back and fired the fatal shots; many witnesses saying that Baldwin never fired or attempted to fire his pistol until he had been mortally wounded. It appears that Green struck Baldwin for what he said after telling him in substance that he would not attack him for words, and after Baldwin had told him in substance that he did not intend to strike him. Under these circumstances it is difficult to see the grounds of self-defense relied upon by Green If language justifies the taking of life Baldwin could have killed Green on sight and pleaded self-defense as Green was the original aggressor in this respect.</p> <p>We clip from the Jessamine Journal the following account of Lew D. Baldwin’s funeral, together with the eloquent tribute of Elder Wm. Stanley, of the Christian church in relation to the dead:</p> <p>The largest funeral cortege ever witnessed in this neighborhood was that of the lamented Baldwin on Friday lasts the 18th inst. The carriages and other vehicles numbered one hundred and forty-four. The crowd in attendance was variously estimated at from three to five thousand. From early morning, friends and people from a number of counties in the State, were thronging the room where lay the remains. The coffin was an elegant cloth-draped casket covered with flowers and on the plain silver plate was the simple inscription, Lewis D. Baldwin. The rooms and hall and porch were crowded with relatives and intimate friends and hundreds collected in the yard and street who could not find room inside the house. Besides the grief-stricken wife, children and aged mother of the deceased, there were present the wives, sisters, mother, father and brothers, many relatives of the deceased, embracing hid three sisters, Mrs. Pendleton, Mrs. Haggard and Miss Ella Baldwin of Winchester; W. L. Baldwin, brother, from the West, Mrs. John Baldwin, sons and daughters, Lee, Rand, Robert and Miss Rosa; Samuel Baldwin and family of Madison; Senator Rodney Haggard, sons and daughters; Mr. And Mrs. Phillip Hodgkin, Mrs. Ben A. Crutcher and Mr. And Mrs. Thomas Rash of Winchester. Quite a number of friends were here from Danville, Richmond, Lexington, Frankfort and other places. All of the revenue officials from the district came in the morning and at noon the collector, Hon. Thomas Bronston arrived. A number of the Odd Fellows Order from Lexington were present. The services were conducted with unusual solemnity. Rev. D. B. Cooper, the pastor of the Methodist church, led in the exercises with prayer and singing “Jesus Lover of My Soul,” and “Nearer My God To Thee,” after which Elder Stanley, of the Christian church, a brother Odd Fellow of the deceased and a brother Confederate officer of his father, paid a most interesting and beautiful tribute-a copy of which (furnished at the request of friends) is given at length in this paper. The procession was as follows: T. S. Bronston and all of</p>

Mosely, carriages containing the widow and the relatives, then the procession of carriages, vehicles, and the largest cortege ever seen in our streets. A full view could be had from Main cross streets looking West out Harrodsburg and North the full length of Main street to the gates of the cemetery. The line of carriages bridged the span between the residence and the gates. The last sad rites at the grave were the beautiful and impressive burial ceremonies of Odd Fellows, conducted by Past Grandmaster Elliot, Past Grand Chaplain Hunt, Past Grand Marshall Rodenbaugh, and Chaplain Stanley. The last sad rites performed slowly the immense concourse dispersed-sadness on every countenance and grief in every heart.

Remarks By Elder Stanley
The following eloquent address was delivered by Elder Wm. Stanley, of the Christian church, at the funeral of the late Col. L. D. Baldwin:

My dear friends—I appear not today as a minister to deliver a funeral discourse. The relatives do not desire it; my friend did not approve funeral sermons. As a citizen, a friend, a brother-man, I shall endeavor, in a few words, to voice the sentiment of those who knew him, and to present a portraiture more faithful than the travesties, which have lately appeared in the public prints. This largest concourse of tearful citizens which this city has ever witnessed, testifies how Col. Lewis D. Baldwin was.

Admired, Appreciated and Loved
In the days of knighthood in olden times, impetuous valor which scorned to count the cost of daring, an unselfish chivalry that forgot self in defense of another, a delicate sense of honor taught to brook no intentional insult, and to rest not while a stain on character was not expunged, threw a weird charm and lent a singular fascination to the spirit of a time now rapidly disappearing before a changed civilization. That spirit was reproduced in a nobler form in our land by a class represented by such men as Clay, Jackson, Benton, Randolph and S. S. Prentiss. With the Lost Cause it has nearly passed away. Col. L. D. Baldwin presented all the structural peculiarities of that class in a clearer type than any one we have known in later years. Of princely manner, knightly bearing, faultless figure, classic features, peerless in courage.

Unselfish and Generous
To a fault it is not strange that he was so admired. Ever ready to risk his life for another, with heart and hand, home and purse, ever open to his friends and to the needy, we need not wonder that he was so beloved where best known. When but fourteen years old he went bitterly when refused permission to accompany his father and grandfather in defense of the cause of his beloved South. The first of these lost his life at Green River, the other at Vicksburg. Refusing to share with his mother any portion of his father's patrimony, he at an early age began to carve out his own fortune. His enterprise could acquire what impulse could not hold. He as rapidly spent as he accumulated. Never taking counsel of fear, and too impetuous to delay for conference with prudence, his life was.

Constantly Imperiled
More than once he has saved the life of others by despising his own. When conflagration was sweeping away the property of his friends, he led where none dared to follow. In the discharge of his official duties as revenue officer, he displayed the most exceptional heroism. When quite young, an appreciative public recognizing his ability, energy and worth, elected him to the position of Circuit Court Clerk. Re-elected to the same position, he only resigned to accept another of public trust. Col. Baldwin was a natural leader, and so gallantly championed every cause which he espoused that his efficient and gallant services were so highly appreciated that he was known, honored, admired and trusted by the leading men of this State. Better than all he was dearly beloved. Probably no man in our midst was such a favorite with children. He whom children love is lovely. Mystical more than magical, was his influence upon young men. Never before the news of the awful tragedy reached the ears of our citizens did bitter hot tears so freely course down the ruddy cheeks of youth. So generous, so kind, so unselfish, so youthful in his impulses, they could but dearly love him. When his mother over his lifeless form exclaimed, "Oh, my beautiful, my noble boy!" her words found an echo in every heart. She saw her noble boy, whose heart never fluttered with one craven impulse, whose face never blanched until the cold hand of death was laid upon his forehead. At his home he was lovely. His children clambered upon his knees, twined their arms around his neck, and in unchecked glee romped with this larger boy. A devoted warm-hearted husband, he never lost the courteous manner of the youthful lover. How he was more than repaid by the exceptional devotion of the most loving of wives we so well know. Although Col. Baldwin was not extremely sound in faith from unorthodox standpoint, and decidedly Unitarian view, I hear cheerful testimony as one with whom he freely conversed that he had.

Keep Reverence
For all things righteous and a loving regard for all whom he esteemed truly pious men and women. He was not an infidel. Oh, my friends what a fatal mistake his advisors made, who it seems to me might have so readily averted this awful tragedy. Lewis D. Baldwin was a stranger to malice, as forgiving as a child and quickly forgot the past as soon as injury was repaired. As well essay to place a yoke on the North wind, or chain a thunderbolt as by promises or resolve bind him to endure what he considered an insult unatoned, or a stain upon his name, or suspicion of his courage not erased. But it is too late for regret. We to-day only bury his noble form; the memory of his chivalric, generous nature is sacredly enshrined in the hearts of his so many friends, and his every opponent must yield him the need of manly admiration.

The Clark County Democrat Wednesday, March 24, 1880</p> <p>Lynch Law – Ben Johnson, of color, alias Plunkton, taken from jail at midnight and hanged to a maple tree in the Courthouse yard In our last issue we gave an account of the arrest of Ben Johnson, of color, better known as Plunkton, for attempting to commit an assault on Miss Annie Ball, of Pinchem. Judging from the excited state of the popular feeling about the matter, we predicted that he would be lynched, in case he was identified by the young lady next day, and this prediction proved to be correct. At 10 o'clock on Wednesday morning, Plunkton was brought before Judge Allan, and to make sure of his identity, three other negroes were seated with him. The case opened and no sooner had Miss Ball entered the court room than she pointed him out. This aroused the excitement of the large crowd to the highest pitch, and threats of speedy vengeance were audibly heard, but the trial was allowed to go on. The young lady stated that she had been in town Tuesday morning shopping, and had seen the negro Plunkton at Rees' stable, as she started home. She stopped at Mr. H.W. Kohlhass' to fix her satchel, and while engaged in doing this he passed her, walking rapidly out the Two Mile road. When she had gotten over the hill near Capt. Pendleton's, the negro sprang from the roadside and seized her horse by the bridle. She screamed and struck at him several times with her whip. He then attempted to pull her from the horse, but she struck at him across the face with her whip, and after a determined effort made her escape. Sanford Wills, of color, testified to Plunkton's being at the stable on the morning in question. Marshal Johnson testified to the arrest of Plunkton and his desperate efforts to escape. No testimony was introduced by the defendant, and he was held over to circuit court in the sum of \$1,000. It required the greatest coolness and bravery on the part of the officers to get the prisoner back to jail without having him strung up or carved into mince meat by the indignant populace. Even the better class of his own race wanted the Judge to place Plunkton in their hands for punishment. It became very evident during the evening that no power could save him. The roads were watched and he could not have been taken to another town, and no citizen of either color could be found who was willing to risk his life in a futile attempt to guard the life of so depraved a villain, but it must be said that the officers did their whole duty. The night wore away quietly until about half past eleven o'clock, when a number of masked men came into town from several directions, and, at the signal, a pistol shot, orders were given to put out all the lights, and a rush was made for the jail. The jailer and marshal were overpowered and compelled to deliver Ben Plunkton to them. The other prisoners were not disturbed. A rope was placed around his neck while he was being dragged from the jail, and his hands were tightly pinned behind him. The doomed negro yelled, "Fire! Fire!, murder!, murder!" a few times, but was speedily throttled, and only a few piteous cries for mercy escaped him. He was taken across the street to a maple tree in the corner of the Court house yard, and in less time than it takes</p>

	<p>to write it the rope was thrown over a limb, his body drawn up about two feet from the ground, and he was speedily strangled. The men who did the hanging were probably not over fifteen in number, but others to the number of forty or fifty were posted around town, and all were armed to the teeth and well disguised. They moved with the greatest alacrity and precision, and the orders were given by the leader to his men by numbers, "No. 4" being detailed to inform the jailer not to cut the body down until after sunrise. The party left a little before midnight, but it was after that hour before the ominous echoes of their horses' hoofs died away on the still night air. There was a terrible earnestness in their movements that showed plainly that they were not to be trifled with, and while mob law is deprecated by all good citizens, yet in an instance of this kind Kentuckians always make short work of the guilty parties. Nowhere in the world is female virtue and purity more highly esteemed or more zealously guarded than in Kentucky, and woe to him, whether he be white or black, who attempts to commit an outrage so shocking to all law and principle. We went to the cell of the doomed negro about dark, in order to obtain his statement of the case. He did not appear to realize the danger impending, and denied to the last that he was the guilty party. His restless air when closely questioned, and the transparent manner in which his excuses were given, did not, however, tend to lessen the opinion of his guilt. He claimed to have been elsewhere at the time, but his identification by the young lady was so clear and positive, and the circumstantial evidence so convincing, that but little doubt was left as to his being the criminal. From all we can learn the regulators did not attempt to secure a confession or denial from him, so well were they convinced of his guilt. His body was cut down about 6 ½ o'clock Thursday morning, and an inquest held thereon in the court house by Coroner Parrish and a jury. The body was greatly swollen, but his neck was drawn to less than half the usual size where the rope (a small plow line) passed around. He was about 21 years old and had previously borne a very bad character even by his own people, many of whom were loud in their denunciations of his attempted crime. Not one of them would assist in his burial. Since his death it has transpired that Plunkton was compelled to flee for his life from Mt. Sterling sometime back for perpetrating an outrage on a little negro girl, whose relatives then tried to kill him. The excitement in town has abated to some extent, but the terrible lesson taught by the tragic death of Ben Plunkton will be a warning for years to come to evil doers of both colors. He was not a successful business man and after the use of convicts here had become common he became a guard, and after the convicts finished their work here he still retained that position. In the spring of 1891 he was employed in transferring a lot of convicts from the railroad to a convict camp at some point on the K. C. extension. One of the convicts complained that the fetters hurt his wrist and Ball in the kindness of his heart set his gun down to loosen the fetters. No sooner were the handcuffs loosed than a convict grabbed the gun and killed him. The keys to the fetters were taken from the body and the convicts escaped except a few who did not try, but found their way to camp. Morgan Jackson, one of the convicts was tried and given a life sentence.</p> <p>The following from Frankfort would indicate that he is the wrong man. A dispatch to Louisville Times from that city, says:</p> <p>"Henry Smith, a negro convict confined here, has written a letter to Capt. Hyde, his Sunday School teacher, in which he confesses that he and not Morgan Johnson killed Guard Pomp Ball in 1891. In his letter he, in substance says: "I want to make a statement about Morgan Johnson. He is confined for a crime he did not commit. It is for the murder of Pomp Ball. I, Henry Smith, and others made up a plot to kill Ball, and Morgan Johnson knew nothing of it, and has already suffered too much for our wrong, falsehoods and wickedness. On May 20, 1891, Pomp Ball was taking some men to the railroad camp, when I, Henry Smith, Bob Ray, Bale Patterson and Landess Griggs made up a plot to hill him (Guard Ball) and Morgan Johnson knew nothing of the crime, and was in another car at the time. After making up the plot we decided to lay it on Johnson. Who was convicted and given a life sentence. I Henry Smith, am alone for the blame for Pomp Ball's death. Morgan Johnson is unjustly confined. He has no money or friends or any way to put the facts before you. I pray you do something for poor Morgan. He needs mercy. I am at your service for further facts."</p> <p>The Governor will at once investigate the truth of Smith's story.</p>

The change from the free air of the mountains to the walls of a prison was too much for the prisoners, and one by one, John Barnett, John Gibbs, John Becraft and Solomon Becraft went to the hospital and from thence to the graveyard. Last fall Newton Yarber was pardoned by the Governor and sent home to die in a short time. Batson, Dean and Acting President of Kentucky Wesleyan College of this city. The article was illustrated with a half-tone portrait of Prof. Batson: "It gives us genuine pleasure to present to the readers of The Messenger the face of one of Kentucky's most scholarly and successful educators Prof. D. W. Batson, of Kentucky Wesleyan College. For thirty years this man has wrought within the walls of the institution over which he now presides, five years as a student and twenty-five years as a teacher, and yet he is only forty-five years old. He was born in Harrison county, Kentucky, and comes of good stock. Heredity, environment and will, have all been in his favor. His strong physical constitution made it possible for him to do a vast amount of work, circumstances demanded it and he had the will to do it. Upon his graduation he was offered the chair of Mathematics in his alma mater and accepted it. After four years of successful teaching a crisis came in the history of the college. The attendance had run down and the finances were in a desperate condition. The wisest counselors say no way out. Young Batson, at this grave juncture, started the Board of Curators by proposing to become responsible for the support of the faculty if they would give him the income from all sources. They accepted the offer with trepidation, and in one year he had trebled the number of students and started the college on a new career, marking an era in its history. From that day he has been the strongest pillar in the temple. His work has been principally in the class room and among the students. His executive ability is of a high order. His benignant face is a true index to his heart. The unselfish devotion of his life to the institution which prepared him for his work is the crown jewel of his character. He aspired to a larger field to which his ability naturally pointed him. His brilliant record as a student, especially in Mathematics and Natural Sciences marked him as capable of great achievements in either of these departments. In both of these he had done splendid work. The first ten years he gave to the former, the last fifteen to the latter. His love of research would made him eminent as an original investigator, but he turned his back upon all of these allurements and consecrated his life to the service of his own conference school in the hope of placing it upon an enduring basis and leaving his work as a heritage to the church and his native state. We believe he will realize his hopes. Such devotion as he and his fellow workers have shown, never fails of results. In the young men they have trained they will live, and in them their work will go on. The streaks of dawn are visible in the financial horizon of the institution. Everything indicates a prosperous future. Dean Batson has more hearts beating in sympathy with his work than any other man could inspire. Although not known to fame he is known to a circle of men and women who have it in their power to give him success and we believe they will do it. From the Twentieth Century Thank Offering Fund the college will receive a considerable addition to its endowment and the agitation incident to it is bringing before the people the claims of Christian education as has never been done before. The gifts of this movement will give to the people a taste of the luxury of giving and we look for great results. An unfaltering trust in God and faithful work for the cause will as certainly bring success as that the morning will succeed the night. BAXTER</p> <p>Of the many faithful and true soldiers of the Confederacy who followed that flag that went down without a stain upon its fold, Ellis G. Baxter was not excelled by any of the many who were its defendants. He was born and reared in Clark county, Ky., and joined the Confederate Army (when quite a youth), in the summer of 1862 in the Seventh Kentucky Calvary of General John H. Morgan's command as a private; he was soon promoted to the rank of Lieutenant and served as such until his capture with Morgan in Ohio and remained in prison until near the end of the war (refusing, as all good soldiers would, all offers of release upon the terms offered, that of taking the oath). He was finally exchanged and sent to Richmond, Virginia. This was near the end of the war, and with the command of the illustrious and indomitable Lee surrendered at Appomattox, C.H., on April 9th, 1865. After being paroled he walked back to his home some five hundred miles, and has continued to reside here until his death which occurred on the 9th day of August, 1909. There was never a time during his life that he regretted having served the Confederacy as all will testify who knew him, and no one who took more pleasure in relating his own experiences than did he. He was a past Commander of this camp and was always active in its interest. Lieut. Death of this prominent and useful man – a sketch of his life
 Judge William Morgan Beckner died Monday night at the home of his son, Lucien Beckner, on Hickman street, in the sixty-ninth year of his age. He had suffered for some time from a complication of diseases, but the immediate cause of death was edema of the heart. He was a native of Moorefield, Nicholas county, but the greater portion of his life was spent in Winchester. After attending the country schools he attended Richeson & Rand Academy at Maysville and matriculated later at Centre College, Danville, but for want of means did not finish the course. He taught school and then read law under Judge Phister, of Maysville. In 1865 he came to this city, shortly after the close of the war, and in a short time was chosen Police Judge. He was Principal of the Winchester public schools for one term and many of our leading citizens were his pupils. The close of the war found politics, especially The Winchester Democratic party, in rather a chaotic state, and Judge Beckner was a leader in the reorganization of the party in this county. Feeling the necessity of a party organ, he was instrumental in starting The Clark County Democrat and was for many years it editor. The young lawyer soon became very popular in the county of his adoption and he was chosen to fill various offices in rapid succession. In 1866 he was County Attorney. Four years later he was County Judge; in 1880 he was State Prison Commissioner and in 1882 he was State Railroad Commissioner; he wrote the report of the commission in each case and they were noted for the exhaustive manner in which the subjects under consideration were treated. In 1889 he represented the county in the Constitutional Convention where he was a leader and many things in our organic laws were largely his work. In 1893 he was a member of the Legislature; in the following year he was chosen to fill out the unexpired term in Congress of Hon. Marcus Lisle. He was a candidate to succeed himself, but in the memorable Beattyville convention, he was beaten for the nomination by Tom Fitzpatrick by a fractional part of one vote. In 1896 he left the party, not being in accord with it on financial matters or its position in regard to the new territory acquired from Spain. He at once assumed a leading position in the Republican party and in 1903 was the candidate of the party for Attorney General, but with the rest of the ticket, went down in defeat. At the time of his death he was Chairman of the Republican County Committee. He was twice married. In 1866 he married Miss Hettie Smith, of Danville, who died the following year. In 1872 he married Miss Betsy Taliaferro, daughter of Maj. John Taliaferro, with whom he lived long and happily until her death a few years ago. To them were born six children all of whom are living, Lucien and Taliaferro, of this city; Seth, of Ft. Worden, Washington; Hickman, of Clairfield, Tennessee; Mrs. Edw. Clark, of Lexington, and Mrs. John Worth, of Reno, Nevada, all of whom will be present at the funeral except Seth. The funeral will take place tomorrow morning at ten o'clock from the First Presbyterian church, services being conducted by Rev. William Cumming, and the remains will be buried in the Winchester cemetery. Judge Beckner was by nature a leader of men; what he believed was right he advocated with all his might whether or not it was popular at the time. He advocated better schools, better roads, better streets, turnpikes, railroads, public improvements of all kinds and was not afraid of increased taxation if the community secured corresponding benefits. He was largely responsible for the preliminary work which finally culminated in the removal of Kentucky Wesleyan College to this city, and much of the most progressive school legislation of the State was due to his influence. He also was a great advocate of

	<p>increased rights and privileges of women before the law. He believed in organization and was one of the moving spirits in the beginning of the Commercial Club and was its first President. He took great pride in the growth of Winchester to which he had contributed his full quota. In his death our city and community has lost one of its most progressive citizens whose loss will be much felt. But there are yet hundreds of Daughters of the American Revolution in Kentucky and in every other state of the Union and their number increases daily. The real daughters of the American Revolution are those women who have the spirit of '76, who hate tyranny, and who love justice. You do not need to search any genealogical records to find out who these Daughters are. Their names are written on the rolls of the Kentucky Equal Rights Association, an organization of women which stands for the principle for which the men of '76 wrought-"Taxation without representation is tyranny." The day will never come when it can be said of Kentucky that her "Last and only Daughter of the American Revolution" is dead, and what is true of Kentucky is true of all her sister states. The dead are: George Harp, engineer, Lexington; Fred Runyon, fireman, Olive Hill; Claude K. Marshall, fireman, Lexington; George Berry, brakeman, Mt. Savage. The train, a heavy freight, was run as a double header, and was running at the rate of twenty miles and hour, when the boiler of the front engine, No. 232, was blown up and turned in the opposite direction from which it was traveling. The force of the explosion was so great that it shook houses some distance from the wreck, and blew heavy parts of the machinery into adjoining fields, 100 yards away. The cause of the disaster is not known yet, but it is said that the engine had not been in working order for several weeks, and that the injector was not in proper working order. The pony trucks and front drive wheels of the second engine were derailed, but the engineer and fireman escaped injury. The word was at once telephoned to this city, and Drs Shirley, McKinley, Browne and Combs & Combs were immediately sent to the scene, besides a number of people from town drove out. When they arrived Engineer Geo. W. Harp, Fireman Claude Marshall and Brakeman George Berry were dead. Fireman Runyon was placed on a passenger train which backed to Winchester and left over the L & E road with Runyon for the hospital at Lexington. Runyon died on the way. Engineer Harp was blown up in the air, and fell in time for the pony trucks of the somersaulting engine to rest across his horribly torn body, and it was late in the evening before he could be removed. Fireman Claude K. Marshall was found</p>

	<p>under the debris between the two engines. Brakeman Berry had his body so badly torn that his remains were picked up in a basket. Runyon was found a little distance from the wreck mangled and badly bruised. All the bodies were sent to Lexington that night. Rogers, Sam Wheeler, Jack Bell and James Watts, of the Ninth Cavalry, and Thompson Morton Berry, George Taylor and William Jackson, of the Tenth. James Watts is said to have been killed and Berry and Jackson were wounded in storming San Juan hill. Our reporter last week interviewed Berry, who has been at home several weeks on a sick leave. He is just twenty-one years of age and quite an intelligent negro. He graduated at our colored public school with the highest honors and took a medal last year. He was also awarded the medal at an oratorical contest in Richmond in 1897. He taught school five months at Ruckerville and in February joined the Tenth United States Cavalry (regulars) at Cincinnati and was sent to Fort Reboe in Montana where he stayed until April 19th, when his regiment was sent to Chickamauga where it remained one month. It was then ordered to Lakeland, Florida, where it stayed until June 12th, when it embarked at Tampa on board the Leona for Cuba. After a week’s voyage the fleet reached Baiquiri, about eighteen miles East of Santiago, and landing June 22nd, went into camp about one and one half miles from the seashore. Breaking camp the next evening, it marched nearly to Siboney. Resting a few hours, the regiment ate an early breakfast and moving forward was joined by the First Cavalry and the Rough Riders and a part of the Twenty-Third Infantry, making a force of about one thousand men. Early that morning (June 24th occurred the fight at La Guasima, where young Hamilton Fish was killed and the Rough Riders were rescued from their perilous position by the charge of the Tenth Cavalry (colored). Berry’s company, in this struggle, had one man killed and seven wounded. The Spaniards had 1,500 men engaged behind trenches and supported by two machine guns from Cervera’s fleet. The fight lasted about two and a half hours in a rough, hilly country and under a blazing red hot sun. The regiment rested just beyond the battle field until the night of the 30th, when it took position for the movement on San Juan which began next morning. The roads were narrow and horrible although the engineer corps had improved them considerably. The soldiers carried their rations of bacon, hardtack and coffee and also their ammunition. There were a number of small streams from a foot to a foot and a half deep before they reached San Juan river, which ran at the foot of the hill on which the fort to be stormed was located. The river was up to the arm pits of the shorter men and had to be waded. Berry’s regiment marched behind a battery of artillery the night of the 30th and was in line of battle at about nine o’clock a. m., after having crossed the river. The artillery was posted behind the infantry, which encountered a storm of shells and rifle balls. Berry’s company had sixty men in line, three yards apart. There were no barbed wire cutters on the first day and the soldiers had to break the wires with the butts of their muskets. On the 2nd day, certain men were detailed with proper implements to cut the wires which were a serious obstacle. The battle raged from nine in the morning until 4:45 p. m. Berry received a flesh wound in the hip about 1:30 p. m., as he went up the hill, but kept his place in the ranks. About 2:30 p. m., a man in company G, of the Tenth, was badly wounded, and</p>

	<p>Berry had taken him in his arms to help him to where he could be cared for, when a bullet struck the wounded soldier in the forehead, killing him instantly and spattering his blood and brains over Berry's hat and clothes. At half-past four, just as his command was rushing on the fort and victory was assured Berry was shot in the foot and, with a little aid, hobbled back to where the ambulance corps took charge of him and carried him to the rear. He left for Port Tampa on the 5th of July on board the Cherokee, which by mistake was fired on by gun boats during the voyage. He was sent to Fort McPherson, Ga., but on the way his train was wrecked. He was in a hospital there about a month and was then sent to Washington where he remained in barracks nursing his wounds until he was allowed to come home, reaching here August 24th. He speaks in the highest terms of General Wheeler's courage and kindness. During the battle, he went among the men and would tell them to lie down and keep under cover as well as they could. When the soldiers would call to him to lie down too, he would say, "Never mind me, boys. Take care of yourselves." Berry says his Captain, Watson, behaved very gallantly, and is much beloved by his men. All the commissioned officers of the Tenth Cavalry are white, and many of them from the South. Mr. Whitehead, who married Miss Louise Eginton, of this place, is a Lieutenant in this regiment. He is a Texan, and behaved with great courage in the fighting before Santiago. He was wounded slightly. Berry has had malarial fever since he came home but is not recovering rapidly. He saw Gen. Shafter lying in his tent on a cot, as he went to the rear after being wounded. Berry says that the country where the army operated around Santiago is hilly, but looked as if the soil might be rich and productive. It is covered with thick brush, and is afflicted with the cactus, which puts out myriads of sharp needles. Berry does not think the climate is much warmer than ours. He saw and felt many of the land crabs. Berry heard the guns of the fleets when Cervera's ships were destroyed. The Winchester Democrat Tuesday, March 13, 1894.</p> <p>BIG FIRE Ford Visited by a Destructive Conglagination A Whole Square Burned</p> <p>Saturday night Ford was visited by the most destructive fire in the history of the town. Between nine and ten o’clock flames were discovered issuing from the nearly completed lodge building, and notwithstanding the efforts of the people it spread both ways until in a short time the whole square from the depot to the Christian church was burned, except two dwellings. The fire originated in the new lodge building, being erected jointly by Pilot Lodge Knights of Pythias and Ford Lodge of Masons, and was undoubtedly of incendiary origin. Among the houses burned are the following: The lodge in which it originated. The store owned by Spurlock & Gibbens, and occupied by W. A. Scott. The upper part was used by the Masons and Knights of Pythias until the completion of their new building, which would have been in time for their next meeting. A portion of Mr. Scott’s goods were saved, but much of those saved were damaged in moving. A dwelling owned by Spurlock & Gibbens and occupied by Royal Augustine. The negro church recently built was burned without insurance. Two dwellings belonging to Jas. C. Richards went with the rest. One of them was occupied by Mr. Gee. This makes the second time Mr. Richards was burned out in the last month or so. The house belonging to C. G. Bowman and occupied by Lawson Edwards. A building belonging to Ode Kelley, a portion being used by Mr. Kelley as a restaurant, and the other part by Kelly and richards as a saloon. The boarding house of Mart Edwards, with much of its contents went up in smoke. The Christian church was badly scorched, and the steeple partially burned. It was only saved by the heroic efforts of Walk Hampton and others. J. T. Moore fell from the roof of this building and was badly hurt. Pate Elkin was considerably burned about the face. Jas. Turner, Dick Rue, Chad Taylor, W. Z. Eubank, and others fought like heroes, and kept the flames from spreading further. Will Post’s house was on fire a number of times and had it burned the flames would have spread to the big lumbe yard. The houses of f. M. Spurlock, Charlie Gibbens, the White Hotel, J. W. Howard, S. P. Witmer, and several stables were on fire at one time from burning shingles. A gentleman from there estimates the losses as follows: The Masonic Hall, \$ 1,200; C. G. Bigelow, Brynlee Minee’	<p>SOMERSET — Brynlee Minee' Bigelow, 21, beloved daughter of Bradley David Bigelow and Johnna Lee Atkinson-Bigelow tragically left her earthly body on February 11, 2020.</p> <p>Brynlee's grand entrance into this world occurred on June 9, 1998.</p> <p>She joined her loving brother, Braden Paul Bigelow, in being the pride, joy, heart and world of her adoring parents.</p> <p>From her toddler years, Brynlee had a very serious demeanor as she hardly ever smiled while she was studying the world around her.</p> <p>Even at that tender age, her ability to focus allowed her to rapidly advance through all the developmental stages.</p> <p>Before her parents knew it, she was climbing trees, scaling fences and running at a break-neck speed toward every finish line.</p> <p>Along with her physical development, her academic skills were equally outstanding. Through her school years, she frequently earned awards for Writing, Math, Science, Art, Reading and PE...along with winning awards for fundraising for school, band, Special Olympics and any other competition placed before her. Brynlee was a competitor in all things, regardless of the awards.</p> <p>She just wanted to win.</p> <p>She epitomized the definition of a well-rounded individual. Following in her big brother's footsteps, she started playing Cal Ripken t-ball at the age of 4 and enjoyed watching her big brother's Lake Cumberland All-star team catcher in action.</p>

Due to her studying the older catcher, when she started Coaches Pitch at 6 years old and had a chance to play the catcher's position, when other players her age were just content to wear the equipment, she was ripping off her helmet to catch foul tips like a pro and sending the batters back to the dug-out in a state of confusion because they hadn't even learned that a caught foul tip was an out. She mastered the catcher's position and also became a solid hitter, base runner and even pitched on occasion for each level of Cal Ripken. She was selected to an all-star team each year.

In 8th grade, she switched to playing softball at Meece Middle School leading the team to a 10-win season banner year.

After the 8th grade season ended, due to the varsity catcher's injury, she moved into that position for the Somerset High School Briar Jumper Softball team just prior to the district tournament. Shocking those who had never seen her perform, her advanced level of play helped the team win the District title allowing them to advance to the Regions.

She continued to play varsity softball for the remainder of her high school career winning numerous district and regional awards.

Brynlee also started playing basketball in the Upward Basketball program at the tender age of 5.

In 7th grade, she started playing basketball for both Meece Middle and Somerset High School and where she was a stand-out point guard and led the state in charges taken and ultimately was recognized as an elite member of the 1000-point club.

Her name will be on a banner in the SHS gym forever.

She also won numerous district and regional awards for basketball. She was recognized as Outstanding SHS Freshman Female athlete.

Her Junior year, she was asked to replace the injured SHS soccer keeper. Although entirely new to the game, she studied and practiced until she mastered the position like every other sport she played. Her very first year playing soccer, she was recognized for the All County Soccer team almost winning the top honor of Soccer Player of the Year, in spite of it being her first year ever playing that sport.

By the time she graduated from SHS, she had been recognized for numerous all district and all region awards in all three sports. Additionally, she was selected as a member of the All County team for all three sports being recognized as Player of the Year in Softball.

Her Senior year, she had a personal goal accomplished when she was named The Commonwealth Journal 2015 Female Athlete of the Year.

Upon her 2016 graduation, she had a dream come true when she was recruited by the University of Kentucky softball team and was recognized as being the fastest runner on the team. Brynlee had the honor of seeing significant playing time.

As she became more intent on her future, Brynlee decided to focus on her plans to be a Digital Media Graphics major which would maximize her artistic talent and creativity. She was excelling in art classes, film, web design and print art. She was on target to graduate in December 2020 with plans to transfer to a smaller school to pursue a degree in business and, perhaps, to her family's excitement, play basketball.

In addition to her athletic prowess, many people have spoken of her ability to encourage all those players coming up behind her.

Many have commented on how polite, encouraging and inspirational she was for so many younger athletes and artists alike.

Brynlee was also an adventurer. She loved going on explorations to places unknown. She was never content to sit still. Even as a child, she was always creating and mastering new skills like skateboarding, playing guitar, waterskiing, planning the next scary scene for Bigeloween, the family's annual Halloween Trick-or-Treat experience, and most recently was pursuing getting certified in scuba diving.

Miraculously, in spite of playing and participating in all these sports and activities with such fierceness and competitiveness she never experienced any major injuries causing many people to declare she was invincible.

Frankfort, Ky., Aug. 21.-Fired by a desire to gain their freedom, Wallace Bishop and Thomas Mulligan, of Kenton county, and Lafayette Brooks, of Morgan county, all murderers and desperate criminals, made a futile attempt to escape from the state penitentiary here Wednesday morning and as a result Bishop lay for hours in a critical condition at the hospital with a bullet wound in his breast, Brooks is shot through the shoulder and Alfred Ransome, colored, a Louisville murderer, who for a few moments essayed to follow the three daring murderers, is suffering from a wound in the shoulder. The mutiny, which lasted for four and a half hours and ended in an ignominious surrender by the convicts, caused great excitement within the prison and among the people of Frankfort. The convicts chose what they considered a most propitious time for their outbreak. Selecting the breakfast for their dash for liberty, when they hoped to stampede a large number of prisoners, they overpowered the guards with their pistols, captured Charles Willis, a foreman of the reed department of the chair factory, and using him as a shield entrenched themselves in a room where they defiled the officials. It was not until they discovered that Warden Eph Lillard intended to starve them out that they decided to surrender. Ransome was shot by Eph Lillard, Jr., while the men were entrenched. Bishop was wounded as he was surrendering, because when told to hold up his hands he attempted to put one of them in his pocket as if reaching for a weapon, and Brooks was wounded by a stray ball at the time Bishop fell. Wallace Bishop is said to be only the alias of the convict shot in the mutiny. His name is said to be Burns, and it is also said that he is a member of a well to do family in St. Louis. Brooks made a statement to the warden Wednesday afternoon. He places the responsibility for the attempted outbreak to Wallace Bishop. He says that he and the other two men had worn shackles constantly for months for bad conduct and that Bishop assured them that he could get them out. Wednesday afternoon Bishop, who cannot survive, joined the Catholic church and called for Acting Warden Madigan, he asked forgiveness for the attempt upon that official’s life. It is now stated upon good authority that Guard George Fry, of Marion county fired the shot which wounded Bishop. Wallace Bishop alias Burns, who led the outbreak and was fatally shot, died Wednesday night. He was conscious up to an hour or so before his death and made peace with enemies, including deputy Warden Madigan, whom he had sworn to kill. At his request Father Major, of the Catholic church, was sent for and baptized him shortly before he died. His family lives at Hammond, Ind., and the body will be sent there for burial. Guard Geo. Fry fired the shot that killed Bishop. Fry says that Bishop made a move to draw a gun and that he was satisfied the latter intended to kill Capt. Madigan. Acting on this belief he shot Bishop. Clay Turner at that time Receiver of the Montgomery Circuit Court and Capt J. L. Bowmar. The latter was known to be a brave and desperate man and the killing had been expected for years before it occurred.</p> <p>Some time in February of the past year while Circuit Court was in session, Clay Turner, accompanied by Blair and J. A. McKenzie, the two latter being Morgan county men, were walking up the street and saw Bowmar following them at a rapid pace. The three men in front separated and without words the firing begun. Bowmar emptied his pistol and then fell dead with a bullet in his heart. Blair was shot through the arm and Turner had been hit twice near the heart, but the bullets failed to pierce the skin. It was said by some that he wore a coat of mail, but he indignantly denied this. Turner, Blair and McKenzie were acquitted of the killing of Bowmar on the grounds of self defense. Everybody thought Turner did right but many thought the other two men were present for the purpose of taking part to kill Bowmar against whom they had no grievance. Blair has since lived in Morgan county and came to Mt. Sterling during the holidays. It was evident that the same feeling existed at other places as the State guards at Lexington had been ordered to hold themselves ready to march at a moment's notice. It was told here that a number of Blair's friends from Morgan and other counties were in Mt. Sterling fully armed and bent on trouble that 150 Deputy Sheriffs had been sworn in and the police force largely increased. Those who attended court there yesterday stated everything was quiet and orderly; there was no show of force, and if there was trouble brewing it was not evident on the surface of affairs. Detective Drake stated that the parties to the recent lynching of Blair were known and that they lived in Mt. Sterling. Circuit Court began there yesterday and the Grand Jury will be given information upon which to act and all will be brought to light in a few days.

BADLY SCARED

Lynchers Preparing to Leave Montgomery County.

Scope of Judge Cooper's to Punish "Mobbers" Has Been Widened.

The Lynchers of Murphy to Be Brought to Justice Also-Gov. Brown is Ready to Greatly Increase the Rewards if necessary to Secure the Guilty.

Mt. STERLING, Ky., Jan. 28-Montgomery county "mobbers" are becoming badly frightened and some are making hurried preparations to leave the state. The scope of Judge Cooper's plan to punish lynchers has been widened and he now proposes to bring to justice not only those who hanged Tom Blair, but the lynchers of Murphy also. Monday morning, when he formerly extends the time of the session of the grand jury to February 16. Judge Cooper will repeat a portion of his former charge and demand that all who participated in the lynching of Murphy be indicted.

Murphy, who killed his stepfather in one of the upper counties, was brought here for safekeeping. While in the jail here he killed a fellow-prisoner named Steele. Fearing mob violence, he was sent to Winchester. He was taken from the jail there by a man who represented himself to be an officer and brought to Mt. Sterling and hanged within its corporate limits.

Blair, serving a sentence in the Mt. Sterling jail for carrying concealed weapons, was taken out on New Year's night by a mob, and after being cruelly beaten was hanged until dead. This crime, Judge Cooper declares, was the foulest ever committed by a mob in Kentucky. This state of things is worse, he will say, than the condition of France under the reign of Robespierre.

Gov. Brown has notified Judge Cooper that if the present reward of \$500 per head for the conviction of the lynchers is insufficient, he will increase it to any amount necessary. Judge Cooper has increased the pay of the jail guards and his body guards to \$3 per day, and has also settled the dispute between himself and Attorney White.

It is said that four of the persons against whom indictments were returned Saturday have left the county. No additional arrests were made Sunday, but excitement is still very great.

Commenting upon the present condition of affairs, a local paper says:

"There is a spirit of almost absolute anarchy prevailing the very air in and around Mt. Sterling. Courts and juries are abused and lied on, no matter what they do, and attempts are made in every conceivable way, by hook and crook and strategy, to shackle the strong arm of justice and render it powerless to strike in behalf of the constitutional and legal rights of our citizens."

COOPER'S TALK

The Judge Declares Nobody Will Be Punished for Blair's Death

MT. STERLING, Ky., Jan. 31.-the grand jury has taken a recess for a few days. Before adjourning the court was notified that no evidence could be had implicating Ex-Jailer Best with the hanging of Blair in any way whatever, whereupon the court ordered him released from custody. Best's friends are not in the best humor on account of his imprisonment, and it is reported that he will bring suit against County Judge O'Rear for issuing the warrant.

Detective Drake and his associates have left the city, and it is reported that they have abandoned further search for the lynchers. The case in Lee county, charging Drake with murder, was continued, and a writ was issued for Ratliff, who swore out the warrant, but who failed to put in his appearance against Drake.

Another effort will be made Thursday to get a trial for young Roach, who is indicted for the murder of Blair. At this juncture the indications justify the prediction that no other arrests will be made in the Blair case.

Judge Cooper is highly indignant over the way in which the other officials of Mt. Sterling have tried to prevent a full investigation of the Blair lynchers. He said that the

political factions opposed to him were the cause of the trouble and he believed that nobody would be punished for the murder of Blair.
The judge bitterly denounced the many lies which he alleges have been sent broadcast over the country about him, declaring that when he killed Pearsell directly after the war he did so in self defense.
The friends of Detective Drake expect him to be assassinated at any time should he push his investigation any further. The situation in Mt. Sterling is more critical than at any time since the investigation began, and it is more than likely that Gov. Brown will step in and take a hand in ferreting out Blair's murderers.

"Bill" Blakeman, who led The Winchester Sun from the early 1960s through the early 2000s, is being remembered by his colleagues as a man dedicated to journalism who had a great love for the town he chronicled. Blakeman, 75, died Thursday after a long fight with cancer. Many of Blakeman's colleagues, from veteran journalists to the cubs he helped train, offered their thoughts on an editor known as a perfectionist. "To say Bill Blakeman was an 'old school' newspaperman would be an understatement," said Ed Staats, who retired as Kentucky bureau chief of the Associated Press. "By 'old school,' I mean he had a love for the language, a commitment to hard work, a natural sense of what makes a good news story and a real dedication to his readers and their communities. "He wrestled every day for many years getting the paper together, editing copy written by a steady stream of up-and-coming reporters whom he had hired and then filling the editorial columns with ideas about how to make Winchester and Clark County a better place. Not only will he be sorely missed by his family and friends, but by countless readers and by the many professional journalists across Kentucky, this writer included, who have high admiration for his

decades-long work as a true newspaperman.” Mike Embry, a former Associated Press correspondent, said he respected Blakeman’s commitment to journalism, even at a smaller scale. “I heard Bill speak about local journalism and the importance of having good journalists working for smaller daily newspapers,” Embry said. “He strived to have good journalists who were dedicated in providing the best news coverage on local news and sports. I believe he succeeded at The Winchester Sun. We need more local editors like Bill Blakeman.” Blakeman’s talent and abilities could have carried him away to a larger venue for journalism, but he preferred staying in Winchester. Former Sun business manager Sharon Tuminski said throughout the three decades she worked with him, that commitment never waived. “He was the kindest individual and always put The Winchester Sun as top priority,” Tuminski said. “He was a community-minded individual and served Winchester and Clark County well.” Tuminski recalled an aquarium Blakeman had built into the wall of his second-floor office. The serenity offered by the tank served as a counterpoint to the fast-paced clamor associated with producing a daily newspaper. “The neatest thing was how he loved his aquarium,” Tuminski said. “He was always so proud when my kids would come to see me and always wanted to see it. He will be greatly missed.” Throughout his tenure, Blakeman mentored many journalists who applied the lessons learned at the Sun to jobs across the state and country. “Bill was a wonderful editor,” said Jamie Vinson, who first worked for Blakeman as an intern and later as a fulltime reporter. “I will never forget his attention to detail. He was so particular. Now that I’m older I realize he was just teaching me what a good editor and newspaper should do — pay attention to detail, be precise and accurate.” Vinson worked at the Sun from 2003-2005, and is now the managing editor of the Mount Sterling Advocate. “Many of the things I learned from him I have passed on to those who have worked under me,” she said. “He was a great man and will be missed.” For Michael Cornett, who worked at the Sun from 1997 to 1999, the reporting job was his first after graduating from Morehead State University. He is now the director of agency expansion and public relations for the Eastern Kentucky Concentrated Employment Program Inc., the workforce development agency that provides jobs, training and retraining services for residents in 23 Eastern Kentucky counties. “Bill Blakeman certainly was an institution in Kentucky journalism, but he was also an inspiration to hundreds of young journalists like me who spent time under his leadership at The Winchester Sun during his lengthy tenure there as editor,” Cornett said. “Bill ran an exceedingly tight ship, but there wasn’t a single piece of news content, photo or outline written for each day’s issue that didn’t cross his desk and benefit from his vast newsroom experience and keen insight. “To this day, my own writing and editing of others’ work reflect the lessons I learned from Bill, and I’ll be forever grateful he took a chance on me as a fresh-out-of-college rookie reporter from Morehead State and helped turn me into a professional journalist.” Jay Tate, a former Sun intern who now covers Auburn University sports, said he learned much from Blakeman during his brief stint at the Sun. “Bill was my favorite editor ever,” said Tate, who later worked at the Montgomery Advertiser. “He was from the old school, which means he had exquisite command of syntax and grammar — and wasn’t afraid to correct mistakes without a hint of subtlety. I loved that about him. “Bill was rigid. He offered no apologies for that rigidity. I’m sure that trait rubbed some people the wrong way, but I had immense respect for his commitment to Clark County and the Sun itself. He was great at his job. For that, he was easy for me to appreciate.” While he cut his teeth in print, Tate offers credit to Blakeman for helping him adapt to online media. “He also was a great example for me on a personal level,” Tate said. “I run my own website now and I’m Bill Blakeman to several younger reporters. When they make silly mistakes, I can hear Bill in the back of my mind. He’d say, ‘I’ll lash you with a wet noodle the next time you do that.’ He was joking. At least I thought he was. I never actually saw a noodle, though I always assumed there was one in the desk. Bill was tough, but he had a dry sense of humor that really spoke to me. I got him. I understood how he was trying to teach me. I’m proud to say that I

	<p>improved a lot during my time at the Sun and the lessons I learned there help me provide for my family today. Bill was one of the most influential people I ever met.” Cathy Gilkey, who worked under Blakeman from 1999 to 2002, later left journalism to devote more time to raising her two children, but said she will always remembers the lessons he passed down. “When Bill hired me as a reporter in 1999, I was only a few years out of journalism school,” said Gilkey, who now is a medical technologist for Wake Forest Baptist Health in Winston-Salem, N.C. “I was young enough to think I could still change the world, and old enough to think no one could tell me otherwise. Bill accepted me, the young, brash New Yorker, and somehow managed to help me assimilate into life in Clark County. “I learned the ropes as the city government reporter and slowly grew to love the county the he cared about more than his crusty exterior would let him express. I’m extremely grateful to Bill for allowing me to be creative, and for reining me in when I needed to be. He was not only a good editor and a good writer, he was a good boss and cared for all of us. Such was the summons that came Tuesday morning to Isaac Bloom, and his spirit was wafted into the Great Beyond. He was a gentleman in the best sense of the term. Kind, considerate and courteous, he numbered his friends by hundreds in all ranks of life, and few men are in Clark county whose death will be more lamented. Forty-nine years ago he was born in Bavaria. He came to this city in 1866 and shortly after opened a clothing store in which business he continued until his health failed a few years ago. Blue Grass		Blue Grass. Col. Folk, in his Kentucky Historical Magazine says that Blue Grass was indigenous to Kentucky. This has not been the accepted understanding. We heard when a boy, and that is seventy years ago that the pioneers packed their china in blue grass hay, and when they camped at night and unpacked their china, that the seed from the hay got scattered all along their route, and this was the way it got introduced into this State. The late Isaac Cunningham, of Clark, the grandfather of the Vanmeters, Mr. Vanmeter having married his daughter and only heir, was one of the most enterprising farmers of his day, having brought a knowledge of the value of blue grass from the Valley of Virginia, from which he came. He cut down the elm, buckeye, gum and sugar trees that he did not consider "timber" and this gave the blue grass a chance to grow and his stock grew fat and thrived while that of his neighbor barely found a living by browsing the vines and brush with which the country was covered.—Lexington Gazette The Winchester Democrat Tuesday, September 12, 1899

A Lexington special says: Miss Lottie Early, of Lynchburg, Va., daughter of the late Clement Early and great niece of Gen. Jubal Early, is now in this city in consultation with attorneys in regard to the bringing of a suit for the recovery of the property on which is situated the famous Blue Lick Springs, near Carlisle, in Nicholas county. Miss Early was born near Blue Lick Springs, but the past twenty years has lived in Virginia, and only recently came into possession of information indicating that she is entitled to the property. The large tract of land originally belonged to her mother, who before her marriage to Clement Early was Miss Lou Holliday, daughter of Thomas Holliday, at one time proprietor of the old Blue Lick Springs Hotel, which was burned during the Civil War by Metcalf's cavalry. Clement Early died, leaving his widow with two daughters, one of whom also died later, leaving Miss Lottie, then a child to the care of a guardian. Later the mother also died and the property inherited by the child through her mother was entrusted to the administration of the guardian. The guardian sold part of the property, including the springs on the south side of Licking river. Bomar told several of his friends about what his boy had told him, and added that there were other reasons to confirm his suspicions. Efforts were made to allay these suspicions, but they were useless. Mrs. Bomar finally left, or at any rate, she and her husband lived apart, and she went to Texas, where she is now. The boy was sent to Middlesboro. About three months ago Capt. Bomar drew a pistol on Turner, but was prevented by a third party from shooting. The pistol was taken from him, but he drew a long knife and renewed the attack. In the trial that followed Bomar said on the stand that Mt. Sterling was too small to hold Turner and himself. Boonesboro Fort		I am surprised that the ladies could secure so few names of the pioneers to inscribe upon that stone. My friend, the late Judge French Tipton, of Richmond, spent many years collecting data for a history of Madison county. He told me once that he had collected the names of many hundreds of people who had, at one time or another, lived in the fort at Boonesboro. Among these were my great grandfather Rev. James Quisenberry and Jane Burris Quisenberry, his wife. Unfortunately, Judge Tipton died before his history was published but his manuscripts must surely still be in existence, and from these many names of the old pioneers might be derived. The rolls of only one company of the soldiers who served at Boonesboro during the years it was a military post are still in existence. Booth, Mrs. Madeline	Woman murdered Mysterious murder in Cincinnati – Victim formerly lived at Ford where she killed her son The Cincinnati Enquirer of Sunday contained an account of several columns of the mysterious murder in that city of Mrs. Madeline Booth. She was a cook for Dr. Hermann Hopple and when the physician and his little girl returned from a drive Saturday, Mrs. Booth was found dead on the floor of the pantry adjoining the kitchen. A bloody hatchet in the cellar showed the instrument with which the crime had been committed. An examination showed that her skull had been fractured in ten different places, one side of her head being crushed to pieces. She was taken to a hospital, but never recovered consciousness. A basket partly filled with silverware was found near the body, and the first theory of the police was that she had surprised a burglar and that he had killed in order to escape. As no effort was made to carry away the silver spoil and the viciousness of the murder was shown by the many useless blows, caused them to modify their theory, and they now think that revenge or jealousy may have been the cause, but no special person is suspected. Mrs. Booth was raised near Wilmore, this State, and her maiden name was Rohrer. About a quarter of a century ago she married Thomas Hambrick and when Ford, this county, became a prosperous lumber town, the couple moved there to live. They had three bright children, two girls and a boy, and the family seemed to be as happily situated as the ordinary family. In January 1893, one of the children died. She mourned the death of this child with more than ordinary intensity, and, like Rachel of old, refused to be comforted. She brooded over the matter until early in the following March, when the town was horrified by the fact that she had killed her eight-year-old daughter by cutting its own throat, and had tried to take her own life. She was brought before Judge Thos. Scott, who was the Circuit Judge, with B.A. Crutcher as Commonwealth's Attorney, and was defended by Judge Rodney Haggard. It was clearly shown that she was insane and that her insanity was caused by brooding over the death of her child in January previous. She was sent to the asylum at Lexington where she remained quite a while and was finally discharged as cured. She then went to Buffalo, New York, and afterward to Canada. There she married a French Canadian named Jacques, who died shortly afterward. She then married a rich contractor of Sault St. Marie, Michigan, but in less than two years she left him claiming that she could not stand his brutality. She then came to Cincinnati and two or three weeks ago obtained a divorce from him in the courts of that city. The courts awarded her some property in the Michigan city, but she said she was afraid to go and claim it for fear her husband would kill her. Some weeks ago she began work in a Cincinnati laundry, but a few days before her death she had quit and accepted the position she held when killed. Her first husband, Tom Hambrick, is said to have been in Texas a few years ago, but his present whereabouts is not known. Her son, aged fifteen, resides at French Lick, Indiana, with the dead woman's mother. Her daughter left home eight years ago to go to Mexico to

The value of the log has nothing to do with it. Bowman sold his raft to A. V. Jackson, agent of H. C. Long. As soon as the Asher Brothers heard that it contained their logs, they</p>

	<p>investigated the matter and became satisfied that Bowman had stolen them and had seen the brands with which they were plainly marked. They had a warrant issued by Judge Mitchell and sent a special messenger with it to Lee where the efficient Sheriff arrested Bowman who immediately gave bond, some of his neighbors out of sympathy going it for his appearance here. He appeared before Judge Mitchell July 13, when he applied for a continuance which was granted until July 20 to enable him to secure the appearance of an absent witness. He came back on the 19th, but when his case was called next day, he did not appear, and it was found, had left the county the previous evening. Col. Tucker had his bond declared forfeited and was preparing to send for him again when one of his bondsmen named Marion appeared with Jailer Drake of Wolfe county who had made quite a reputation as a detective and stated that Bowman had been heard of in Wisconsin and it was his desire to send for him. Our vigilant and active county attorney got out the papers for a requisition and Drake was soon on his way to Wisconsin armed with authority from his excellency Simon Bolivar, to ask leave of the governor of that state to bring back the log thief. From the following statement copied from one of the daily papers last week it will be seen that Drake found his man and that Grant Bowman will not again disturb the logs on the Kentucky River. The Asher Brothers have a large amount invested in logs in Eastern Kentucky and cannot afford to sit still and see them stolen. They are certain not to do so and ought to be assisted by all good men who wish well to the region. If thieves are allowed to steal this way, men will be afraid to deal in timber and the people who have it for sale will suffer. Here is the story of Bowman's death: "At Bryan, Saturday night George Irish was awakened by his dog barking and upon getting up he thought a bear was after his pigs. He got his gun and followed the dog into the woods, and saw what he thought was a bear. He shot and killed a man by the name of Bowman. It seems that Bowman was an outlaw from, that a sheriff from that state was at Bryan to arrest him; that as soon as Bowman discovered the Sheriff in the house he jumped through the window and started for the woods. The Coroner's verdict finds it was accidental shooting. About two years ago Roberts killed Dawson Bowman. He was promptly tried and sentenced to prison for life. He appealed and while waiting for the higher court to act he escaped from the Jackson jail. Nothing more was heard of him for a long time when Detective Drake found him in a Georgia mining town and brought him back. In the meantime, the Court of Appeals had reversed the decision of the lower court and ordered a new trial. Again he was convicted and came near escaping, but was brought here for safe keeping while his application for a new trial was pending. This was refused and he was taken to the penitentiary. Stanley Willoughby, about thirty years old, son of Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Willoughby, Clay Street, surrendered at police headquarters at 2:45 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, fifteen minutes after he shot and killed Dillard Brinegar, 38, two miles from Winchester on the Ecton Pike. Willoughby, in a dazed condition, walked into the offices of City Tax Collector W.R. Owens and said "I just shot and killed Dillard Brinegar." Collector Owens summoned officers and Willoughby was placed in jail, booked on a murder charge. Deputy Jailer Ben Allen, Deputy Sheriffs and police officers summoned Coroner Clarence Bean and went to the scene of the shooting near the L & E railroad bridge on the Ecton Pike. A bullet wound in the stomach resulted in Brinegar's death. Although details were not available at three o'clock Wednesday afternoon, it was reported by officers that Willoughby wrestled a pistol from Brinegar's hand and shot him following an argument. Willoughby made the statement, "I shot him to keep him from shooting me." Brinegar recently recovered from wounds suffered when he was shot by Robert Taylor following an argument at a soft drink stand on North Main Street. Brinegar was shot several times in the abdomen by Taylor and the victim was confined at the Clark County Hospital for several weeks. Brinegar is survived by his widow and several children.

Two Struggled For Possession Of Shotgun

Funeral services for Dillard Brinegar 38, who was shot to death Wednesday afternoon by Stanley Willoughby 23, will be held at the home at 9:30 o'clock Friday morning by the Rev. Clark Swaim, pastor of the Northside Baptist church. Burial will follow in the county. Brinegar was shot to death Wednesday afternoon by Willoughby, following an argument one half mile east of Winchester on the Lexington & Eastern Railroad near an abandoned lumber mill. Willoughby walked into Police Judge H.B. Scrivener's office at 3 o'clock Wednesday afternoon and said: "I just shot and killed a man. Lock me up." Judge Scrivener quoted Willoughby as saying "Brinegar told me he was going to kill me for running with his wife. I told him that was not true and he grabbed the shotgun in my hands and cocked both hammers. We struggled over the gun and I broke loose and fired both barrels." Willoughby claimed he had borrowed the gun from his uncle to lend it to Brinegar who had said he wanted to kill a ground hog. Willoughby said Brinegar always had been friendly to him.

Two Wounds Found

Coroner Clarence Bean stated that the back of Brinegar's head was torn away and another charge had entered his stomach. Either charge could have been fatal, the Coroner said. Deputy Sheriffs said Thursday there were no witnesses to the shooting other than Willoughby, who was the first to report the shooting to officials. Brinegar recently recovered from severe bullet wounds in the abdomen inflicted by Robert Taylor, during an argument at a soft drink establishment on North Main street. Treatment of Brinegar at that time caused much interest in medical circles since the bullets had severed his "appendix" in a manner identical to that of a surgical operation. Willoughby is a member of a family of fifteen children and resided with his father, Calvin Willoughby a preacher, on Clay street. Willoughby remained in the Clark county jail today on charges of murder. His examining trial has been set tentatively for Saturday morning at ten o'clock and a coroner's inquest will be held at the same hour. The Winchester Sun, Thursday, September 28, 1933.

Farney; the other two were Algin Brock and Winther Brock, aged twelve and nine years, sons of the late Rev. Henry Brock, and uncles of the other boys, Mr. Farney having married a daughter of Mr. Brock. The two saved were Walker Brock, a brother of the two drowned boys, and Tommie Oliver, a son of J. Simps. Oliver. Coroner Alexander was notified and went to the scene of the disaster Sunday morning. A jury composed of John Goode, foreman, W.F. Clemons, J.S. Jordan, J.N.C. Tuttle, J.B. Ware and S. P. He was sixty years old and a native of Mason county, and lived in this city for a number of years. During the war party feeling ran higher in Kentucky than almost any where else. Families and churches, if not exactly divided, held very different views of politics and the cordiality and good feeling that should exist did not always do so. The Christian church of this city was no exception and during the war, or a part of it at least, the church had two pastors at the same time. One Rev. Aylett Raines was a strong union man and believed in coercion. The other, Rev. J. W. Harding, was a strong southern sympathizer. These pastors served the church on alternate Sundays. The more bitter partisan on each side of politics would only go to hear his favorite minister. Shortly after the war both sides united on Rev. Brooks, then one of the most brilliant and talented young ministers of the Christian church. A parsonage was built near the present residence of J. D. Simpson, and deeded to him, and he was paid a salary of two thousand dollars per year. He staid with this church several years and resigned to accept the care of a church at St. Louis, Mo. The church at that place had just introduced the organ into the public worship, which at that time, was considered a great innovation, and Rev. Brooks went there with the avowed intention of getting rid of the organ. Bro. Brooks staid with this church only one year, but the organ is still there. He then went to Mexico, Mo., and afterwards served other churches in that State as pastor. He had a fondness for politics and in 1884 was the Prohibition candidate for Governor of that State and two years later was a candidate for Vice President with Gen. Clinton B. Fisk for President. In 1895 he assumed charge of a large church at Memphis. Shortly

	<p>after he became pastor he instituted a crusade against euchre parties and other forms of card playing among his members, but without much success. He then resigned the care of this church and went to London, England, where he had charge of the largest congregation in England. His health failed and a few months ago he returned to Memphis to die.</p> <p>He was a brilliant, aggressive man, and his debate with Rev. J. W. London, Ky., July 28 – One of the most shocking murders ever known in eastern Kentucky occurred on Fighting Creek, in Knox county, two miles east of Barbourville, Wednesday night. Mrs. Mary J. Broughton, a respectable white woman, was murdered and robbed by Annie Henson, a negro woman, and a negro man named Fitzhugh. Mrs. Broughton's husband came home last Saturday night from Artemus, where he works in the coal mines. He left with his wife \$40 he had worked out, and returned to his labor Sunday night. The Henson woman, a colored servant, knew where the money was kept. Fitzhugh, a southern negro and a desperate character, who had been working in the mines at Artemus came to the Broughton home and called on the Henson woman, but left the house early in the night. About midnight the negro servant gave the alarm that an unknown negro man had broken into the house and murdered Mrs. Broughton, and that she had fled for her life. This naturally excited the citizens of the neighborhood, who immediately organized searching parties. The neighbors found that Mrs. Broughton was gone from the house, but the bed and floor in the room where she slept was besmeared with blood. Crowds of excited people were searching every nook and corner for the woman's body, but it could not be found until Friday morning. It was discovered in Fighting Creek, a few hundred yards from the house, where it had been carried that night with the head almost severed. The fiend, after the butchery was concluded, had shouldered up the corpse, and, with the blood drenching his back, had carried it to a lonely spot in among the rocks, where he tried to hide it. The unfortunate woman's body almost denuded of night clothes, was wedged in among the rocks much after the fashion of the body jammed up a chimney by the chimpanzee in one of Poe's stories. Capt. A.G. Mulligan, of Wilmore was telegraphed to bring his blood hounds. The negro was trailed to Artemus and then pursued to the mines of the Cumberland Coal Co., where he was captured. On his person was found the identical money which Mrs. Broughton had, and in his pocket a large knife covered with blood and blood down his back clothes. The negro woman was then arrested. A blood-curdling confession was made by her in the bastille which was afterward corroborated by Fitzhugh. She said the whole plot was carefully planned by Fitzhugh and her. That she told the negro about the woman having the money and where it was kept, and that he carried out the plot by stealing back at midnight. She said that they went into her room and she held the unsuspecting victim while Fitzhugh almost beheaded her with his knife, and that the money was then taken. The body twitched and there were anxious eyes watching for movement that Brown promised to make, if he could, after the trap was sprung. Rev. Brown an hour before the fatal moment told Brown that a question had been raised as to whether a man might be conscious after he went through the trap. Rev. Brooks asked him if he was conscious and felt pain to open and close his hands. Brown promised to do it if he could. The moment the drop fell Herman Morris, city attorney; W. D. Dickinson, Robert McMillan and a correspondent went to the side of the body and watched his hands. During the first moment the fingers twitched. During the second minute the body began to squirm as though in pain, and Brown tried to close his hand, succeeding only, however, in making the index finger and thumb of the right hand meet. It seemed a plain effort to carry out his promise. Others in the crowd noticed the movement in the hands, and when the third minute had almost slipped by they were startled to see him interlace his fingers in which they remained till death. 	<p>A Deplorable affray which led to the death of a young man at the hands of his uncle and the almost fatal wounding of the latter, occurred on the Two Mile road beyond Flanagan Monday night. Several persons who lived on Four Mile left town about sunset on their way home. A number of them had been drinking and were considerably under the influence of liquor. A supply was evidently taken along, as several hours were consumed in going from this city to the place where the fight occurred, about five miles distant. Exactly how the fight occurred is not known, as we have heard two or three accounts which differ in details. It seems, however, that James Brown demanded of Squire B. A. And this is right. Bereft of a child, the measure of sunshine that departs from parent's heart, reveals the intensity of parental love and affords proof of God's wisdom in making the father and mother responsible for the welfare of their cherished offspring. It is not our capacity to reason as to what is best, but it is our undying affection for our precious children that is most intimately concerned with these sad bereavements through their untimely death. And yet this very feeling lites up the soul to a higher world and makes it dwell with the departed child in the bosom of God; fore "Where your treasure is there will your heart be also." In the death of little Woodford, a promising child and one of the gentle ways and sweetness of spirit has left the world. I myself will miss him whenever I am sad about his father's house. He was one of my many little friends with whom it was a pleasure to hold converse on childish subjects and in childish ways. But with higher views and expanded vision he now holds communion with Him who tenderly said, "Suffer little children to come unto me and forbid them not for such is the kingdom of heaven." For his sorrowing parents who so keenly felt this heavy blow the profoundest sympathy of one who has had similar experience over and over again, is here tearfully expressed and a prayer offered for the extension of divine help in this season of trial. He delivered flowers for the Flower House. He was a skilled chef, a straight-faced storyteller and a prankster. "Normally he drove the truck," Winchester Fire-EMS Chief Cathy Rigney said. "He was a solid engineer. You never had to worry about</p>

	<p>getting water if Paul Bruton was on the truck." Bruton passed away Monday. Bruton retired from the fire department in 2002 after more than 20 years. Former fire chief Danny Castle said he was one of several firefighters who were fired, and later rehired, following a strike in 1976 over working conditions and pay at the department. The only ones left, Castle said, were the chief, assistant chief and training officer. Bruton returned in 1982, according to city records, and spent most of the time running the truck and cooking on his shift. "Paul could cook but he was slow," Castle said. "He came in one morning with a half bushel of apples" and said he was making apple butter. For the entire day, Bruton peeled and cooked apples. "Around midnight, we put a pan of biscuits in" and started eating, Castle said. Rigney said Bruton usually fixed breakfast and dinner on his shift. If there was anything left, the next shift had leftovers for lunch. "When you asked what his secret was, he'd always smile and say it was cooked with love," Rigney said. Those who worked with Bruton had their favorite meals. "Fried chicken, mashed potatoes and gravy," Rigney said, without pausing to think. "I always liked his potato soup," said Fire-EMS administrative assistant Janet Hackworth. "That was the only day I ate down here." "My daughter said he made the best meatloaf, bar none," Castle said. After he retired in 2002, Bruton would keep in touch with the firefighters. "Even after he retired, at any function we had, he'd show up," Rigney said. "He didn't put his 20 (years) in and go. If he saw the guys sitting out, he'd swing in and visit." Bruton was well-known throughout Winchester, and he knew the town just as well. It paid off on fire scenes, not only from knowing the streets and house numbers, but also from knowing the residents or neighbors to find more information, Rigney said. It could be a challenge in other situations. "If you went to the store with him, plan on two hours," Rigney said, while Bruton chatted with people. That affability also paid off around the station. "He was a guy you wanted to be around," Castle said. Bruton was one of the veterans when Rigney joined the department as part of the merger with the ambulance service. "As a rookie coming in, he was very nice to me and had the utmost patience with the new guys," Rigney said. "He would always make you laugh. It seemed like his timing was always great. If you needed (a laugh), he was always there to give you one." They were both hardened wretches and neither had at time shown any remorse or sorrow. In fact, they have at all times denied all knowledge of it. Friday they made a joint confession, implicating Dr. Wagner who is now in the Lexington Insane Asylum. The execution was set for Saturday morning, but was postponed for several hours as Jackson that morning had confessed that Walling was innocent. Gov. Bradley was informed by telegraph and said that Jackson would have to give facts and particulars, instead of merely stating his opinion before he would interfere. This Jackson would not do, and in a short while he said this confession was false and only made it to gain time.

Before being taken to the scaffold they said the confession implicating Dr. Wagner was false and was made to influence the Governor. They both died game and both, at the last moment, said they were not guilty. A part of their last night was spent in playing cards after which they slept the remainder of the time. Until morning Jackson's body was refused burial at Greencastle, Ind., and his mother had it cremated.

I have before me William J. Bryan's book published about one year ago entitled "The First Battle; A Story of the Campaign of 1896." I ask a small space in your next issue of The Winchester Democrat for a few extracts from this book in order that your readers may have a true history of the lineage of this eminent statesman. D. J. Pendleton "Some of the Bryans trace their ancestry to Ireland, some to Wales, while others have followed the name through Irish into English history. A biographical sketch, written under the supervision of Silas L. Bryan, states that the family is of Irish extraction." "William Bryan, who lived in Culpeper county, Virginia, something more than one hundred years ago, is the first ancestor whose name is known to the descendants. When he was born, and where, is a matter of conjecture. He owned a large tract of land among the foothills of the Blue Ridge mountains, near Sperryville. The family name of his wife is unknown. There were born to the pair five children, James, who removed to Kentucky, John who remained upon the homestead; Aquilla, who removed to Ohio, and Francis and Elizabeth, about whom nothing is known." "John Bryan, the second son, was born about 1790, and at an early age married Nancy Lillard. The Lillard family is an old American family of English extraction, and is now represented by numerous descendants scattered over Virginia, Kentucky and Tennessee. To John Bryan and wife ten children were born, all of whom, excepting Russell and Elizabeth are deceased." "Silas Lillard Bryan, father of William Jennings Bryan, was born November 4, 1822, near Sperryville, in what was then Culpeper, but is now a part of Rappahannock county, Virginia." "About the year 1828 John Bryan removed with his family to the Western portion of Virginia, in what is now West Virginia. His last residence was near Point Pleasant, where both he and his wife died, the latter in 1834, the former in 1836." "Silas, then but a boy, went West and made his home a part of the time with his sister, Nancy Baltzeile, and part of the time with his brother William. He was ambitious to obtain an education, and after making his way through the public schools, entered McKendree College, at Lebanon, Illinois, where he completed his course, graduating with honors in 1849. On November 4, 1852, he married Mariah Elizabeth Jennings. In politics he was a Democrat in the broadest sense of the word, and had an abiding faith in republican institutions, and in the capacity of the people for self government. He was a staunch defender of higher education, and gave financial as well as moral support to various institutions of learning. He died March 30, 1890." "Mariah Elizabeth Jennings was born near Walnut Hill, Illinois, May 24, 1834. She died on the 27 th of June, 1896, and was laid to rest by the side of her husband. To Silas Lillard and Mariah Elizabeth Bryan were born nine children. Of these William Jennings Bryan was born March 18, 1860." "The Bryan, Lillard, Jennings and Davidson families all belonged to the middle classes. They were industrious, law-abiding. God-fearing people. No member of the family ever became rich and none were ever abjectly poor. Farming has been the occupation of the majority, while others have followed the legal professions and mercantile pursuits." It is for this that he will be remembered when more dazzling crowns struggled for by his contemporaries who despised his ambition, will have faded into oblivion. He not only loved his fellow man but he always kept in mind his obligations to his God. We would rather have his record than that of any prince or potentate that this world has ever seen. Dear, gentle, noble soul! We shall never forget his fervent blessings when we parted from him at our last interview, feeling then, as did he, that we would in all human probability never meet again on the shores of time. His

On Christmas, 1897, James Philpot was killed by Aaron Morris, but before he died he shot and killed Wm. Bundy, a friend of Morris. The Morris and Griffins were closely affiliated. Since then the feuding between the two factions has been very bitter, and it has been aroused recently by the White-Baker hostilities.</p> <p>The Philpots, who are the strongest faction in the mountain numbering about 750 voters, openly espoused the cause of the Bakers, White, the Griffins took sides with the Whites. The story that reaches here from Manchester is to the effect that Bob Philpot was arrested Monday morning by Deputy Sheriff Wash Thacker. While very circumstantial, in other respects the report does not show clearly the origin of the trouble nor give the reason for Philpot's arrest.</p> <p>It is said that while Thacker was taking Philpot's bond, the latter was shot from behind by a member of a crowd that had gathered. This precipitated a general fight with Winchesters and revolvers, which was participated in by George, Granville, Robert and Peter Philpot and Ed Fisher on one side and Aaron Morris, Hugh, Jim and Green Griffin on the other.</p> <p>The battle began about 9 o'clock and raged fiercely for ten or fifteen minutes. When it was over it was found that the five men mentioned above had been killed outright, three of the belligerents were seriously wounded, while Pete Philpot was the only one on either side to escape injury. Granville Philpot is said to be one of the most seriously wounded. He is a union veteran having lost a leg at Stone river. He is an ex-member of the Kentucky legislature and is said to have killed three or four men.</p> <p>Ed Fisher, who is reported dead, was another man with several nicks in his cane. He was but 23 years old but was said to have killed three men. The story of this battle caused consternation here notwithstanding the fact that serious trouble has been expected to break out among the mountaineers of Clay county ever since the assassination of Tom Baker several weeks ago. An effort was at once begun to secure deputies to go to the seat of the trouble and attempt to restore quiet, but up to a late hour in the afternoon there had not been enough responses to make up a force that would command respect. The situation at Manchester is deplorable. Since morning the place has been in a state of terror, scarcely anyone daring to venture out of doors. Business is suspended and the residents are momentarily expecting a renewal of hostilities. The entire county of Clay is filled with men mounted and armed. One of the greatest railroad accidents that has happened in this part of the State for a long time occurred Saturday afternoon a short distance South of this city on the Kentucky Central road. At that point a big double wooden trestle about 300 feet long and sixty-five feet high spans a deep ravine. The timbers had decayed badly and a force of bridge carpenters under the supervision of Oliver Green were engaged in repairing the trestle. Thirty or forty feet of the Northern end had been repaired and the men were at work on the bridge when a North bound freight train came along. It consisted of an engine, twenty-one cars and a caboose and was in charge of Conductor Sorrell. Apprehending no danger, the men at work on the bridge did not get out of the way as the train passed over, but continued their work. The engine and a couple of cars passed over in safety, when a cracking noise was heard and nearly the whole structure went down with a crash. Hearing the noise, the engineer looked back and saw the cars falling: he at once applied all the steam which alone prevented the engine, tender and two cars attached from being drawn back into the wreck. Several cars had not reached the trestle

when the structure fell, but their momentum carried them over the embankment and into the wreck. The caboose left the track and turned over but did not fall into the ravine. The news spread rapidly and in a very short space of time hundreds of people were there and an examination began to find out the loss of life and those injured. Upon investigation it was found that James Harris and Warren Burch, both members of the construction corps, were missing and a search for their bodies was begun. The body of Harris was found in a few moments and was soon recovered. His leg, shoulder, nose and hip were broken and death was evidently instantaneous. Burch was soon found but car after car of lumber and coal was piled over him in such a manner as to make it dangerous to work where he lay, and it was far in the night before his body was extricated: his hand, foot, arm and neck were broken and his chest crushed.

Will Durbin of Richmond, was knocked down more than once by the falling timbers but escaped with a cut on his head. Hub. Ecton ran through a wire fence in escaping and was slightly cut. None of the train hands were hurt.

The bodies of Harris and Burch were brought to Winn's undertaking establishment and prepared for burial. Harris was a young man not much beyond his majority and came from Sumpter county, South Carolina, to which place he was intending to return in a short time. His body was embalmed and sent home for burial. He was unmarried.

Warren Burch was a native of this county, a son of Will Burch and was about twenty-eight years of age. He was quite popular with all who knew him, and great sympathy is expressed for his wife and little child, thus so suddenly bereft of support. He was buried yesterday at Dillard Ecton's, funeral services being held by Eld. J. W. Harding.

Thousands of persons came Saturday and Sunday to view the wreck, which was appalling. Great timbers were smashed and broken as if they were straws and car loads of lumber and coal were piled together in inextricable confusions.

Of course all freight traffic was suspended but passengers and baggage were transferred and passenger trains ran as usual. The railroad company at once put a large force of men to work to clear away the wreck and rebuild the trestle. They worked all day and night and traffic will be resumed to-day or to-morrow. The damage will amount to many thousands of dollars, to say nothing of probable suits for damages on account of the death of the two men.

Coroner Lewis viewed the remains and impaneled the following jury: Jas. H. Boone, J. M. Locknane, S. I. Walden, E. G. Baxter, Chas. A. Sullivan, R. L. Sutherland and the inquest will be held this morning. As Mr. Locknane is closely related to one of the dead men, some one else will probably serve in his stead.

This section of the road has been the scene of a number of fatalities. The negro, Bob Haggard, was hung by lynchers to the bridge on this side; Maj. John Brink was struck by a train and killed near this place a few months ago; John O'Banion was shot and killed near the scene of the wreck and although the act was committed in broad daylight and in sight and hearing of a dozen people, neither the perpetrator or the motive was ever found out. While the road was being built, a work hand was blown to pieces by dynamite near the same place. A short distance on the other side an unknown tramp, who was stealing a ride, fell from the car and was cut in two by the wheels. An unknown man was killed while asleep on the track near the same place. Other accidents which did not prove fatal, have also occurred here. James W. Reed fell or was thrown from the train while passing over this trestle and was crippled for life. Mart. Ragland was struck by the cars and badly hurt, and Andy Murray, a section hand, was struck in the same manner and had a number of ribs broken.

Coroner's Inquest

Coroner Lewis summoned a jury last Saturday in the cases of Warren Burch and Jim T. Harris, the two men who were killed by the falling trestle that afternoon. As the witnesses were quite busy clearing away the wreck, he adjourned the inquest until Wednesday afternoon, when he made a full and careful inquiry into the matter. J. M. Locknane, who was an uncle by marriage of Burch, declined to serve, and James Oliver was put on the jury in his place. After full consideration the jury brought in the following verdict in regard to Burch and a similar one as to Harris:

We, the jury, find from the evidence the body before us to be that of Warren Burch, aged about 28 years, and that his life was crushed out by the falling of timbers, or giving away of the first trestle South of Winchester on the L. and N. R. R. on the evening of November 27, 1897. We further find from the evidence that said trestle was very much decayed and unsafe.

Capt. Thomas Reviews the L. and N. Disaster

On Saturday P. M., November 27th, the high, long trestle on the K. C. Division of the L. and N. Railway, one and a half miles South of Winchester, gave way, precipitating some twenty-one cars into the abyss and killing two men who were working on the trestle, by a miracle the train men escaping. The timbers were rotten and the trestle known to be unsafe for years past. For four or five years past trains have had "slow up" orders at this place as we are informed, and know by the trains slowing up. But "slow up" won't do for timbers many of which were as rotten as an old stump. I will not say that the blame attaches to subordinate officers of this road, but rather think to the policy

	<p>of its management. Some one should be responsible for this criminal negligence. <i>A common humanity cries out: We cannot bring the poor dead men back to life</i>, but something must needs to be done to protect both the public and operatives of our roads. The appointment of a first class State Engineer and Inspector, responsible to, and reporting to our chief executive to inspect the rolling stock, bridges and roadways of the roads of the State might answer. We have two Insurance Commissioners to protect us from wildcat insurance. Our lives are of greater importance. We can not depend on great corporations, whose managers are most ambitious to earn dividends for foreign bondholders to keep their branch lines in safe condition; <i>they should be made to do so or forfeit their charters</i>. When the State grants privileges it has a right of surveillance. No sort of institution connects itself more closely with the lives and interests of the people than our railroads; no institutions can be made of greater benefit, or on the other hand instruments of greater oppression than they. The fight of life times is one of the people against corporate greed. While fairness should be shown invested capital, the rights of the people should be jealously guarded, and if perchance the bondholder does not get his dividend, the roads should be put in order and made safe. This is not only right but it is the best policy for the roads themselves. A property not kept up can not be expected to pay regular dividends to its ownership. It might this year or next, but the crash soles as this neglected trestle and greatest expense is involved. The good housewife, the good farmer knows and the railroad men ought to know and practice the old adage, "A stitch in time saves nine." Whether or not the railroads be inclined (some of them are) to keep up their property, the public is so much interested that they should be made to feel that their first and highest obligation is to the State and people by whom they are supported. They can think of no instance in which he told them what they did not believe to be sincere and true and can recall no act of his which was in the slightest degree shady or uncertain, nor did he ever utter a word in the office which would have brought a blush to the cheek of the purest and most refined lady. He was ambitious to improve himself, and had risen to the front rank of his calling. He had married happily, and out of his earnings built himself a home where peace and happiness reigned supreme. He was as faithful in the church and in the lodge as he was in the other relations of life, and when the last moment came met death with a firmness and courage born of a supreme and undoubting conviction that he was entering upon his heavenly inheritance. Such a life strengthens the faith of those who believe that humanity goes forward towards that lovely perfection of which the Master was the only model, and is an inspiration to all who however humble their start in life, may have an honest desire to be useful whilst they live and respected and mourned when they come to die. The police showed great detective ability and deserve a great credit for the skill and perseverance with which they followed so slight a clue until a great crime was forested out. He confessed at one time that he killed her, but said it was accidental and afterward denied it. He showed little regard for preparation for death and evidently died with a lie on his lips. A gentleman who saw Puckett hung at Irvine ways a drunken howling mob of several thousand were present to witness the spectacle. In November, 1890 Puckett and his two sons, Tobe and Ambrose, beat Henry Hall to death with clubs in a quarrel over a picket knife. They fled to Indiana where the officers found them in the woods on the verge of starvation and clothed in rags. The two boys were sent to the penitentiary for life where they now are. The old man was sentenced to death and strenuous efforts were made to secure a pardon or commutation of sentence, but Governor Brown refused to interfere. Puckett joined the Methodist church last week and was baptized while in the Richmond jail. This is the third hanging in Estill county. In 1857 Ned Hawkins was hung for the murder of Jas. Land and Jesse Arvin, and in 1862 a negro named Joe Stone was hung for an attempt to rape. In Memoriam

At the recent reunion of the Gentry family in St. Louis, the following was read in Memorial Meeting, as a tribute to the memory of one of our well known citizens:

Among those of our number, who since our last meeting have joined the silent majority upon the other shore, is our friend and kinsman, Valentine W. Bush. On Sunday morning, January 29th, 1899, as the church bells, whose welcome call he had so often answered were pealing forth their tender message to the children of God, he bowed his head in humble submission, as the Heavenly Father touched him for the last time, and his soul left its earthly tenement. His troubles and triumphs alike were over and his days work done.

For some eighteen months his health had been declining. The final attack came in December and for six weeks his constitution fought against the increasing weakness which would not yield to the tenderest nursing and the best medical skill. He bore physical depression with a beautiful patience and submission that came from a perfect faith in god's goodness, and death had for him no sting, for though life was ever full of promise to him and the earth-ties strong, he gave his devoted wife and tenderly beloved children into Divine keeping, and surrendered himself to the will of his Heavenly Father.

His beautiful mortal life ended, but by the eternal decree of God, his life in its beauties and enjoyments had just begun, for while his temporal home was draped in mourning and sorrow and the dear wife and children and other relations and friends overflowed with grief, his purified spirit and found refuge in the Heavenly Home.

Brought up by Christian parents in the faith of the Church, he was a loyal and devoted son of her truths and at Sunday School, at the fireside, and in all the walks of life, he was faithful in teaching them. During the many years he served his Church as Elder he shunned none of the duties or responsibilities of this high trust imposed upon him, but ever made the Master's business his own. His type of piety was not that which manifests itself in public demonstration, but rather that which is seen in the private walks of Christian love and kindness.

As a host he was delightful as a friend, kind and thoughtful; as a man of business, polite accurate and unquestioned integrity. Those of us who knew him and enjoyed the genial manner and quiet humor that marked his intercourse with his friends, can not soon forget his gentle ways and courteous consideration of the claims of others. He was indeed an old school Kentucky gentleman, proud of all his people, his ancestry, his State and her history, and as jealous of his good name as the Knight Errant of old of the Honor of his Lady Love.

Of a bright and cheerful disposition his life was a happy one, for it was ever his philosophy that the troubles of life are not to be brooded over when there are so many pleasures to be enjoyed.

As surely a pebble dropped into the ocean must sink to the bottom, so must human life end, but long after the pebble has found refuge in the protecting sands, the little ripples it has caused, small though they be at first ever widen and spread, until they form a part of the mighty billows that break upon some foreign shore, and so it is with human life, for though dead our influence for good or evil is left to the world, for many a year we live in the hearts and lives of those who come after us.

How true this is of our departed friend and kinsman. His almost three score years and ten have not been in vain, for he leaves to his family and friends as a precocious legacy, a memory of tenderness and love, a spotless name the example of a good life, a character of unblemished honor and integrity, and influence which will be felt though "he sleeps the eternal sleep."

Butler, Ben	<p>PERHAPS the best hated man in America died Wednesday night. We refer to Gen. Ben Butler of Massachusetts. Everything by turns he was a true to nothing but Ben Butler. He started out as a Democrat and was a delegate to the Charleston convention in 1860. He soon after was a Federal General and made the famous order that negroes were contrabands of war. At New Orleans the people would have preferred the yellow fever. He levied a contribution on the rich and is said to have taken the silver plate to pay it. The name "Spoon Thief" stuck to him ever after. Jeff Davis proclaimed him an outlaw and offered a reward for him dead or alive. For years he was the bitterest Republican in Congress and was the leader in the effort to impeach President Johnson. He was afterwards three times a candidate for Governor of Massachusetts and was once elected as a Democrat. He as a delegate to the convention that nominated Cleveland the first time, but ran as an Independent for the President in hopes of beating him. He was impervious to criticism and only once did he flinch. Sixteen or eighteen years ago Gov. Brown of this State, was in Congress and in the bitterest speech probably ever heard there he fairly skinned Butler alive. He linked his name to his crime and today, throughout the world it is known as Burking.</p> <p>"This man's name was linked to his crimes, and today throughout the world it is known as Burking. If I were to characterize all that was pusillanimous in war inhuman in peace, forbidding in morals and infamous in politics I should call it Butlerizing." The Winchester Democrat Wednesday, January 18, 1893.</p> <p>About the bitterest attack ever made on the dead is the following comment of a Tennessee paper on the late Ben Butler. We have no love for him, and praise of any kind, solely because he is dead would be the variest hypocrisy from Southern people. There is nothing in his whole life to excite our admiration. When it is said that he possessed great intelligence and undaunted energy all that is to his credit has been said. He was a truckling demagogue whose selfishness amounted to pollution: he was an autocrat who used power to wreak personal vengeance: he was mean and malignant, a hangman from prejudice, the insulator of woman, a braggadocio, a trickster and a scoundrel whose heart was as black as the smoke from the coals that are now scorching his soul. If there be a future of peace in store for Ben butler after his entrance upon eternity, then there is no haven and the bible is a lie. If hell be only as black as the good book describes it then there are not as degrees of punishment in which some Christians believe. He is already so deep down in the pit of everlasting doom that he couldn't get the most powerful ear trumpet conceivable to scientists and hear the echoes of old Gabriel's trumpet, or fly a million kites and get a message to St. Peter, who stands guard at the gate of heaven. Butler has gone where he can order no more spoons to be stolen. He has gone where it's not to be stolen. He has gone where it's not in his power to order hanged Southern gentlemen for alleged treason against Butlerism. Good bye Ben! You strutted through a few temporal triumphs; now rest if you can in the brimstone glare of hell fire. You laughed twenty-five years ago when you branded your</p>

Butler, Bennie		<p>Some marked peculiarities appear in connection with the drowning of persons in the Kentucky river from Boonesborough up to the Mouth of Red river. The drowning at Ford last week brings forth these remarks. From the settlement of this locality, 1775 to about 1885, a period of eighty years, it is believed nobody was drowned. About the latter year Capt. Turnbull, of Winchester was drowned at the mouth of Bear Run. Probably three years later, Pen Coe, another Clark county man was drowned just below the mouth of Four Mile. In 1882, a dozen negro men and a white woman were washed out of a railroad camp on Two Mile creek into the river and drowned near Ford during a sudden rise. A few years later, several boys from Clark were drowned at the Mouth of Upper Howard's creek. Since that time the number of drownings especially at Ford, have been too great to be recalled, but perhaps every instance except that of John Sewell, several years ago and the boy East a year ago and a colored boy the past Spring that were from Clark. Thus it spans that for nearly a century and a quarter only four or five Madison county people have been drowned along about fifteen miles of river and those within the brief period of less than six years, while Clark has been unfortunate for nearly forty years and the extent of dozens. But our Madison people on the North side never had any great love for water except for farming purposes.—Richmond Register. This is only a partial list of those drowned near Ford is even the last generation: Rufus Emerson was drowned at Boonesboro; a man named Tillet near the Mouth of Otter Creek; John Atkinson some where near the same place; two sons of Commodore Richardson at the mouth of Two Mile, and a negro boy in the big eddy above the Mouth of Four Mile. Zach Hukill drowned himself on account of ill health near Riverside; Bennie Butler was drowned in Two Mile creek and his body was afterward found in the river. Bybee, in this county, and was buried at the beautiful cemetery at Freeman on the following day. A large number of friends followed the remains to their last resting place, and just before the interment took a last look at the face which was so familiarly known to the old citizens of the county. Mr. Bybee was born December 10, 1810, in Clark county, Ky., and was married in 1837 to Araminta Railsback. Eight children were born of the marriage—only three of whom survive, James L., Fielding E. and Napoleon B. Bybee. He moved to Cass county October 25, 1840, and became a farmer and stock dealer until 1860. At the breaking out of the late war he espoused the cause of the South, and from 1861 until August 1865, he was absent from the county. Since then he has resided with his sons, and been in no active business. His death again reminds us that what are regarded as the Old Settlers—the pioneers who blazed the way for the present generation in this county—are fast passing away. But two short months ago Robt. A. Brown, Sr., who came here in 1842 died. Later, and only a few weeks ago, died Mastin Burris, a resident since 1834. Mr. Bybee, like many other of the pioneers in his early life, endured many hardships and toils, but as a result finally secured a competency for his old age and for his children. A man of sound judgment and of untiring energy, he succeeded in whatever he undertook. In his convictions he was very decided and when he took a position about a matter was firm in his faith. He dealt honestly and fairly with all men and had no patience with dishonesty in others. He was not a man of policy. He could not dissemble about anything. One could always tell just where to find him, as he spoke freely and honestly his sentiments about men and measures. No man ever proved a stronger or truer friend than he, and he always had a generous hand and heart for the poor and unfortunate. If as much could be said of us all, it would be well.
